Lloyd family blessed by community

On Wednesday, Nov. 19, the community pulled together to show the Lloyd family what small towns are all about.

Lori Lloyd lost her husband, farmer Louis Paul Lloyd, in a fatal one-car accident less than two months ago, Sept. 30, just south of Floydada as he was heading home.


The Lloyd's cotton crop this year had to be harvested. So, an estimated 95 farmers and farm hands got together to volunteer their day on Wednesday to stripping the Lloyd's cotton crop.

One group worked around Fairview while another worked south of Floydada around County Road 290. There were nine cotton strippers at the CR 290 location, while the Fairview location had 10 strippers. Approximately 160 acres were stripped south of town and 200 acres were stripped at Fairview.

Judy Lloyd, Lori's sisterin-law, said they had people constantly calling to volunteer in whatever way they could, whether it be helping strip the cotton, to providing food for the workers, to picking up and ginning the cotton.

According to Judy, food was provided for all the workers by Preston Belt, Wilbur Ellis and Lockney City Bank, with the Floydada Coop Gin providing drinks.

Judy said D&J Gin and Floydada Coop Gin picked up and

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Floydada establishes parking restrictions

In their Nov. 18, 2008, meeting the Floydada City Council unanimously approved Ordinance 08-23, establishing parking restrictions for commercial vehicles on residentially-zoned property. This ordinance says that if the city manager "receives complaints concerning the off street parking of commercial vehicles on residential property, then anyone desiring to park such commercial vehicles must receive written, notarized consent from all property owners within 500 feet of such residential district off street property parking.'

Jere Hart, a representative from Grimes and Associates asked the city council to approve the building of the driveway/street for the A.B. Duncan Elementary school.

Attorney Karen Houchin shared what she found after researching the property rights. She told the council the Correction Dedication says the owners of the land continue "to control streets, alleys, electrical lines, light poles, etc." even after donating the land. She said this Correction Dedication was dated 1927.

Houchin said, "At this point I don't have enough information to say that the council has the authority to say anything on this."

Councilman Ruben Barrientoz moved "to wait until we get the information we need to proceed."

The council unanimously agreed. The city council also unanimously agreed to purchase for Floydada's use a telephone notification system.

City Manager Gary Brown explained, "This system... is not just an emergency system."

According to Brown, the notification system will cost the city \$2.25 per address per year, plus \$250 for support and training.

The council also heard about the home grant progress. Brown said, "Karen Allison is running with this program. She has bid notices out."

Brown explained that these home grants are through the Rural Community Affairs office and are used to build free homes for those who qualify.

"One (house) has already been torn down - it was falling down," Brown said.

Floydada resident Joe Coleman was unanimously approved by the council to buy City Lot 12, Block 13: 507 E. Grover. Coleman had previously been approved to build a house on east Lee Street, but the land was discovered to be in a flood zone.

Concerning the city's action on the condemnation of Leon Bell's property - three locations on West Kentucky street - Brown said, "(He's) still got about 30 days... so, we sit and wait.'

In the discussion concerning the Floydada Chamber of Commerce's use of the hotel/ motel tax, Brown said, "In a brief glance through, it appears they are spending the money in approved

Mayor Bob Gilliland suggested, "We need to ask businesses to join the Chamber to help them get back on their feet. The Chamber has been a vital part of the community for several years," he continued.

Three seats on the Floydada Economic Development Corporation's board are expired: Bob Alldredge (President), Bill Harbin (Vice President) and Kyle Smith. The city council discussed whether to replace them at that time or to wait. The council decided to table the issue until December's meeting to give the accountant more time to review the EDC's

The council unanimously accepted Resolution 08-15 approving an agreement for engineering services and Resolution 08-16 approving an agreement for grant management services, as well as approving the engineering services of Carthel Engineering

The planet is in financial turmoil. As crazy as it may seem, we are all in this together.

According to Kanaga Raja, global economic expert, the entire world economy is in the toilet.

Raja said, "The downturn after four years of relatively fast growth is due to a number of factors: the global fallout from the financial crisis in the United States, the bursting of the housing bubbles in the U.S. and in other large economies, soaring commodity prices, increasingly restrictive monetary policies in a number of countries, and stock market volatility.'

"The fallout from the collapse of the U.S. mortgage market and the reversal of the housing boom in various important countries has turned out to be more profound and persistent than expected in 2007 and beginning of 2008. As more and more evidence is gathered and as the lag effects are showing up, we are seeing more and more countries around the world being affected by this rather profound and persistent negative effects from the reversal of housing booms in various countries."

Basically, this will continue to get worse before economic disaster, think of those implications. it gets better. And yes, we'll be effected.

The Georgia Pacific plant in Acme is laying off 35 people immediately. There is not enough demand for drywall so the company has no choice. That's just one example of the ripple effect of this crisis.

The world's financial firms have now lost over \$2.8 trillion and global taxpayers have now spent around \$8 trillion to shore up the world's banks. These amounts will continue to climb as large businesses fail taking smaller ones with them.

On Monday, President-elect Barack Obama discussed items in his blueprint for turning around the economy - including a huge stimulus package and tax cuts for a "vast majority" of Americans paid for by the nation's "wealthiest."

The package will probably be around \$600 billion. That's on top of the \$700 billion package which Congress passed earlier.

Other countries around the globe are working to curb the recession as well. It seems every day the crisis is on the tip of the tongue when various leaders speak. And really, that's probably a good thing for us.

As bad as it is and as bad as it will get, it could be much worse.

We are all in the same boat, but what if we weren't? What if the price of oil had stayed where it was this summer? It would have had a catastrophic effect on the U.S. and our allies.

Had just a few countries entered into recession (with the U.S. being one of them), we'd be watching Russia, Iran, China and others gain power.

Russia has been flexing muscle of late and Iran has been trying to develop nuclear weapons for years. Had those countries not been a part of this

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Cotton gins around area report 'short' crop expected

Cotton isn't the kind of harvest the Pilgrims celebrated, but it's what's happening now across the Texas Plains and Panhandle and southern Oklahoma.

Off to a slow start in general for lack of freezing weather, the quality of the crop promises to be good. For lack of rain, yields in most places aren't expected to come close to last year's levels of production.

"It's going to be a real short crop this year," said Traci Freeman, gin clerk at the Close City Coop Gin near Post, where the weather has been especially dry.

Many farmers have decided not to defoliate the plants for an earlier harvest but rather to wait for a freeze to kill the leaves naturally.

"It's not worth spending the money (to de-

foliate and open late bolls)," Freeman said.

But, until last week -- except on the Caprock -- Jack Frost had been waiting in the wings, intensifying that element of suspense in the drama of the cotton harvest. Even last week's dip in temperatures could not be termed a "hard" freeze in the best sense of the word -- a freeze guaranteed to shrivel all cotton foliage and put an end to pesky late growth that won't add to yields.

The bale count at Close City was only 478 at the end of last week.

By contrast, the Coop Gin at O'Brien, south of Knox City had ginned about 5,000 bales by Friday -- irrigated defoliated cotton that didn't have to wait on a freeze.

"The cotton looks good," said Betty Starnes, gin clerk.

During last week's cold snap, the temperature dropped to about 25 degrees in the O'Brien area, Starnes said.

"We needed it really bad," she said. "Some

Floydada's Christopher Sanchez, 28, was found shot outside the residence of Plainview's Sacarias Dee Pena III early Friday morning, Nov. 21.

Sanchez was taken to Covenant Hospital in Plainview where he was pronounced dead.

to Lubbock's Montford Unit. Officials say Pena has been charged with homicide and his

bail is set at \$100,000. According to officials, the case is still under investigation by the Plainview Police Department.

Lockney ISD retrofitting lights on two campuses

The Lockney ISD Board of Trustees accepted a bid from Digital Air Control to retrofit lights in the junior high and high school campuses during their regular session on Thursday, Nov. 20. The bid for the job was

Superintendent Phil Cotham stated, "We have saved 25 percent on our monthly electric bill at the elementary school with retrofitted lights. I have no reason to think the same won't happen at the other campuses." Cotham expects the job to pay

for itself in about six years. The board also voted to purchase a Blue Bird 47 passenger bus through a purchasing coop-

erative. Cotham said the bus would be used as an activity bus for its

first several years of service. The cost to the district for the bus is \$72,115.

Cotham also reported on the finances of the district. \$370,497 in taxes was collected during

the month of October, which accounts for 38 percent of the budgeted amount. \$129,000 was added to the fund balance after the 2007-2008 school year ended. The Lockney ISD fund balance is currently \$3,669,793.

High school and junior high librarian, Kathy Young, gave a presentation on the new senior period she is overseeing this year. Students are preparing for ACT/SAT exams, applying for college entrance, filling out scholarship forms, taking Accu-placer tests, and completing other tasks that will help in the transition from high school to college.

Cotham informed the board: "Mrs. Young does an outstanding job with our seniors and her work on this project will pay big dividends."

The board approved policy updates that resulted in changes from the past legislative session. They also approved a longrange technology plan, as well the disposal of a 1985 Dodge Diplomat.



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

"We don't get it all out. On certain cotton we just can't get it all out, but we think we can help a lot."

The amount of foliage that shows up as trash in the cotton is also a challenge to ginners -- "more of a problem this year," Foster said, citing re-growth after the first freeze.

It's another reason Foster is taking greater pains with this year's cotton.

So far, D&J has ginned 1-1,000 bales this year. Foster expects not to process as much cotton as last year.

"More people have planted grain crops -- corn and milo and wheat," he said.

Prices for grain -- exceptionally good the last two years -- have cut into cotton acreage. Currently prices for all commodities have fallen, albeit not as dramatically as the stock market.

At the Darty Gin in Dougherty, the outlook is for an average

"Last year was our record year -- 27,000-plus (bales), I think," said Donna Pernell, matriarch of the family that owns the gin. "This will be average. It could be a little above."

Ginning is about half done,

Pernell said. A veteran of the business, Pernell has worked at the gin 50 years -- roughly since the beginning of mechanized harvesting.

Her father, the late R. D. Holly, started the family enterprise. Now her sons, Rick Pernell and Randy Pernell, and a grandson, Rance Pernell, are in the business

"My dad started this," she said. "He bought (the gin) from a Mr. Newton. It was a few years before I went to work here."

Donna Pernell recalls when a vacuum sucked cotton from trailers. Nowadays, a feeder carries the modules into the gin.

Strippers have changed too. "You'd see strippers pulled by tractors," she said.

The strippers now moving across Floyd County fields -self-propelled machines much larger than their two-row tractorpulled predecessors -- are 85-percent through stripping, Donna Pernell said.

At the McCoy Gin in Floydada, Clay Lowrance, gin manager, estimated that stripping about one more week, barring bad weather.

Then it will be "just a matter of time, getting it all picked up and getting it all ginned," Lowrance said.

"I think we'll be real close to what we did last year," he said. If the bale count exceeds last

year's 20,960, it won't be by

much -- maybe by 300 to 500 bales, Lowrance said.

"We're probably 85 percent irrigated," he said. "What dry land I've gotten in has probably averaged a bale to the acre."

An early freeze toward the end of October blackened some unopened bolls, hurting the crop accordingly

"You're just stripping old hickory nuts," Lowrance said.

The bale count Monday morning at 7 a.m. was 8,923 at the McCoy Gin.

"We should be ginning up through Christmas," he said.

At the Scott Gin in Floydada, owned by John and Stacie Woelfel, the bale count Monday was at 11,500 -- almost the halfway mark.

"We're going to gin more than we did last year," said Stacie Woelfel

The Scott Gin bale count last year at the end of harvest was

At the Lockney Coop Gin, Monday's bale count was 10,584.

Other gins also serve Floyd County and neighboring coun-

The prominent buildings are symbols of an industry that is a mainstay of the local economy -a reason to be thankful at Thanksgiving and again at Christmas.

Cotton money traditionally puts Christmas spending money in the pockets of many people -- gin hands to farmers to local merchants.

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"We've already pretty well had two killing freezes," Hilburn said. "That's not an issue any more. Down off the Caprock, they needed that freeze."

At the Farmers Coop Gin in Floydada, expectations vary, but the staff and farmers agree it will be close to last year's crop in quantity -- 69,574 bales. At Lockney, this year's harvest is promising to be an average year, but the drop in the size of the crop is partly due to a drop in cotton acreage, based on markets for other commodities at the time planting decisions were




