

# Voting "action line"...phone 2329

Got a question about voting? Pick up the phone and dial Ext. 2329.

Am I eligible to vote in the Presidential election? When to register? Where to register? How? Who are the candidates in my state? Is my one vote really worth all the trouble?

Find quick answers to all your questions through the recently established voting "ACTION LINE" at Reese. The "ACTION LINE" was designed to assist all personnel by giving them direct access to the Wing Voting Officer, Capt. Allan N. Bredenberg.

The phone is manned during normal duty hours Monday through Friday. At night and on weekends the voting "ACTION LINE" features an automatic answering service to accept calls and record incoming messages of 30 seconds each. Callers should be prepared when using the automatic answering device to give their name, telephone number and a concise statement of their voting problem.

"Callers can expect prompt attention to all queries," Captain Bredenberg promised, "Assistance will be given for information on registration and ballot request procedures, special assistance involving coordination with an individual state, or any special problem

or question an individual may have."

Each unit at Reese has appointed a Unit Voting Officer and a minimum of one Voting Counselor for each 25 personnel assigned. According to Captain Bredenberg each individual should be issued, in-hand, a Federal Post Card Application for Absentee Ballot (Standard Form 76) and personally counseled by a Voting Counselor concerning the specific requirements for application for an absentee ballot in his own state.

The voting "ACTION LINE" is designed to supplement the Unit Voting Officer/Voting Counselor system by giving individuals an additional line of communication and provide voting information for the Nov. 7 election.

Captain Bredenberg concluded, "The goals of the voting program at Reese are to encourage everyone to register and vote; that those who do not vote, do not vote by personal choice; and that no one on this base is deprived of the opportunity to vote because he does not know how to submit his request for an absentee ballot."

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# frame of reference

*"You and your people know better than anyone*

*else the quality of the work that you do."*

Too often Air Force participation in a civic event seems to go unnoticed or without the so-called "credit" that participation deserves.

On June 24 Reese was called upon to perform a flyover of Northrop T-38 Talon aircraft to open the Coaches All America Football game being played in Jones Stadium in Lubbock. Because of its timing, it barely missed being televised nationally through the facilities of the American Broadcasting Company (ABC) which carried the game live. There was, of course, some disappointment by those who participated and by the others who had made such participation possible.

However, a letter received in late July from William D. Murray, executive director of the American Football Coaches Association, which sponsors the game, gives us a keen insight as to just what it's all about. The letter reads:

"Just this note to tell you how much the American Football Coaches Association, with its 4,200 members, appreciates the participation of your pilot training wing during our All American Football Game on the night of June 24th.

**"YOU AND YOUR PEOPLE KNOW BETTER THAN ANYONE ELSE THE QUALITY OF THE WORK THAT YOU DO AND YOU ALSO PERHAPS KNOW BETTER THAN ANYONE THAT THE WORK OF YOUR MEN IS NOT ALWAYS FULLY APPRECIATED.**

"Let me say that those of us in the coaching profession not only appreciate the fine aerial display at our game but also the great work that is constantly done by members of the United States Air Force."

The thought expressed by Mr. Murray in the above capitalized paragraph hits the nail squarely on the head. We DO know better than anyone else the quality of our work, and, while we realize this work is not always fully appreciated, we must continue to maintain and even improve on the quality of that work.

While Mr. Murray's letter mentioned the flyover specifically, it is plain that he includes those who worked so hard to make the flyover possible—the crew chiefs, maintenance and operation personnel and the administrative support given it. Let's not forget, too, the outstanding work turned in by the color guard provided by Reese and those who worked in support of it.

This quality of work was never so evident than on the night of June 24.

## Triad--strategic mixed-force defense concept

HQ. ATC—The importance of the B-1 bombers is described in a governmental pamphlet titled "What you should know about Triad."

The manned bomber poses an entirely different problem to enemy defenses than the missile and can be deployed in a variety of ways.

Advantages are:

- \*Launched without final commitment.
- \*Recallable.
- \*Rerouted en route.
- \*Strike multitargets with a variety of weapons.
- \*Reusable.
- \*Usable in different levels of conflict.

Bombers are an important element to both the United States and the U.S.S.R. The pamphlet indicates that the U.S. has about 400 Boeing B-52 Stratofortress bombers, plus the FB-111 inventory. The U.S.S.R. has about 150 long-range and 700 medium-range bombers.

According to the July 15, Air Force letter for Commanders, the Soviets are developing a new bomber, "Backfire." It is a supersonic, swing-wing bomber larger than the FB-111. "The addition of this subsonic cruise/supersonic dash aircraft to the heavy bomber fleet of the Soviet Long Range Aviation will pose a substantial threat to the United States."

Should the B-1, an intercontinental jet bomber in the development stage, be approved for production, it could be operational by the late 1970's.

In a news conference at the White House on 29 June, one newsman questioned the President on the need of the B-1 bomber. The President's reply: "Each power, the Soviet Union and the United States, must have those forces that are needed for its own security. We basically are not only a land power but a land and sea power. The Soviet Union is primarily a land power with certain definite requirements; having that in mind, we believe that the B-1 bomber is, for our security interest, necessary."

Triad, of which the manned bomber is a vital part, compounds an enemy's defense problems and causes an enemy to spend more and divert resources that might otherwise be spent on offensive systems. The Triad concept also provides assurance that compromise of one element won't negate our other strategic capability to inflict a very high and unacceptable level of damage upon an enemy.

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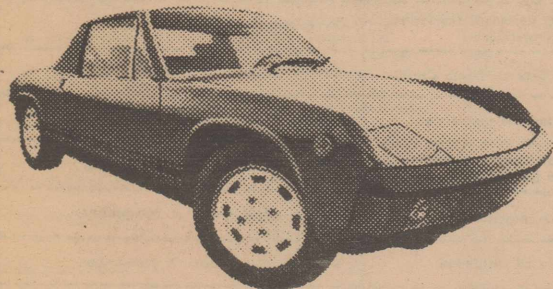

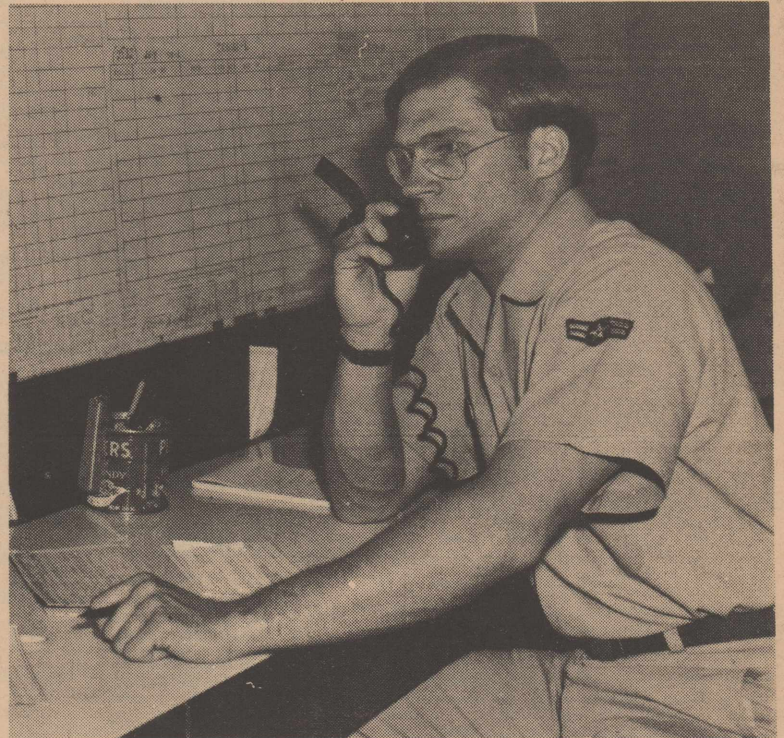

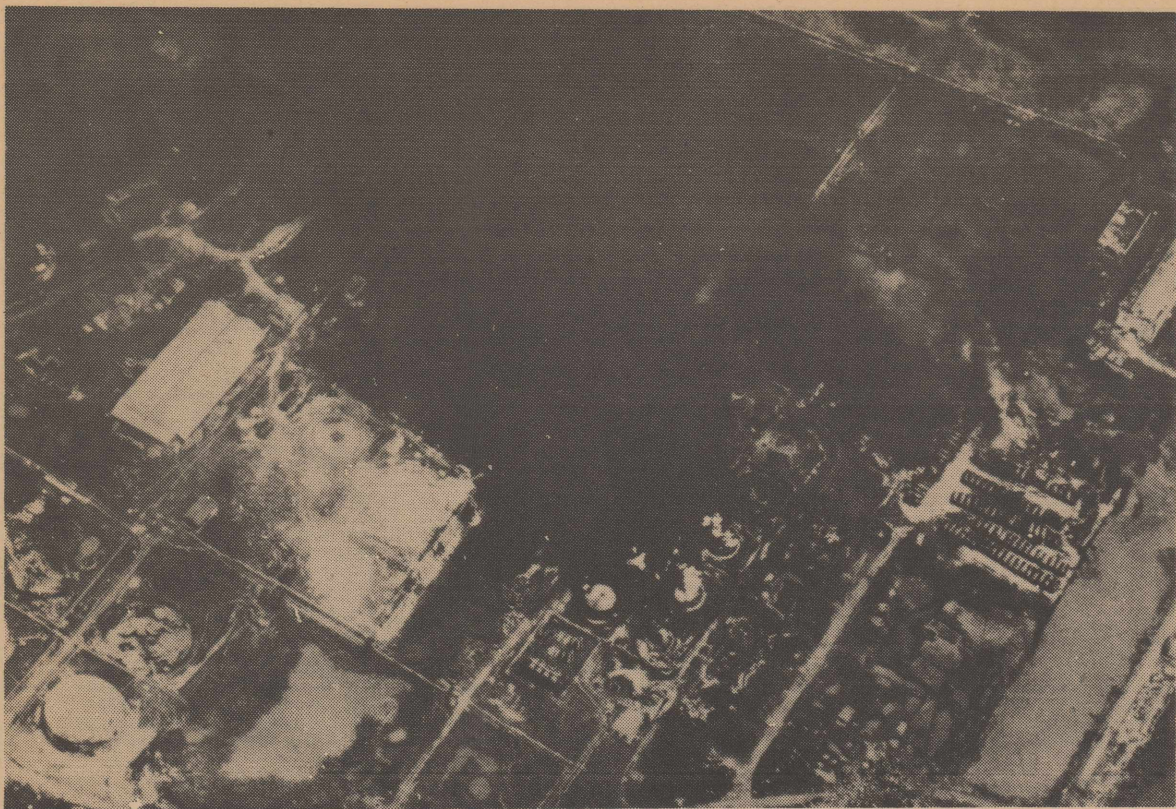

consecutive overseas tour assignment process works for overseas returnees. The film outlines the way return assignments are made and explains why, showing examples of the process.

Explained in the film is the fact that CONUS and consecutive overseas tour assignments for overseas returnees are based on major command requirements. Requirements are based on the world-wide manning level in each AFSC. In many cases, the world-wide manning level is less than 100 per cent of the total Air Force authorizations for an AFSC. Thus, return assignments depend, not on a base's vacancies or unmanned authorizations, but on a major command's and subsequently a base's, "fair share" of the returnees as relates to the world-wide manning level.

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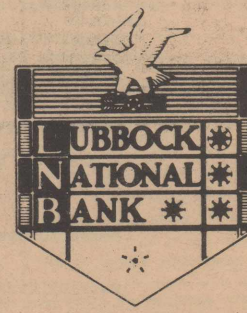
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# Drug abuse draws stiff punishment overseas

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"Coca-Cola" and "Coke" are registered trademarks which identify the same product of The Coca-Cola Company.

An Air Force sergeant from Ching Chuan Kang AB, Taiwan, was recently given a 12-year prison sentence for selling heroin.

Under Chinese law he could have been executed.

An airman in Turkey received two and one-half years in prison for possession of illegal drugs with intent to use. He could have received five years under Turkish law.

An airman in Greece received four years for importing, selling, and possessing illegal drugs. Maximum penalty in Greece for these offenses is 20 years; under some circumstances, life imprisonment.

Three airmen in England were given seven-year terms for possession of and conspiracy to sell illegal drugs. The maximum penalty is 10 years.

The point is, your Air Force uniform can give you little protection if you are convicted of drug abuse in a foreign country. Under status of forces

agreements between the United States and foreign countries, involvement with narcotics is a recallable offense, meaning the United States must waive its jurisdiction, and military members may have to stand trial under the host country's judicial system.

Under North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) agreements, the host nation has the right to either retain or recall jurisdiction in drug abuse cases.

In most non-NATO agreements, the host nation has exclusive jurisdiction to dispose of all offenders. U.S. civilians and military members may assume that following apprehension for a drug offense they may be prosecuted by the host country. When this happens, personal rights, privileges or guarantees following apprehension are not those guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution but those guaranteed by the laws of the country in which apprehended.

Penalties for conviction of drug abuse vary widely throughout the world. Many would be considered quite harsh by U.S. standards. Conditions in many foreign prisons are primitive at best. In some countries prisoners must rely on the charity of friends for food and clothing. Imprisonment means being confined to a cell—no matter how long the sentence.

In Taiwan, Thailand and Turkey you can receive the death penalty for some drug offenses. Importing drugs into Japan, the Republic of the Philippines, Taiwan, Greece, and Turkey can also bring you life imprisonment.

In the Netherlands, where possession carries a penalty of four years, trial judges are vested with absolute discretion in determining guilt or innocence. Appeals are virtually nonexistent.

Make sure your view of another country isn't obscured by prison bars. (AFNS)



## Scrambler tourney set for Labor Day

The Reese AFB golf course will hold a Labor Day Scrambler Golf Tournament Sept. 4 open to all Reese golfers and their guests.

Entry fee for the 18-hole, one-day event will be \$5 per team with 100 per cent of the prize money returned to the winners. First place will pay 50 per cent, second place 30 per cent and third place 20 per cent.

Teams may be made up of member-member or member-guest with half handicaps used. For instance, a player with a 4 handicap teamed with a 6 handicapper will receive half of the lower (4) handicap for a total of 2 strokes-one on hole number 4 and the other on 13. Where the handicap splits to half-strokes (i.e. 2½, 3½, etc.) the half stroke will be removed (i.e. 2, 3 etc.)

Both team members will tee off and the best drive selected. From that point (of the best drive) both players will hit their respective shots and the best of that selected and the method

repeated until the ball is holed out - even on the putting green. The decision on which ball to play must be made immediately and once the other ball is picked up, the selected shot must be played.

In other words, if both players hit a bad shot they cannot go back and play the shot they rejected before hitting the selected ball. Once a shot is selected, both players will hit from the same spot as near as possible but will not be required to hit out of his partner's divot. Winter rules will be in effect. Where a shot is to be played in the rough, the original ball will be hit as it lies and the second dropped as close to that spot as possible (re-dropping if the ball goes into a divot or animal hole).
