

## June Promotions Add Sleeve Heft For 55 Reesites

Fifty-five Reesites advanced in grade Tuesday as a result of the latest Air Force promotion increments announced by local personnel officials.

Included among those hikes were two to senior master sergeant, one to master sergeant, one to technical sergeant, three to staff sergeant, 25 to sergeant and 23 to airman first class. The promotions to staff sergeant were the first under the 72A cycle under the Weighted Airman Promotion System. Selectees for that cycle were announced by personnel officials May 28 and their names are listed in an accompanying article on this page.

Air Force-wide a total of 16,669 airmen were promoted to grades sergeant through chief master sergeant. Selections were made from previously announced central lists. The breakdown of the promotions was: 151 to chief, 376 to senior master sergeant, 619 to master sergeant, 1,012 to technical sergeant, 2,849 to staff sergeant and 11,662 to sergeant.

## E-5 Selection List Revealed

As "bench warmers" now, we American Fighting Men owe it to our prisoners of war (PWs) or missing-in-action (MIA) comrades-in-arms to see that we do all in our power to influence Hanoi to give them humane treatment. Both Hanoi and our government signed the Geneva Convention.

Nearly 500 of our teammates have been captured. They are faced with a situation more difficult than any prisoner of war has ever encountered, because the Hanoi regime is violating all the rules regarding PWs. Just think for a moment of the untold suffering that is borne by the prisoners, and their worried families.

Perhaps even more tragic is the plight of the more than 1,000 men listed as MIA. Again, it's because Hanoi

doesn't honor its signature to the Geneva Convention. Some of the men have been captured or missing for six years, longer than any American has been held in any war. Their families don't know if they are living or dead, because Hanoi won't say.

Although disarmed, they must continue to fight with their minds and spirit. They must never be lulled into the spirit that they are out of the fight and that their only problem is to survive until they can be repatriated. They must remain faithful to their fellow PWs. In so doing with an united front they beat back an enemy offensive. Also, they maintain their own personal integrity and protect the good name of our country.

Do all you can, as an individual or as a group, to aid the plight of our teammates. It's the least you can do for the ultimate victory of our team. Make sure you can look them in the eye when they return. Start your personal letter writing campaign today. (ATCPS)

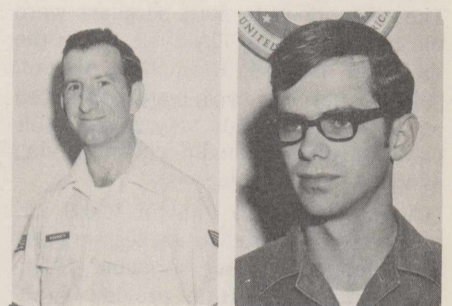

# Superior Performance Pay To Help Project Volunteer

The Air Force has made still another move to improve the lot of airmen in its continuing quest for augmentation of its master plan to provide a draft free environment for the Air Force by next year.

On July 1, 1971, the Air Force will implement a centralized Superior Performance Proficiency Pay program (SPPP) designed to encourage and reward superior duty performance in specialities not designated for award of another type of proficiency pay. It is also expected to improve the quality of work performed by airmen and provide a stimulus for retention.

To qualify, airmen must demonstrate superior performance during the period preceding the eligibility cut-off date. By the same token, eligibility will be lost at any time performance or conduct becomes substandard.

All selections for SPPP will be made at the USAF Military Personnel Center at Randolph AFB, Tex. The first selections have already been made for grade E-4 (they were scheduled to be

made June 1-4). The names of those selected for the initial payment period (from July 1 to Dec. 31, 1971) will be mailed to major commands and Consolidated Base Personnel Offices by next Thursday. The local CBPO and unit commanders will verify the lists and order effecting payment of SPPP issued and forwarded to Accounting and Finance. These payments for SPP for grades E-3 through E-6 will be \$30 a month for six months and for grades E-7 through E-9 at the rate of \$30 a month for 12 months.

To be eligible for SPPP, an airman must be serving in grade E-3 or higher, have 21 months or more of service, have demonstrated superior performance in the speciality in which serving for a minimum of six months, not be receiving another type of propay, have a mean of eight or above on his last three APRs, and be eligible for promotion to the next higher grade.

Selection for SPPP for grades E-3 through E-6 will be conducted twice a year for each grade at Headquarters, USAF in conjunction with the Weighted Airman Promotion cycle. Per-

sonnel data elements will be collected, validated, processed and converted to weighted factor scores for selection purposes. The weights and factors used in SPPP are:

- Airmen Performance Report— 70 per cent
- Specialty Knowledge Test— 20 per cent
- Promotion Fitness Exam— 10 per cent

Airmen will be sequenced for AFSC within each grade based upon their total score. An SPPP quota will then be applied to each AFSC to identify airmen for award of SPPP.

The selection for SPPP for grades E-7 and E-8 will be conducted once a year in conjunction with evaluation for promotion to E-8 and E-9. The selection for SPPP for E-9 will be conducted once a year through a specially convened selection board. In both cases at Headquarters, USAF and by using promotion priority lists by AFSC to serve as the priority lists for SPPP.

QUESTION: What is the Air Force leave policy?

ANSWER: Military members on active duty accrue 30 days of leave each fiscal year. Ordinary leave is granted at the request of the member within the limit of leave he has accrued or will accrue during the fiscal year, provided military commitments will allow his absence from duty. Leave is to be taken annually, as it accrues; however, the law provides that members

may accrue up to 60 days. Amounts over 60 days are administratively dropped at the end of the fiscal year or upon separation or retirement. Members are also authorized emergency leave, the extent of which is not limited to the amount of leave accrued; he may be granted leave in advance. Emergency leave requests are normally verified through the American Red Cross, and the Government provides transportation where a Military Airlift Command channel exists.

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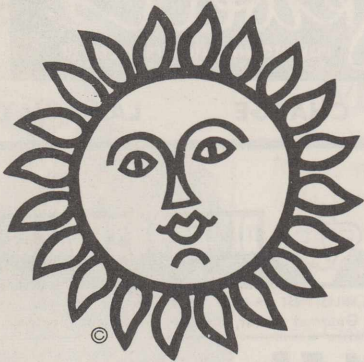
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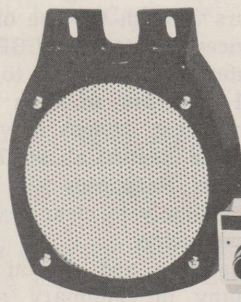
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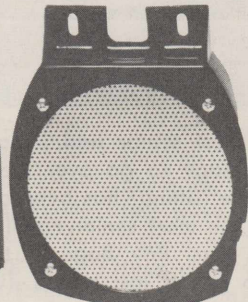


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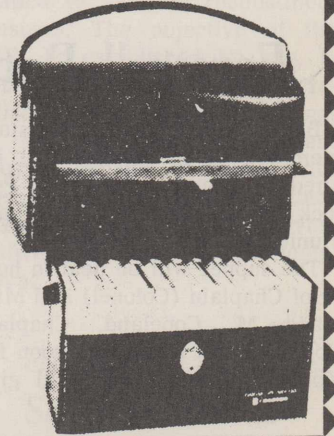
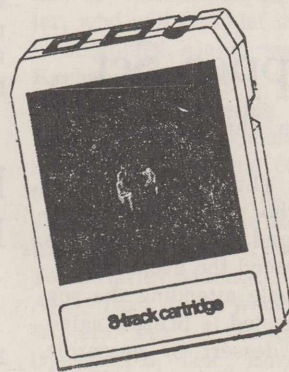
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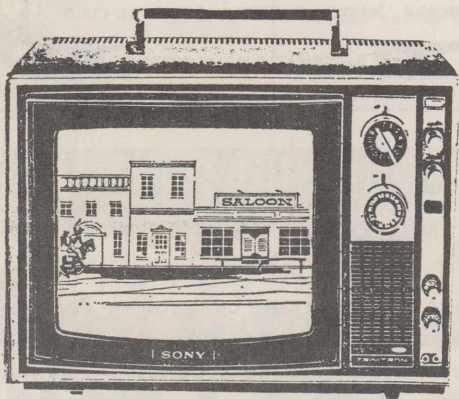
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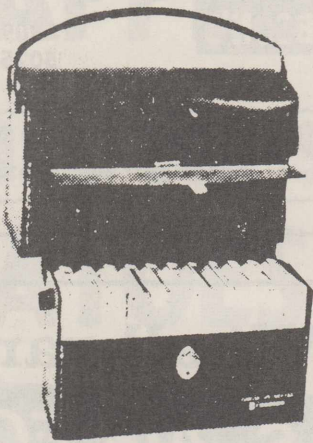


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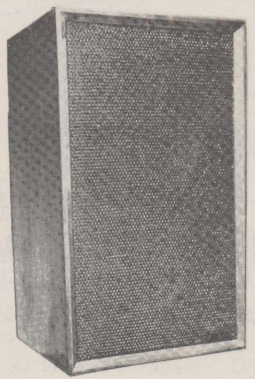
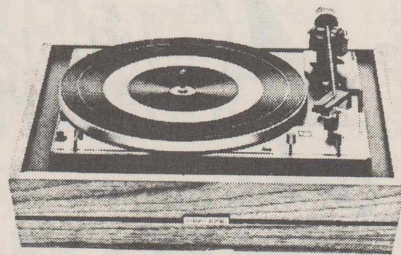
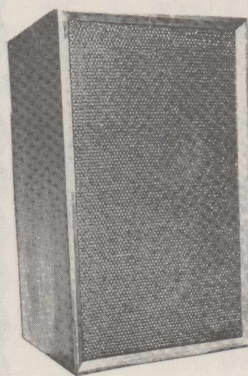

## Personnel Division Completes BLMPS In-House Training

The first step towards implementation of the Base Level Military Personnel System (BLMPS) was completed recently when all personnel in the Consolidated Base Personnel Office completed in-house training in the system.

BLMPS is a computer-supported system designed to improve the accuracy, responsiveness and usefulness of data required for personnel management. It is based on a central computer file of personnel data at base level and uses Air Force standard programs to process data, produce output products and suspense personnel actions.

Under the system records will be updated during normal duty hours through the use of remote devices located in CBPO work centers and connected to the central computer in Data Automation. These devices may also be used to inquire about individual records. Responses will be typed immediately in clear text on the same device.

Standard and special reports, lengthy or summary screening inquiry results and other formatted products will be requested through the remote devices and produced by the Data Automation

computer on an overnight basis.

## VRB To Stop For Men With Long Service

Variable reenlistment bonuses for airmen with more than eight years of total active military service will end July 1, 1971.

This was the word received through a message from Headquarters, Air Training Command last week that states: "Effective July 1, 1971 airmen with more than eight years total active federal military service will not be entitled to variable reenlistment bonuses. The objective of the VRB, as established by law, is to induce first-term airmen to reenlist in critical skills. Accordingly, changing VRB entitlement rules to exclude personnel with more than eight years of total active Federal military service confirms the intent of VRB legislation."

commander, "Lieutenant Kyle C. Redwine".

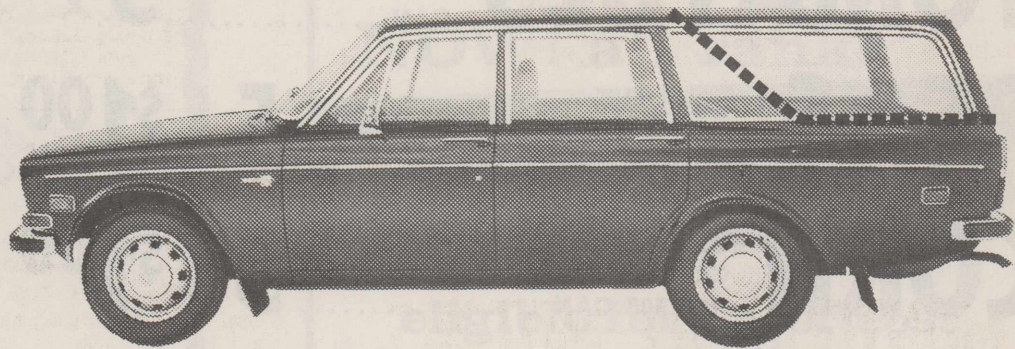

A shotgun start at 8 a.m. today kicked off the Reese AFB Partnership Golf Tournament with 64 teams competing for merchandise

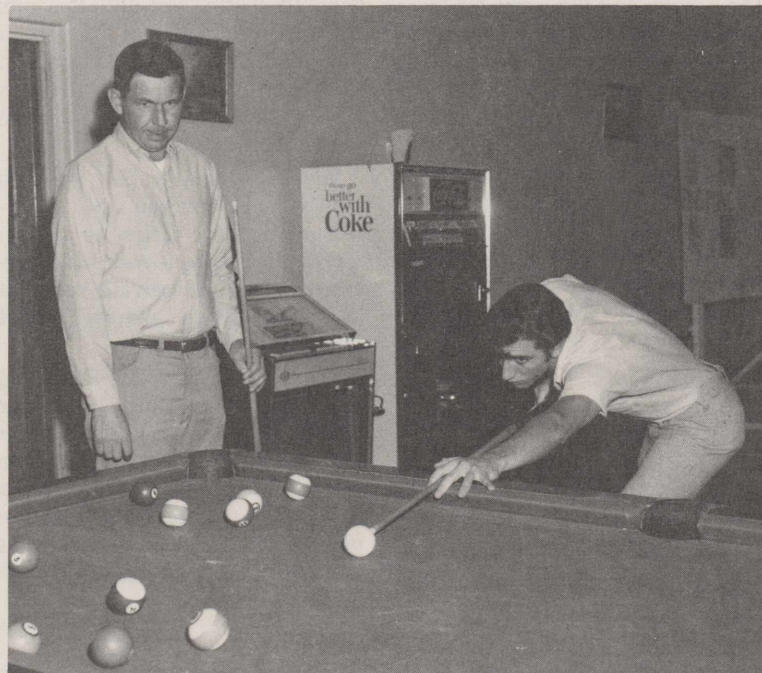
prizes totaling \$1,720 in four flights. Favored in the prestigious championship flight is the team of

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
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
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
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# Comedy, Drama Dominate Base Theater's Schedule

# Air Force Reenlistments Rise; Officer Voluntary Losses Drop

RANDOLPH AFB, Tex. (AFNS) —Fewer people are leaving the Air Force voluntarily, according to retention statistics released by the Air Force Military Personnel Center.

Figures covering the first nine months of fiscal year 1971 show a decrease in officer voluntary losses and an increase in first and second term airmen reenlistments.

Loss statistics on officers in their fourth to seventh year of active commissioned service, where Air Force experiences almost 90 per cent of its voluntary losses, show line officer voluntary departures down to 12 per cent from July 1 through March 31.

The rate is 4 per cent lower than the same period a year ago. If the trend continues through the final quarter of FY 1971 the annual loss rate will be at its lowest level since 1968 when 16 per cent accepted voluntary outs.

Reenlistment rates among first

and second term airmen have been on the upswing since bottoming out at 15 and 60 per cent, respectively, in 1969.

The 18 per cent first-term rate through the first three quarters was 2 per cent better than the 1970 annual rate.

Second term rates were up to 70 per cent, a 6 per cent climb over FY 70. The Military Personnel Center's motivation and retention people are predicting the highest second term annual reenlistment rate since 1968 when it was 68 per cent.

Most revealing of the FY 1971 figures is in the nonrated officer category. As of March 31, only 14 per cent of the nonrated force had voluntarily exited, a sharp drop from the FY 70 rate of 21 per cent on the same date.

Pilot losses were down to 8 per cent as of March 31. The pilot rate was 10 per cent on March 31, 1970. Navigator loss rate on March 31 of both fiscal years was 9 per cent.

Voluntary loss rates totaled 20 per cent for FY 1970. Thirteen per cent of the pilot force, 13 per cent of the navigators and 25 per cent of Air Force's nonrated officers voluntarily left the service last year.
