He was honored twice in 1972 at Reese as NCO of the Quarter for January through March 1972 and as Wing NCO of the Year for 1972.

A graduate of the NCO Academy, the sergeant's duties also include acting as Security Police on-scene commander during Broken Arrow exercises and actual or simulated aircraft accidents. Commander's Commendation

In nominating Sergeant Willis for the Command award, Colonel Baxter stated, "He is one of the most outstanding Security Police noncommissioned officers I have had the pleasure to have in my command. His bearing, demeanor and performance of duty would make him an asset to any Security Police unit in the Air Force."




20-Year Awards



He is married to the former Miss Brigid A. Lenihan of Le Mars, Iowa. They presently reside in Lubbock.





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
