Over the years, I have taken a ver the years, I have taken a
pretty common recipe and made it my own with a few little twists. I have taken suggestions on this recipe from my wife as well as Keith Loter, and some of it was my own idea. I've heard them
called things like "Armadillo alled things like "Armadillo
Eggs" and "Texas Poppers" but around my house they are simply known as Stuffed Peps. I can honestly say of the hundreds of people I've served these to, they never disappoint and you can never seem to make enough.
For a party I once made 100 of these, and they lasted maybe 30 minutes - I didn't even get one.
A few tips before the recipe A few tips before the recipe - I don't evern attempt it unless the jalapeno peppers are at least
four inches long. I prefer the bigfour inches long. I prefer the big-
gest I can get but anything gest I can get but anything are hard to deal with. Also, I always clean the veins and seeds out of the peppers with a melon
baller. We'll put a little spice back baller. We' 11 put a little spice back
in them later with some hot sausage. Also, while you are cleaning the peppers I strongly advise wearing latex gloves. There's nothing worse than rubbing your
face or eyes after forgetting you face or eyes after forgetting you
have jalapeno juice all over them. I know, I've done it.
And as with all recipes it can be halved, doubled, tripled whatever. My mantra is no recipe is carved in stone so feel free to experiment.
