Reese hosts area seniors tomorrow

Travel in civies okay

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Transportation officials said that seven airlines now allow service members to travel at reduced fares in civilian clothes without a DD Form 1580. must display their ID card or official separation orders upon request at any point en route.

These rules, according to Air Force transportation officials, apply only when

Active-duty military passengers now may buy a reduced fare ticket by presenting their identification cards. Passengers, however, must sign a statement that they are on authorized leave; or have been separated and will be traveling within seven days of separation.

Military passengers, however, whether or not traveling in uniform, traveling with United Airlines, Pan American, Southern Airways, Trans World Airlines, Northwest Airlines, American Airlines and Western Airlines.

Other airlines, according to officials, are not bound to this policy. They may require a copy of a DD Form 1580 or a copy of official leave or separation orders and wear of the uniform.

States involved are Alabama, Arkansas, Indiana, Kentucky, Maryland, Michigan, Nebraska, North Carolina, Ohio, Oregon, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Texas and West Virginia.

Base voting officers have Federal Post Card Applications which may be used to request a ballot. Local voting officers also have additional information.

Perhaps the most pleasant discovery since my arrival at Reese AFB last year has been the outstanding community relations that exist between the base and the nearby civilian communities.

As many of you know, this excellent rapport between base and civilian community does not exist everywhere. Without being specific, some areas in which the civilian community and a military base co-exist, the atmosphere is unfriendly—sometimes hostile—with the serviceman all too often bearing the brunt of its manifestation.

Fortunately for all of us this situation does not exist in Lubbock or elsewhere across the South Plains where many of our people live and spend their off-duty hours. We find, instead, a degree of acceptance within these communities through which Reese personnel can feel as close to home as possible without actually being there. Certainly, for us at least, the stories of West Texas hospitality and friendship are a reality that we experience daily.

This hospitality and friendship is not an accident. It comes historically from original settlers to this part of the country and has been passed down from generation to generation to the point that it is a way of life. By the same token, Reesites have responded to this hospitality and friendship in many positive ways. They have joined in community, social, civic and church related acitvities. They have met appeals from these communities in the most public-spirited manner.

The most obvious of these, of course, is the splendid way in which Reesites rise to the occasion during the annual Combined Federal Campaign. This drive raises funds to support the agencies of the Lubbock County United Fund, among which are our Air Force Aid Society, Boy and Girl Scouts and other youth programs. Even more tangible is the assistance rendered during disasters—such as the May 11, 1970 tornado that ripped through Lubbock.

There is still another way in which Reesites help, and while it is not as quantitative or dramatic. it adds as much-if not more-through the steady. systematic building of a superior community relations program for the base. That is the participation in civic, social, church and community activities in this area. Many times I hear from civilians downtown, "Do you know-? He is a member of our church and one of our hardest workers." Similarly, we have many dedicated people working in the areas of the Scouts, YMCA, health clinics, in depressed areas, through school groups, the PTA and others, too numerous to mention. All of this has helped weld a bond between Reese people and the people of West Texas—a bond that makes it enjoyable to live here and consequently, makes our jobs easier.

To those Reesites currently involved in projects such as these, you have the thanks and appreciation of all for your efforts. To those who are still bystanders, I urge that you get involved in an area that interests you. Let your efforts be added to the other workers' in order that we might maintain these excellent community relations in the years to come.



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Customs defined by reg

HQ. ATC-"All Air Force personnel in uniform will salute anyone they recognize who is entitled to the salute or to the return of a salute. This applies both on and off military installations."

The above is in Air Force Regulation 30-1. Saluting is a military custom. All formally organized military organizations in the world have this custom.

For Air Force members, AFR 50-14 describes the method, when and how salutes will be exchanged.

It is also a custom to salute officers of friendly foreign nations when recognized as such. Commanders will clearly spell out any local exceptions to the rules, according to AFR 30-1.

Except for formal reporting, salutes are not required indoors. The manual also includes procedures for saluting the United States Flag, salutes by the Air Force flag, saluting when the "National Anthem" or "To The Colors" is played, and actions to be taken during Army and Navy gun salutes.

Other Air Force customs are the use of titles and the Chain of Command. According to the regulation, military persons are addressed properly by their grade. Officers are addressed by their grade or by the appellation

(name, title or designation) "Sir/Ma'am," medical and dental officers as "Doctor," and Chaplains as "Chaplain." Enlisted men in the junior as "Airman" and the senior six grades as "Sergeant."

The average relative humidity will edge higher from 45 per cent to 49 per cent although the average expected precipitation will inThe increase will be partly due to an increase in thunderstorm activity. May and June mark the high points in the thunderstorm season with an average of seven days each month.

The number of days with visibility under five miles will increase to an average of 9.73 days. The record all-time high for the month of May is 104 degrees while the record low is +30degrees.

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




In softball action for the week- a 14-8 ballgame. Danny Benson came back to the lineup for the come Webb's hitting attack and finally yielded to a score of 7-2.




