■ Suarez edges out Morales in tax assessor/ collector race

Floyd County totals came in around 8:45 p.m. Tuesday night, showing 2,565 of the 4,543 (56.46%) registered voters turned out to vote in this year's election. The Tax Assessor-Collector

race between candidates Delia Suarez and Lori Morales was won by Suarez who received 1,369 votes to Morales' 1,105. Suarez received 910 votes in the early voting and Morales received 723.

In the County Commissioner race for Precinct 1, Cecil Jackson received 357 votes, while Mike Anderson won with 531

Bill Quattlebaum lost the County Commissioner's race for Precinct 3 to Nathan Johnson, 108 to 305.

Incumbent Randy Neugebauer was re-elected as U.S. Representative for District 19 with 73.42 percent of the votes.

Joe Heflin remains State Representative for District 85, having received 65.46 percent of the votes.

Uncontested candidates included: Sheriff Paul Raissez, who received 1,867 votes;


County Attorney Lex Herrington with 1,811 votes; District Attorney Becky McPherson had 1,820 votes and Kelly Dunbar as Justice of the Peace for Precincts 2 and 3 received

In Floyd County, McCain received 1,784 votes to Obama's 729. Final nationwide results were not yet complete at press time. Next week's paper will include a precinct by precinct breakdown for all candidates.






When I was a kid, holidays were more about the gifts, fun and excitement, but the older I get, the more I realize how meaningless the holidays would be without the love of the people in my life.

Every day should be a day to celebrate those we love; every day should be a day of thanks-





The Lockney Longhorns lost to the Ralls Jackrabbits Friday night in a district contest at Ralls



PGC Cotton News ...

The USDA Farm Service Agency has announced the release of regulations implementing several important cotton program provisions approved in the 2008 Farm Bill. According to USDA the new provisions include a modification to the transportation adjustment portion of the adjusted world price (AWP) formula, the addition of a new fine count adjustment for high quality cotton, and implementation of a 10 percent reduction in the national cotton storage rate cap.

Cotton industry leaders, who had written to USDA requesting quick action to implement these provisions just last week, welcomed USDA's announcement as good news for producers, warehouses, manufacturers and merchandisers who are struggling to compete in a difficult and volatile market.

The reduction in the storage cap rate lowers the maximum monthly storage rate paid by the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) from \$2.66 down to \$2.39 per bale.

The 2008 Farm Bill mandates that USDA make storage credits available whenever the AWP is below the loan. However, to reduce program costs, the new law also required that the maximum storage credit be reduced by 10 percent for the 2008-11 crops and 20 percent beginning with the 2012 crop.

The USDA announcement also clarified that the reduced storage rate will not apply to redemptions of 2007 crop cotton.

Beginning with the 2008 crop, the reductions will apply to the national maximum rate established by USDA in August 2006 and not to individual warehouse rates, which significantly reduces any adverse financial impact to cotton warehouses.

The second change announced by FSA was the modification of the transportation adjustment used to calculate the adjusted world price for cotton used in the cotton competitiveness pro-visions of the farm bill.

The transportation adjustment portion of the AWP formula works to equalize the average price of cotton delivered to the Far East with the U.S. cotton price received by the producer, before transport to a buyer.

The third announced change was the implementation of a new Fine Count Adjustment mechanism to the process used to determine Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP) and Marketing Loan Gains (MLG) for cotton. The adjustment is applicable only to University Avenue.

cotton quality of Middling, Leaf grade 3, Staple 35 (31-3-35) or better. If applicable, the Fine Count Adjustment provides an additional adjustment to the announced adjusted world price for purposes of establishing LDP payment rates or calculating MLG's for cotton being redeemed from the loan.

The AWP will continue to be calculated in accordance with these and other previously announced adjustments included in the new law.

The cumulative effect of these provisions is to ensure US cotton is available at competitive prices in domestic and international markets.

The adjustments in the calculation of the weekly AWP were made to enhance competitiveness and the modest projected costs were totally offset by changes in other provisions of the cotton program. The new law also includes an economic assistance program for US domestic textile mills.



Watch for carbon monoxide poisoning this winter

With record-setting home heating prices anticipated this autumn and winter, efficiency is at the forefront this year. As many homeowners address their financial concerns by turning to solid fuel appliances, like wood or pellet stoves, the Chimney Safety Institute of America (CSIA) sends the reminder that the new heating patterns, including an increase in solid-fuel use, have the potential to increase the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning and chimney fires.

According to the most recent statistics from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), chimneys and chimney connectors accounted for the largest share (36 percent) of home heating fire incidents in 2005, with "failure to clean" accounting for two-thirds of those fires.

"Responsible operation of heating appliances calls for annual maintenance," states Ashley Eldridge, director of education of CSIA. "Surprisingly few homeowners realize that the chimnevs venting their furnaces, water heaters and stoves, as well as the fireplace in the living room, need to be inspected by a qualified professional each year."

The most recent estimates available from the Consumer Product Safety Commission show an average of 25,700 residential structural fires related to fireplaces, chimneys and chimney connectors resulting in 30 deaths and \$627 million in property losses annually.

Smoke alarms critical for early fire detection

in your home and could mean the difference between life and death. Fires can occur in a variety of ways and in any room of your home. But no matter where or how, having a smoke alarm is the first key step towards your family's safety.

This information is not intended to be all inclusive, but it is intended to inform you about some of the safety aspects and importance of having and maintaining working smoke alarms.

Why are Smoke Alarms Important?

Every year in the United States, about 3,000 people lose their lives in residential fires. In a fire, smoke and deadly gases tend to spread farther and faster than heat. That's one reason why most fire victims die from inhalation of smoke and toxic gases, not as

smoke alarm is critical for the early detection of a fire a result of burns. A majority of fatal fires happen when families are asleep because occupants are unaware of the fire until there is not adequate time to escape. A smoke alarm stands guard around the clock and, when it first senses smoke, it sounds a shrill alarm. This often allows a family the precious but limited time it takes

> About two-thirds of home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms. 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WEATHER'S BEEN A MIXED BLESSING for farmers on the South Plains. Recent rains which were welcomed by some cattle, wheat, and milo farmers served only to delay Cotton stripping for others. The October 16 freeze that finished defoliating the cotton fields, in some cases killed fields of immature milo which needed more time to reach its yield potential.

sure seen among many commodity markets, a widening spread between the December and March contracts, and a shaky week on Wall Street caused a fall in U.S. cotton futures prices on the Intercontinental Exchange (ICE) Thursday.

In addition to the spreading concerns, worries over the deepening world financial and economic crisis produced an erratic trade on Wall Street and also pressured some commodity markets, along with a rising dollar, a trader said.

"Global economies teetering on the brink of recession continue to stroke fears that demand for physical commodities will ebb, thereby pressuring prices," an analyst explained. "Evidence of slowing demand was obvious in cotton consumption reports released Thursday.

A service provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

National Cotton Council figures showed U.S. textile mills used cotton on a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 4.17 million bales in September, down from a downwardly revised 4.62 million in August. August cotton consumption was originally reported at 4.87 million bales.

A world-wide economic downturn has been blamed, in part, for the continued decline in U.S. cotton use. Because it is the first financial crunch of its kind, cotton and textile demand cannot be easily predicted for the upcoming year. However, everyone agrees that consumer spending will be tightened until the economy improves.

"Today's consumers are more concerned about personal wealth, both long and short-term, as they try to preserve their home, automobile, and their family's health," a trader explained. "New clothes, towels, sheets, and other consumer goods, both durable and non-durable, will suffer a

measured drop in demand until consumers begin to feel financially safe and secure once again.'

In other news, weekly cotton export sales were a net 315,600 bales for the week ended Oct. 16, according to USDA. The figure hoping to harvest their crop in a timely manner. Picking peaked in the Delta, and most gins were working at full capacity while producers throughout the Southeast have made great strides in getting the crop off the stalk. However, work continues to lag behind the normal pace.

Majority of High Plains Gets First Freeze; 2008 Harvest Season Off To A Slow Start By Shawn Wade

The on-again, off-again application of harvest aids in preparation for harvest of a late maturing High Plains cotton crop has been brought to a rather abrupt halt in many parts of the High Plains following the arrival of the region's first freeze on Oct. 23.

According to Texas AgriLife Extension Cotton Specialist Dr. Randy Boman, the freeze takes some of the guesswork out of what to do to prepare the crop for harvest.

Boman notes that the effects of the freeze on late maturing cotton will ultimately depend on the length of time temperatures stayed below 32 degrees. In general, though, it appears that a significant portion of the area saw temperatures stay below freezing long enough to effectively put an end to most plant functions.

Crops that saw temperatures dip below freezing for just a couple of hours may not have been shut-down completely, but will most likely become even harder to manage effectively with harvest aid products.

and northwest of Lubbock are expected to be the most affected by the freeze since temperatures stayed below freezing longer. Many of these fields, which were already facing an uphill battle to fully mature bolls and fiber, could even see some yield loss as a result of the temperature

Further south temperatures didn't stay below freezing as long, but growers will see some impact on the effectiveness of harvest aid applications made just before the freeze or contemplated afterward.

One thing is certain based on harvest aids going out over the past few weeks and now a freeze, harvest and ginning activity will be picking up steam over the next two weeks. Until then we will just have to continue our wait and see approach to figuring out the 2008 High Plains cotton crop.

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First Glance At 2008 **Cotton Quality**

The following is a summary of the cotton classed at the Lubbock and Lamesa USDA Cotton Division Cotton Classing Offices for the 2008 production season.

With the delayed start that the High Plains has experienced it should be noted that the total number of bales classed to date from both offices represents the smallest possible sample of the 2008 crop.
