Chapel Sets Holy Week Activities

Easter Holy Week activities will begin Thursday with services scheduled for Reese AFB Protestants and Catholics through Easter Sunday.

Catholics will hold first communion Mass Thursday at 6 p.m. in the base chapel. Protestants will observe Maundy Thursday at 7:30 p.m. with a Holy Communion Service of Worship.

On Good Friday (April 9), Protestants will hold a noon Service of Worship while Catholics will observe the day with a Liturgy Service at 3 p.m. followed by confessions between 4 and 5 p.m.

Catholics will begin the traditional

Easter Vigil at 7 p.m. Saturday with a Liturgy and Mass. Confessions will precede the ceremonies from 3:30 to 5 p.m. There will be no 5:30 p.m. Mass on that day.

Protestants will see Easter Sunday in with a Sunrise Service of Worship at 6:30 p.m. followed by breakfast in the Red Room of the NCO Open Mess. They will also conduct Services of Worship at 9 and 11 a.m. Catholics will celebrate Easter Sunday Masses at 10 a.m. and 12:15 p.m.

All Reese personnel are invited to attend any or all of these services.

N.D. and a 1942 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y. He is also a gradute of Air Command and Staff School, Maxwell AFB, Ala. (1948) and of the National War College, Washington, D.C. (1963).

During World War II, General Murphy served with the 9th Air Force in Europe and following the war was chief, Library Branch, Air Information Division, Headquarters, USAF at the Pentagon.

During the Korean war General Murphy served with the 5th Air Force in Korea and Japan and again between September 1957 to August 1960 after returning to the United States to serve at Goodfellow AFB, Tex., Luke AFB, Ariz., Perrin AFB and Randolph AFB, in Texas, and at O'Hare Field, Chicago.

In August 1960, General Murphy (then a colonel) was assigned to Ent AFB, Colo., and to Seymour Johnson AFB, N.C. In May 1965 he received his fourth assignment overseas as deputy commander, 2nd Air Division, Udorn Royal Thai AFB, Thailand at which assignment he received his first star.

In August 1966, General Murphy returned to the United States and was assigned to the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force as deputy director, Legislative Liaison, where he received his second star—on July 23, 1968. He was assigned to his present job in July 1970

Among the general's many decora-

tions and service awards are the Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star, Legion of Merit with two Oak Leaf Clusters, the Distinguished Flying Cross with three Oak Leaf Clusters, the Air Medal with 38 Oak Leaf Clusters, Air Force Commendation Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Presidential Unit Citation Emblem with three Oak Leaf Clusters and a number of others including the Criox de Guerre (France) and Belgian Fourragere.

General and Mrs. Murphy, the former Jane Atkins, have two sons, John and Francis, both serving with the U. S. Marine Corps.

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


"Money" - An Area That Concerns Everybody

ANSWER: The Pap Smear is one of the only major advances in the treatment of cancer which has been developed over the past 30 years. Its use alone in the United States has prevented some 10,000 needless deaths from cancer each year. Since the most difficult part of getting a Pap Smear done is to get the patient to come to see the doctor, the Air Force has decided, and wisely so, that an excellent opportunity exists for a yearly check-up which includes a Pap Smear, at the same time birth control pills are given out. It is for this reason that we follow this Air Force policy at Reese AFB and strongly approve of it.




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Youth Center Sets Easter Egg Hunt

WAPS 'No Show' Bite Now Extends To Data Verification

Local personnel officials recently received a promotion policy announcement on the Weighted Airman Promotion System (WAPS) which provides for nonrecommendation for promotion of airmen who failed to show for WAPS testing or review of their promotion or verification record.

The announcement came from the USAF Military Personnel Center, Randolph AFB, Tex. and the provisions in it become effective with the 72B promotion cycle to sergeant (E-4) which begins testing this month.

Under the announced policy Consolidated Base Personnel Offices will be required to notify commanders on a daily basis of the names of airmen who are scheduled for data verification who fail to report as scheduled. Daily notification of testing "no shows" is already required.

Crackdown On Vehicles Told

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
Once an airman is reported as a "no show", his commander must determine why he failed to meet the established scheduled date. If the airman has a valid reason such as being medically excused, on emergency leave, on temporary duty or other cogent reasons, the commander will take action to have him rescheduled for testing or review of his verification record. However, if the airman has no valid reason for failing to meet the appointed date, the commander will take action to declare the airman ineligible for promotion.
