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Farm Has Higher Accident Toll Than Industry

Although the accidental death rate among farm people has been reduced, it's still higher than any other major industry, according to the president of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council.

Paul H. Walser of Temple said that in addition to the people who meet death as a result of farm accidents, a million more farm people suffer accidental injuries and the accompanying worry, misery and financial trouble.

"The question of farm safety thus becomes one of major importance to us all," Walser said. "The theme of the 1959 National Farm Safety Week 'Safety Makes Sense' is a most appropriate slogan because it is a matter of good sense to protect not only our own individual welfare but the safety and welfare of those around us."

The safety leader pointed out that although accidental deaths among farm people have been reduced from 19,500 in 1947 to 12,000 in 1957, the death toll from farm work accidents is still about 3,500 per year. He added that while "it is true that the death rate has been reduced from 66 per 100.00 farm population in 1947 to 57 in 1957, such losses are still higher than any other major industry."

"Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council pledges its best efforts in the furtherance of National Farm Safety Week in 1959," Walser said. "We hope that everyone, not only farmers and ranchers themselves, but all who have an opportunity to share in this important program, will do so."

Even if farmers do not have \$400 or more in net earnings in a year, they have the right to report two-thirds of their gross earnings for social security purposes if these gross earnings are at least \$600.

Thinking of Retiring - Farmers are required to file social security tax reports when their net earnings are \$400 or more. They also have the right to file reports even if their net earnings are below \$400, as long as their gross earnings are \$600 or more. Returns may still be filed starting with 1956. Contact the Abilene social security office.

Beneficial Insects In Cotton Discussed By County Agent

During the last few days, we have had several inquiries about the effectiveness of lady beetles in controlling injurious insects in cotton. Certainly, we can not overlook the value of lady beetles, other predators and parasites that feed on destructive insects. However, we should not place too much emphasis on their importance in a control program.

Lady beetles are general feeders on aphids spider mites and may also destroy a small percentage of the eggs and very small larvae of the boll worm. The primary food supply of lady beetles is aphids, therefore when aphids are present, the beetles are not likely to feed on other insects. Before any beneficial insects increase in cotton or other crop, there first must be an adequate food supply available. Perhaps one of the most important factors that influence the lack of abundance of beneficial insects is weather. Weather conditions may favor the increase of harmful insects but may sup-

press or completely stop build-ups of beneficial insects. When adequate food supplies and favorable weather conditions exist, predators and parasites will increase rapidly. Rapid increases of harmful insects will often severely damage the crop before the beneficial insects can build-up or be added in sufficient numbers to control the injurious insects.

Research data and observations by trained entomologists show that lady beetles disperse rapidly when released in a field and that after a very few days the beetles may not be any more numerous in the fields where released than in other surrounding fields.

Other predators such as flower bugs, lace-winged flies, spiders and wasps are much more effective in suppressing many injurious insects, especially boll worms, than are lady beetles.

Beneficial insects are helpful in preventing increases of some pests, but remember, the lady beetle is primarily an aphid feeder and one of the least effective for boll worm

control. No substitute has been found for making frequent and regular checks for destructive insect infestations and using recommended insecticides when the damaging pests build-up faster than beneficial insects can control them. Growers should never rely entirely on beneficial insects to control destructive pests of cotton.

Release of lady beetles is not recommended for boll worm control or any other injurious pest of field crops.

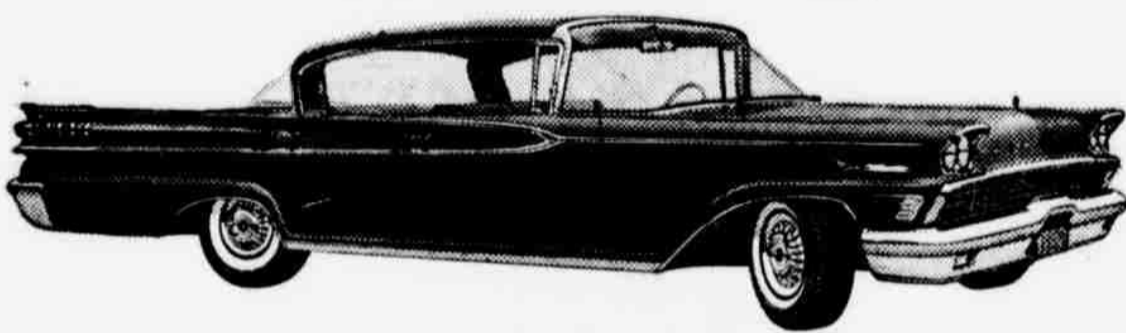

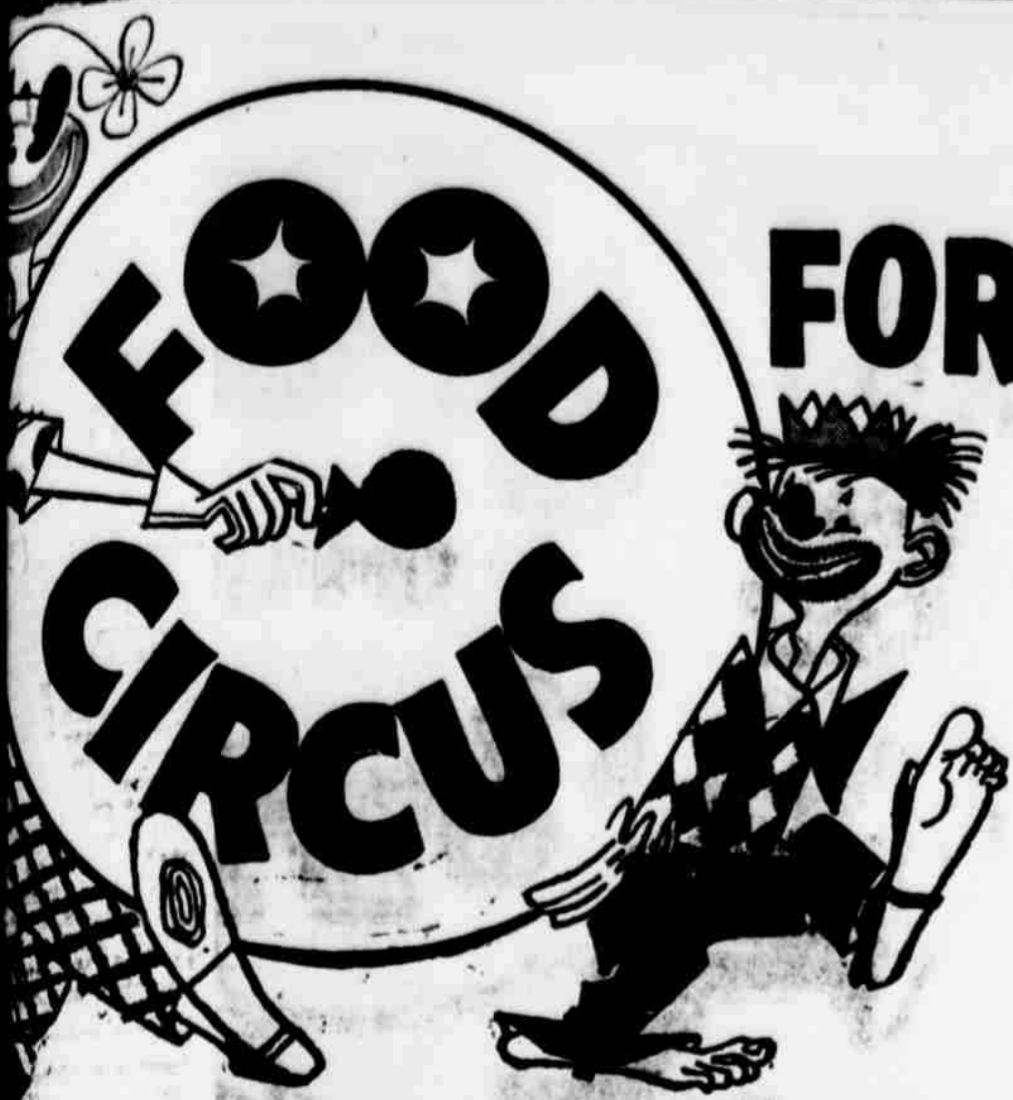

According to J. C. Yeary Jr., of the Haskell Work Unit of SCS, contracts for Calvin Frierson, A. A. Smith Jr., Dwight C. Key, Vernon Lovorn, J. E. Jettin, S. L. Griffith, George Mullino, and L. E. Groves totaling 8,757 acres have recently been approved.

H. W. Smith and H. R. Caloway of Weinert, Eugene Tonn of Haskell and Leroy Casey of Rule have recently applied for cost-share assistance under this GPCP, Yeary said.

Brush control, prickly pear control, range reseeding, cross fencing ponds, for livestock water, and terracing are the predominant practices. All contracts provide for a conservation cropping system and crop residue management practices as well as range management practices where needed.

As future contracts are approved, funds will be certified to take care of the Federal cost-sharing needs of each up to \$25,000 per contract, Yeary said. The Great Plains Conservation Program funds for any county are not allocated on a fiscal year basis, but on the needs for each contract.

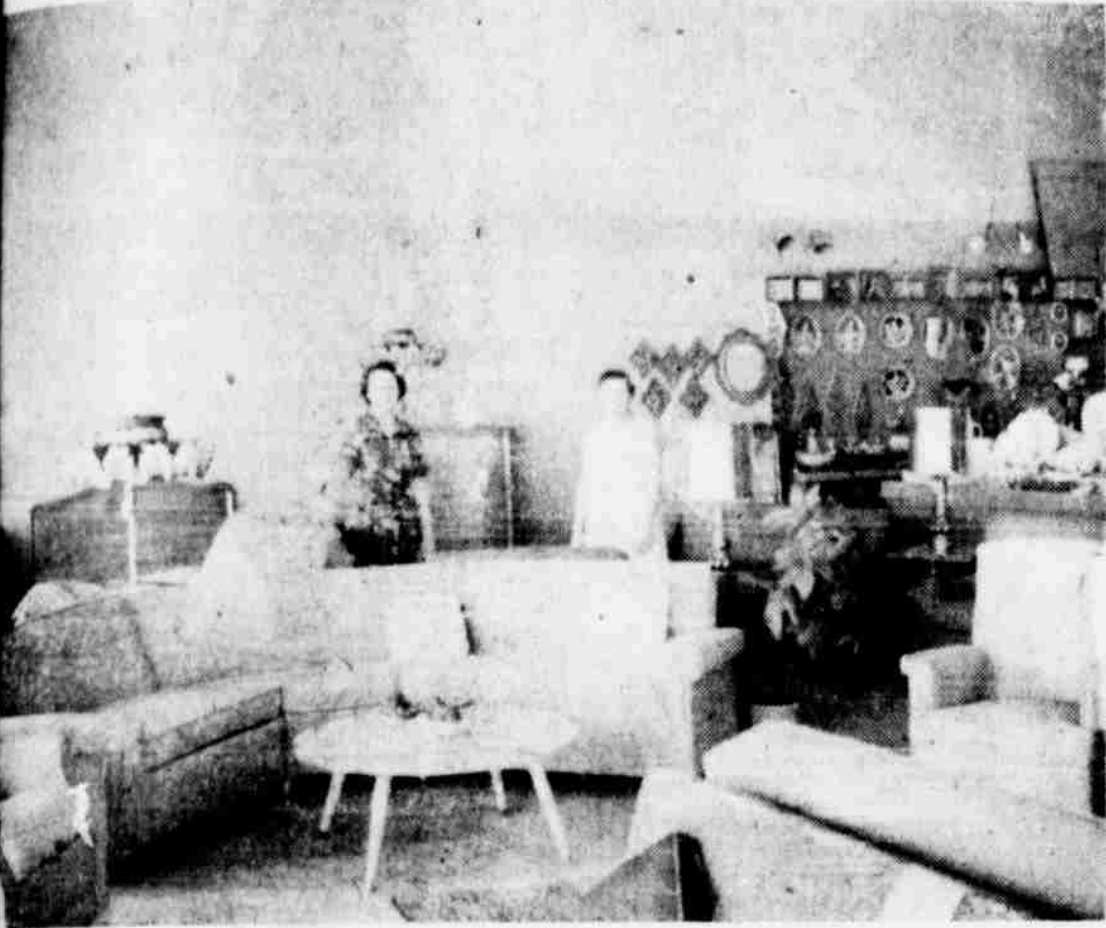
