Floydada man killed in shooting Daniel Herrera sought in slaying

An early morning shooting in Floydada, Saturday, June 21, left one man dead and another injured.

According to Floydada Police Chief Darrell Gooch, Israel Martinez, 27, of Floydada, was at the home of Erika Eguia, 25, and her boyfriend Serapio Ovalle, 39. The three were sitting on the porch when Daniel Jacob Herrera, 26, approached.

"A disagreement broke out and Herrera allegedly threw a beer can at Martinez," said Gooch. "Martinez then threw a beer can back and knocked off Herrera's hat. Herrera left at that time."

Gooch says that Herrera returned a short time later.

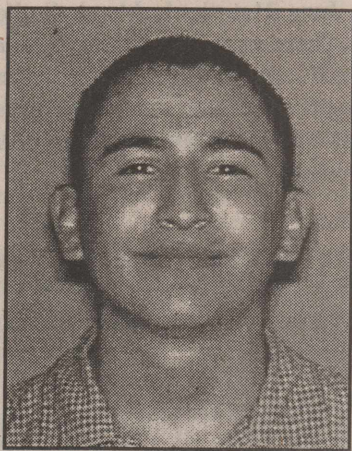
"Martinez, Ovalle, and Eguia had gone back in the house," said Gooch. "They heard tires spinning outside and they went out to see what was going on. Herrera came from around the back of the house and, according to the witness, Herrera started shooting."

Gooch said there were 6-8 shots fired from a 9mm.

"He first discharged his weapon in the air and then pointed the gun and fired directly at them," said Gooch.

Martinez was shot in the arm and the bullet traveled up into his heart and killed him instantly.

Serapio was hit in the left hip



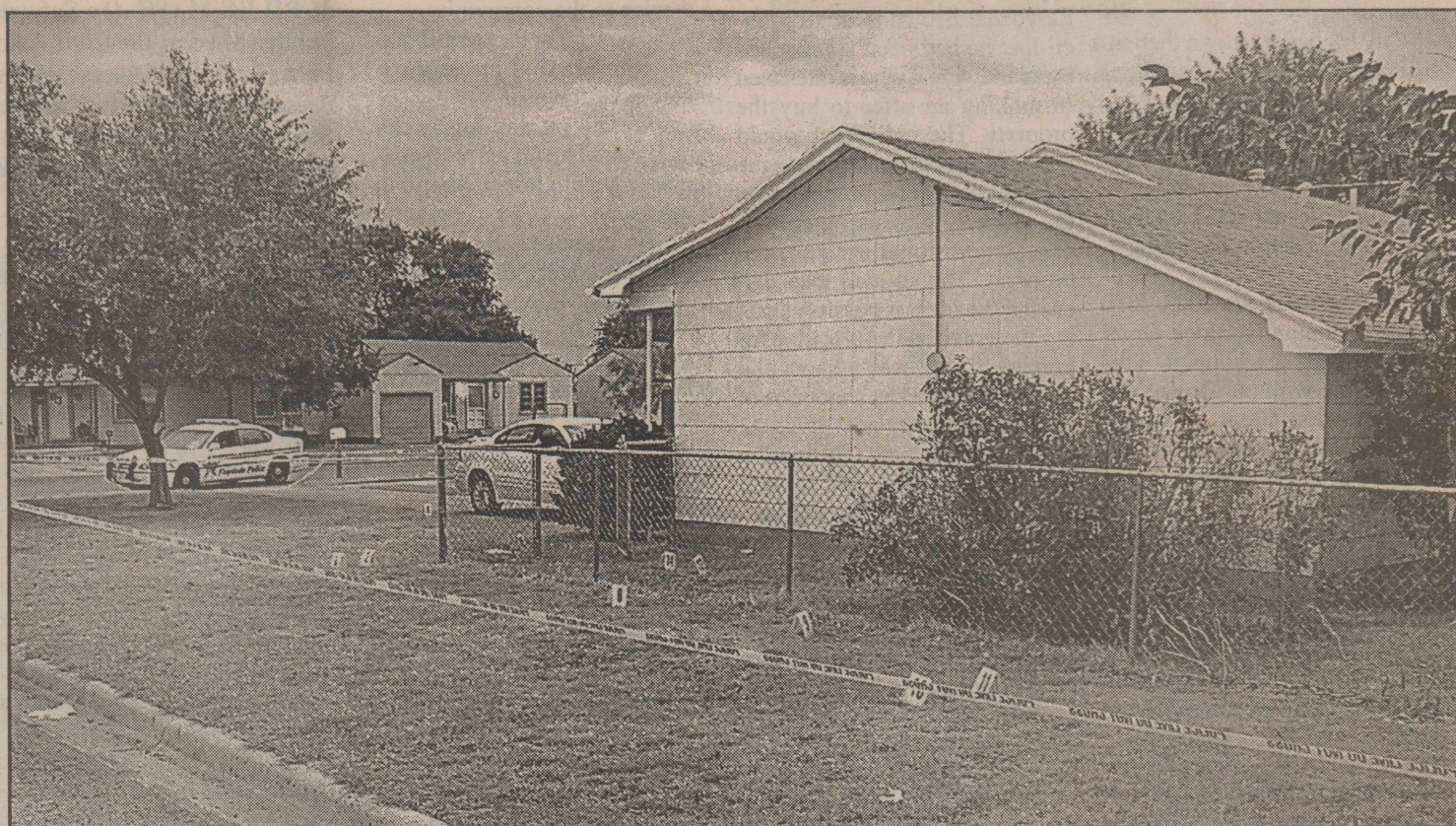

and the bullet exited in the buttocks area. He was treated at the hospital and released.

According to Gooch witnesses stated that Herrera walked away after the shooting but then turned around and came back and

kicked Serapio and Martinez in the head.

Herrera fled the scene and a warrant has been issued for his arrest. Another man is being questioned in the shooting.

Police believe Herrera is in

Lubbock. Anyone with any information on the shooting or the whereabouts of Herrera is asked to call the Floydada Police Department at 983-2834.

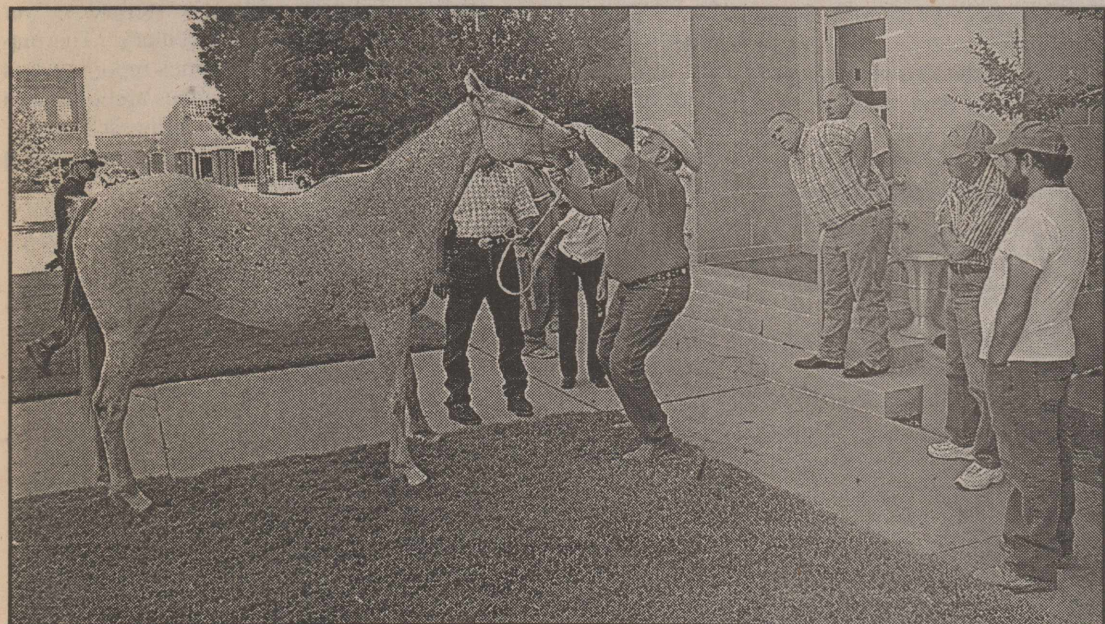
A love fund has been established for the Israel Martinez

LISD will replace lights in stadium and classes

During their regular meeting, June 12, LISD Trustees voted unanimously to increase stipends for LISD staff, replace football field lights, and replace classroom lighting.

Trustees voted to increase the stipend for staff with Master's Degrees from \$1,100 per year to \$2,000 per year.

Staff members with a Bachelor of Science degree will send an increase in their stipend from \$900 to \$1,300.

Full time auxiliary staff were getting \$400 and will now get \$600. Part time auxiliary staff will increase from \$200 per year to \$300.

In addition anyone teaching dual credit classes will earn a stipend of \$1,000.

The topic of replacing the lights at the football field was revisited and the trustees voted 6-1 in favor of replacing the lights.

Voting in favor were: John Quebe, Robbie Long, Aaron Wilson, Lonny Hooten, Jessie Garza, and Jimmy Kemp. Cheryl

Edwards was opposed.

The six old poles will be removed and replaced with 4 poles. The poles will be shorter and brighter.

"We won't need to rent a lift out of Lubbock to change the bulbs," said Superintendent Phil Cotham. "Our goal is to have the lights replaced in time for football season."

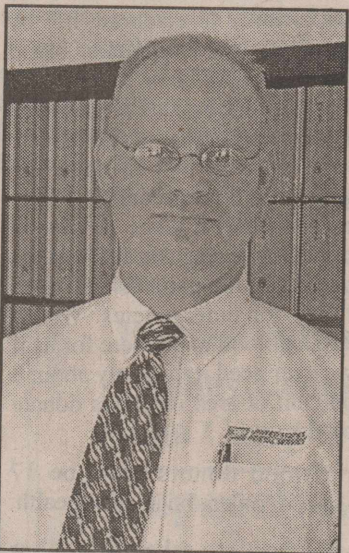
The cost of the replacement will be \$40,000.

The board heard a presentation from Dan Moore, of Digital Air Control, concerning replacing the lights in all the classrooms and offices. The board decided to go forward with the project but were going to wait until Friday, June 20, to decide which payment plan the district would use.

The company would use the current light fixtures, but put in electronic ballasts, smaller and fewer bulbs, and reflectors. The new lights will be brighter and use less electricity.

Payment options being considered by the board included:

Explorer Post being organized

Floyd County boys and girls between the ages of 14-21 will soon have the opportunity to be a part of an Explorer Law Enforcement Program.

Floyd County Deputy Cory Speed is in the process of organizing the Explorer program and gathering up adult volunteers and interested youth.

Explorer Posts are known nationwide for matching the interests of young people with resources and adult expertise in various careers.

"There are over 250 different types of Explorer Posts," said Speed. "They represent all different kinds of interests and professions."

Besides law enforcement other Explorers include: aviation, business, communications, engineering, fire/emergency services, health careers, law, science, and skilled trades.

As with other Explorer programs, the Law Enforcement Explorer program will focus on career opportunities, leadership experience, life skills, service learning and character education.

"We will teach radio procedures, handcuffing, first aid/CPR, baton use, pepper spray use, and even a handgun course," said Speed.

"We will also offer, depending on the age, a ride-along program. Of course they won't be able to carry a weapon or a ba-

ton, but after training they could carry a radio and handcuffs."

As in all youth activities parents are urged to become involved with their kids.

"The cost is \$7.00 per year," said Speed. "We will have fundraisers after the first year to raise the money needed for uniforms, but we will need the \$7.00 the first year to get started."

"The uniform will consist of a shirt with a logo. The shoes, or boots, must be black and they will be supplied by the Explorer himself or herself."

Speed says there will be an application process for young men and women. "We will have to do a background check and

Floydada City Manager reports on business of City Council

The Floydada City Council met in regular session Tuesday, June 17, 2008 at 7:30 p.m. Council members Sue, Ward, Green and Garcia were present for the meeting. Others present were Karen Houchin, city attorney, Karen Lawson, city secretary, Darrell Gooch, chief of police and city manager Gary Brown.

The need for a written procedure on how a person or entity may have an item of business placed on the agenda was the first item of business discussed. After a lengthy discussion a motion was made, seconded and passed to table the item of business until the next meeting so that staff might develop methodology and a form to recommend to the council.

City Manager Brown then informed the council that the 3 properties condemned at the May meeting were scheduled for demolition after the first of July. All 3 property owners have received a letter advising them of the council's action according to Brown.

An update on the 2009-2010 Texas Community Block Grant was given to the council. This grant along with the Downtown Revitalization Grant, to be applied for, are on schedule for submission to the appropriate organizations.

The electrical system upgrade is continuing as planned. There were some engineers in town last week walking the alleys inventorying the electric that is currently in place. The engineers were not able to complete the work and will be back next week. The inventory is needed to determine what additional work will need to be done to the system.

Mayor Gilliland then introduced the changes to the City of Floydada Personnel Manual that are recommended by staff. The changes clear up questions about holidays and how the police department will receive days off when an officer's normal shift includes working on a holiday. After discussion, a motion was made, seconded and passed to approve the changes.

The council then approved the selling of Lot 11, Block 71,

Original Town to Don and Carolyn Hardy. This property has been vacant for a number of years. A storage facility will be built on the property.

Demolition of the structures on property located at 624 East Grover and 508 East Grover was then discussed by the council. These properties have been acquired by the taxing entities through a recent sheriff's sale. After looking at pictures of the structures, a motion was made, seconded and passed to approve tearing down the housing after all taxing entities have also given approval.

City Manager Brown then brought up the idea of selling the City of Floydada Farm located approximately 5 miles West of Floydada. Brown told the council that he had been approached by an individual who is interested in making an offer to buy the property. The individual would allow the city to continue to have the 2 municipal wells located on the property plus permission to drill 1 additional well on the property. The council also discussed the idea of possibly leasing the grass on the property for grazing. There was a short discussion followed by a motion not to sell the property or to graze the property at this time. The motion was seconded and all council members voted for the motion.

A preliminary review of some items for the 2008-2009 was held. The council asked that a draft budget be developed with a 5% salary increase for the employees and to use \$ 5.00/gallon gasoline cost and \$ 6.00/gallon diesel cost. The draft budget will be given to the council about the 1st of July. This draft and any needed changes will be discussed at a council meeting in July and a 2nd draft of the budget will be developed for discussion at an August council meeting. Manager Brown said the budget would be tight for the coming year.

The council members were encouraged to consider attending the TML Region 3 meeting later this month and/or the Small Cities Problem Solving Clinic coming up the 1st of August.

The council voted to approve the minutes of the May council

meeting and to approve the paying of the May expenses and fund transfers.

In the city manager's report Brown reported on the adult softball program. He stated that as a whole things are going o.k. and that the supervisors of the program are handling the problems that come up.

The city will be seeking bids on a police car and on some pickups. Manager Brown told the council that after the bids are received the cash flow of the city will be looked at and if possible 1 or more bids could be presented to the council for their consideration.

The PAC kids are cleaning alleys as they have time to do. This project is being done by PAC as a service to the community.

The new pit at the landfill has been completed at an approximate cost savings of 40% for the citizens. This pit was dug by city employees. The pit currently being used should last another 6 to 8 weeks.

City manager Brown reminded the council the city phone is answered 24 hours a day, 7 days a week by a live person. He encouraged the council if they received a call from a citizen needing help with utilities or other city related problems to have the citizen call the city hall for help.

(1) Performance Contract--The company will take the electricity savings earned by the district over the next 10 years. In 10 years the savings would then go to the district. The company guarantees savings and if the district does not see the savings the company will come back and fix the lights.

(2) Lease Purchase--In this payment option the district would pay the company only part of the savings. There is no guarantee of savings from the company with this option. "We would have to pay interest with this option," said Cotham. "We would pay until the lights are paid off. This would probably take about 8 years."

(3) Pay all of the cost up front for \$142,000.

"We may make the decision on Friday to just do one campus at a time," said Cotham.

The board approved property and vehicle insurance from TASS for \$41,593.00.

"The cost went up \$3,500," said Cotham, "because of the fire and because the new building is worth more."

Cotham said he was very "disgruntled" with the slow progress being made on the field house. "Grimes and Associates are the contractors and they are having trouble with subcontractors."

The results from the 2007-2008 Texas Primary Reading Inventory (TPRI) was presented to the board. Kindergarten students scored 88% on the ability to recognize letters and sounds, and 77% on listening comprehension.

First graders scored 78% mastery on reading accuracy; 64% on reading fluency; and 77% on reading comprehension. Second graders scored 52% on reading fluency (students had to read 90 words per minute); and 95% on reading comprehension.

Lunch prices were set at \$1.50 for students. Breakfast prices will be 75¢.

The LISD bank balance show a total of \$4,148,330.93, which includes CD investments of \$4,145,327.51.

Harris County leads state in tornadoes

Hale County Comes in 2nd

Harris County has had almost twice as many tornadoes reported than any other county in the state according to a recent survey conducted by the Insurance Council of Texas (ICT). Despite its location south of what is referred to as tornado alley, Harris County and other counties along the Texas coast have been more susceptible to tornadoes than other areas of the state.

ICT undertook the survey to see if there was a pattern showing tornadic activity in the state. "We thought that the majority of tornados would have fallen in some kind of line between Lubbock and Dallas which covers tornado alley," said Mark Hanna, a spokesman for the Insurance Council of Texas. "But, four of the top five counties reporting the most tornadoes are all located along the Texas coast." Hurricanes and tropical storms spawning tornadoes have had an affect, but not as large as you would expect."

The tornado survey was prepared using data from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) that began recording the sightings of

confirmed tornadoes in 1950. Texas leads all other states in numbers of tornadoes each year with an average of 137.

Harris County has recorded 210 tornadoes in the past 58 years. In a distant second was Hale County located just north of Lubbock with 118. The next three counties reporting the most tornadoes were Texas coastal counties. Galveston County has had 108 confirmed tornadoes, Jefferson County has had 99 and Nueces County has had 93.

Hurricanes were responsible for spawning 17 tornadoes in Harris County during this period of time. Hurricane Alicia in 1983 was responsible for 12 of those storms. Seven hurricanes produced only 14 of the 108 tornadoes reported next door in Galveston County.

National Weather Service spokesman Walt Zaleski said the high number of tornadoes in Harris County may be attributed more to the number of people living in the area along with the sheer size of the county. "It takes teamwork to report and confirm tornadoes," said Zaleski. "The public is a part of this reporting

network that helps us confirm tornadoes and Harris County has more eyes in the sky to spot these significant weather events."

Zaleski also said there is much more thunderstorm activity along the southeastern coast line of Texas than you will find in other parts of the state. "Harris County will average up to 65 thunderstorm days each year compared to the panhandle's 40 to 45 days of thunderstorm activity," Zaleski said. "The higher thunderstorm frequency may also contribute to a greater number of reported tornadoes, many of them smaller, but still potent."

Texas leads all other states in the number of tornadoes because of its location and size. Kansas leads all states in the number of F-4 and F-5 tornadoes. 2008 is setting a pace to recording the highest number of tornadoes for one year.

Every Texas county has reported at least two tornadoes over the past half century. The majority of counties reporting less than 10 tornadoes are located in far west and southwest Texas.

make sure we haven't had any trouble with these kids. The committee members will make the final approval.

The committee will keep in line with UIL standards on whether or not a person can stay in the program.

"If they start failing grades or get in trouble in school then they will be out of the program," said Speed.

"Youth interested in a law enforcement career should know that being part of an Explorer Post looks good on their resume."

According to Speed the Explorer Post may also participate in law enforcement games. "Once a year Explorers from around the State gather and compete in a all the techniques they have learned," said Speed. "Right now a Border Patrol Explorer Post holds the title."

Speed has already gathered some men who have agreed to be

part of the committee. They are Lockney Police Officer Trey Dolloff, and Sheriff Paul Raisseze.

Speed is excited about the chance to teach young people in law enforcement skills. It will fit right in with the teaching he is already committed to.

For the past five years Speed has been an instructor for SPAG's law enforcement academy.

Speed emphasized that you don't have to be a Boy Scout to be part of the Explorer program. In fact, you don't even have to be a boy.

"It will be a lot of fun," said Speed, "but we are also going to put them to work."

"We will use them to assist with traffic control and parking at local events, community policing, assisting neighborhood watches, etc. It is action-oriented."

S.O.S. needs volunteers

Through the generous donations by the citizens of Floydada and the surrounding area, S.O.S. has become overwhelmed by the donations of clothing and other items.
There have been so many bags, boxes, etc. left at our doors that we cannot handle the donations without asking our volunteers to come, when we are not open, and put in extra hours to work up these items.

We go through these bags and boxes and put the most clean and best out to be given to those who qualify for free clothes and those who want to shop for good clothing at a very good price. These clothing sales help pay our expenses to keep S.O.S. open.

As we go through these clothes, we box and bag seasonal clothes and place them in a storage room we have for our next clothing change-over which occurs in the spring and in the fall.

Also, as we go through these clothes, we bag the clothes that we do not have room for or we feel that our clients will not want or will not buy and the Salvation Army in Plainview will send a truck to pick them up. These bags are 30 gallon bags and are very heavy for our volunteers to handle.

The Salvation Army has picked up our excess 5 times this year and we have given them 154 bags. At the time of this writing, we are working on another load.

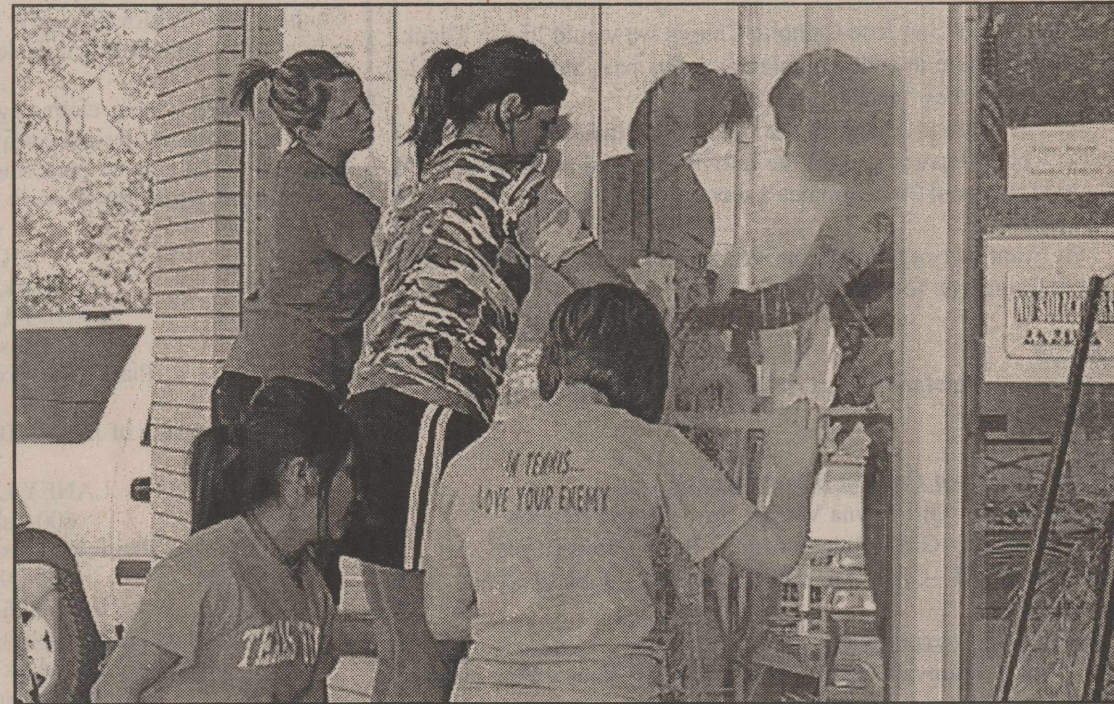

President George Bush issued his second veto of the Food, Conservation and Security Act of 2008 with little or no fanfare June 18. Congress immediately followed his lead with a workmanlike pair of votes later that day to override the veto and make all thirteen titles of the legislation the law of the land.

Within hours of the veto the House of Representatives concluded a short debate on the override measure with a 317-109 vote to override the President's veto and send the bill to the Senate.

Immediately upon receiving the package from the House the Senate took up the measure and quickly performed its own override vote. The final vote in the Senate was 80-14.

Now that this last hurdle has been cleared and the entire bill is law the focus of Congress and U.S. agriculture can now shift squarely to the process of implementing the new law.

This is a rapidly evolving process and it seems like new information about different programs and key decisions are being announced on a daily basis. That means that Plains Cotton Growers and other regional and national agriculture and commodity groups are busy working to stay involved in the process and provide input to both Congress and USDA personnel on a variety of issues.

New Upland Cotton Loan tables include changes beneficial to High Plains Cotton

The release of 2008-crop Upland Cotton Loan Premium and Discount tables by the United States Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency the week of June 11, 2008 adds another important piece to the marketing puzzle for cotton producers that are already well into the 2008 growing season.

Among the things growers have been waiting to see were the impact of changes made to the Upland Cotton loan program and how the 2008-crop loan premiums and discounts tables would be impacted.

USDA Farm Service Agency

personnel were well acquainted with the details of the proposed changes and had the revised premium and discount schedule ready to go shortly after initial passage of the Farm Bill Conference Report.

Prepared using the procedures specified in the Food, Conservation and Security Act of 2008, the new tables include some welcome changes for High Plains cotton producers

Changes considered beneficial to the High Plains specifically, include elimination of the split Micronaire schedule and regional warehouse location differentials. Other changes incorporated in the new schedule of premiums and discounts was use of the three-year weighted average of spot market data and revised color and leaf combinations for lower qualities of cotton.

The new leaf grade combinations reflect the industry recommendation to limit the applicable premium or discount for cotton with Leaf grades higher than the Color grade to the calculated premium/discount for the Leaf grade of cotton with the same Color grade but with a Leaf grade that is one better than the Color grade.

The following table illustrates how the new Color/Leaf combinations were established and what the 2008 premium or discount is based on.

Among the changes incorpo-

rated in this year's loan schedule, the previously mentioned elimination of the separate premium/discount table for Staple 32 and shorter cotton removes what many have felt was an outdated and unnecessary differentiation in light of the significant advances in staple length that has been achieved on the High Plains in recent years.

The other big change that gained High Plains producers a quick 40 points in loan value was the elimination of warehouse location differentials. In the past cotton from different parts of the U.S. received differing bale loan rates based on their county to calculate loan values. In 2008 every producer in the United States will start from the same 52-cent base loan rate and shed new light on the quality of cotton being produced in different parts of the country.

The table below provides comparisons between 2007 and 2008 loan values for White Grades 11-41 and Light Spot grades 12-42, Staple 32 through 35.
