Graduation day arrives for Class 73-09

Forty-seven students of Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT) Class 73-09 will receive their pilot rating and accompanying wings in graduation ceremonies today at 10 a.m. in the base chapel.

Scheduled to receive the Commander's Cup is graduating 2nd Lt. Peter J. Bein. Named as Outstanding Graduates were 1st Lt. John M. Severski and Second Lieutenants Bein, Edwin M. Dayton, Calvin L. Staker and Peter V. Voor-

hees. Lieutenant Severski will also be honored as an Academic Ace and will be presented the Academic and Leadership Awards. Lieutenant Voorhees is scheduled to receive the Flying Award. The Citizenship Award will be presented to 2nd Lt. Hugh C. Cameron.

Guest speaker for the graduation will be Dr. Cothburn M. O'Neal, noted educator and author. This will mark the second time Dr. O'Neal has served as graduation speaker at Reese.

Dr. O'Neal receive his bachelor of arts degree from Trinity University in 1927, his master of arts in 1934 and Ph.D. in 1940, both from University of Texas in Austin. The doctor has recently retired from the faculty of the University of Texas at Arlington (UTA) where he has held various positions since 1938.

Naval Aviator

During World War II, Dr. O'Neal was a Naval aviator in the Pacific, and rose to the rank of lieutenant commander before returning to UTA in 1945. There he served as professor of English, twice as acting chairman of the Department of English. He headed the Department of Fine Arts from 1956 to 1960 and served two years as assistant to the president in the preparation of a self-study requirement university for accreditation.

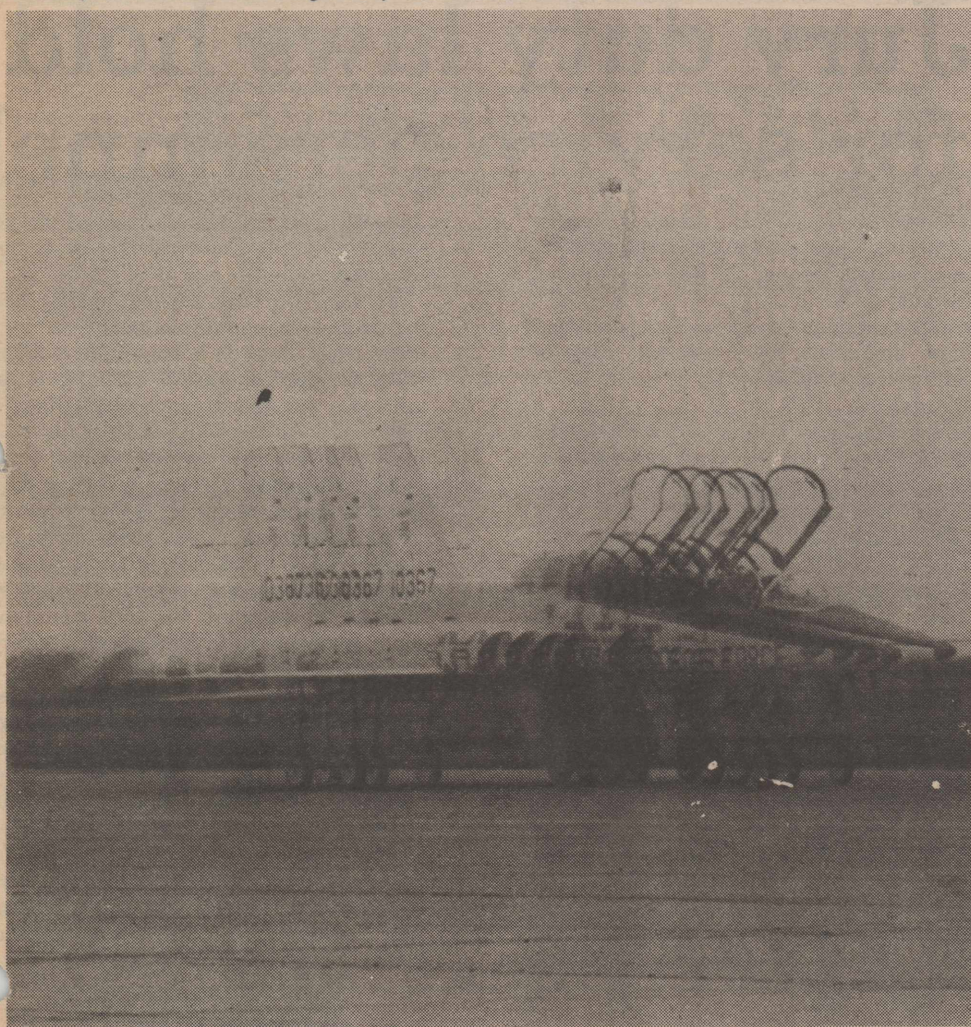
In addition to being a noted educator, Dr. O'Neal is the author of eight novels. He was elected to the Texas Institute of Letters in 1953 and is a member of the Authors Guild of America. He served as book critic for the Dallas Times Herald for several years. The doctor is listed in "Contemporary American Authors", "Who's Who in the Southwest", "Dictionary of International Biography" and the "Directory of American Scholars".

In 1966 he became the third UTA faculty member to be named one of the 10 most outstanding professors in Texas.

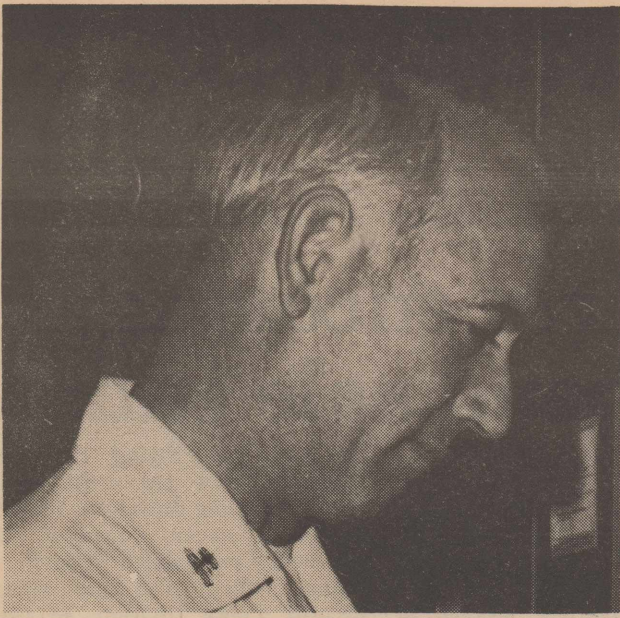

"It is an outstanding opportunity for a young man to learn while he continues to work"

Today, the opportunities for an individual to increase his educational level in the Air Force are unparalleled. Because of the complex and varied systems used in our Air Force, intelligent, educated people are a must. People are the key—our most important resource.

Each individual has a different core of experience from which to draw while learning his job. Recognizing this, the Air Force has made available many educational avenues for personnel to increase their chances for successful careers. We have many people-oriented programs, and the philosophy is attuned to educational advancement.

A special educational interest program in Air Training Command is the Career Advancement Program (CAP). People are identified through previous achievement scores (i.e., GED, WAPS, AQE General, AFQT, OJT) as eligible for entering the program; and when selected, your participation is mandatory. Others interested in the program may apply and will be considered for a CAP slot. A CAP Counselor is available for guidance. Arrangements have been made with South Plains

College to grant junior college terminal credit for those who pass a by-pass test on certain subjects. These by-pass tests will be administered when the program is completed.

Another built-in advantage of CAP is the civilian testing administered before the training starts. These tests include the Differential Aptitude Test (DAT) and the Kuder Vocational Choice Test. Counseling and "individualized programs" are key features of CAP. A learning center to facilitate programmed learning is being developed.

CAP is ATC's approach to using a Veteran's Administration funded PREP Program to replace the Air Force funded Group Study Program. The advantage of this service lies in the fact that it is a program for enhancing the ability to grow.

Both the student and the Air Force will have to work hard, for CAP requires 12½ to 18 duty hours each week for 12 weeks. It is an outstanding opportunity for a young man to learn while he continues to work.

I find it very gratifying to work for the USAF, for our mere presence influences world balance of power. To think that the USAF is still personalized enough to be concerned with its individuals is especially reassuring.

Jury duty laws hold for service personnel

Recently, an officer assigned to Air Training Command (ATC) Headquarters complained because he was subpoenaed for jury duty.

This complaint may not be an isolated case and could have resulted from an unawareness of the laws of the State of Texas.

To preclude future complaints, the ATC Staff Judge Advocate advises that all military personnel stationed in Texas who are subpoenaed for jury duty should honor it.

Until July 15, 1971, this was not the case. Military personnel stationed in Texas claimed and were granted exemptions from jury duty because of their active duty status with the Armed Forces of the United States. This was an extension of a statutory exception granted members of the Texas National Guard on active duty.

In 1971, the Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 369, amending the statutory exemptions from jury duties. Under the new statute, only two categories of persons are eligible for exemption from jury duty in the State of Texas: all

persons over 65 years of age, and all females having legal custody of minor children under the age of 10 years.

So far, the only exception that can be made is a postponement of the jury duty when there is a bona fide conflict with the performance of military duties and the scheduled jury duty. Such a circumstance must be certified by the individual's immediate commander.

In cases where military and jury duty conflict as determined by the appropriate commander, and relief from the state or local court authorities is denied, military personnel involved will be ordered to disregard the jury summons and perform their assigned military duties.

When this occurs, it will be reported to the major commander, and the Judge Advocate General will be advised. The Advocate General will be advised promptly about all the facts and circumstances in these cases.

The ATC Judge Advocate further reminds military members that active duty military service does not exempt us from our obligations as citizens of the United States. (ATCPS)

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—The Freedoms Foundation has announced that is 1973 letter-writing contest theme is "Human Goals—Values for Living." The program has been endorsed by Gen. John D. Ryan, Air Force Chief of Staff, who said, "This subject gives wide latitude for interpretation and participation in this year's competition."

The best letter-writers in the active-duty Armed Forces com-

petition and Reserve forces event will each win \$1,000 from the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, Pa. Additionally, the top 10 active-duty winners of the 1973 contest will be invited to Valley Forge to receive their awards at the annual presentation ceremony.

Military members and civilians are also encouraged to enter in other categories such as editorials, cartoons, essays, public addresses or sermons relating to the theme.

General Ryan said that base information offices will monitor the program and assist in every possible way to encourage maximum participation.

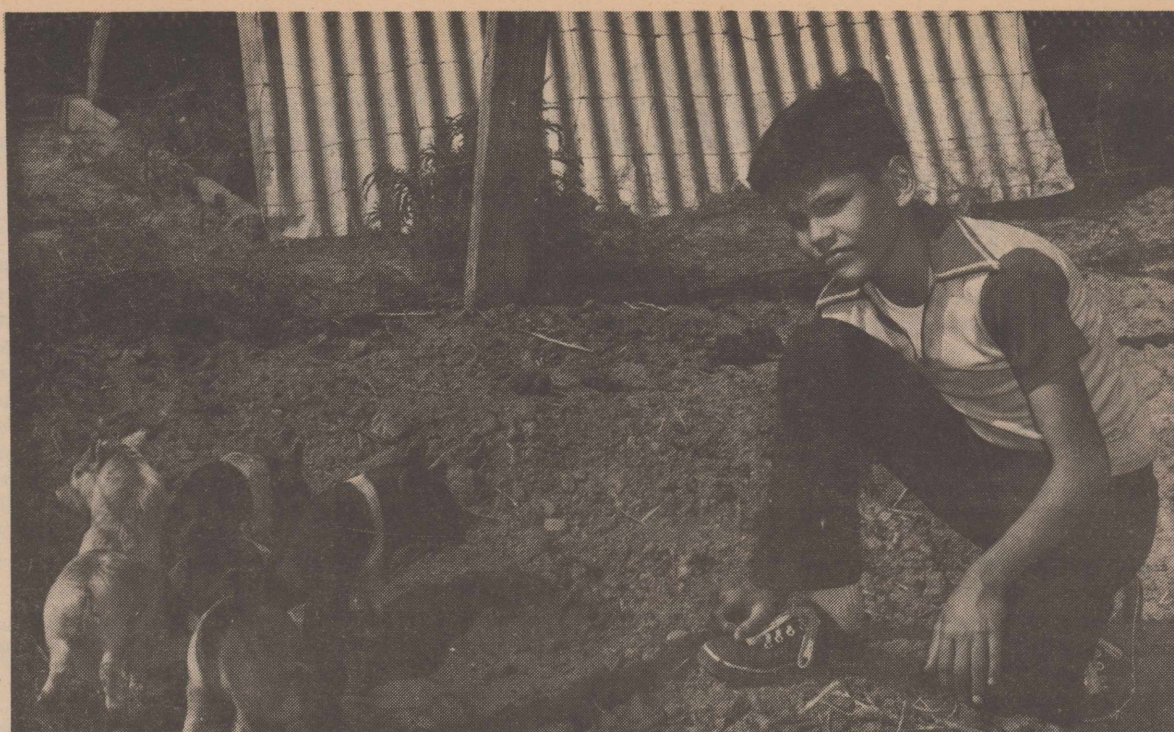

The Reese Youth Center has announced a number of programs coming up for youngsters at Reese.

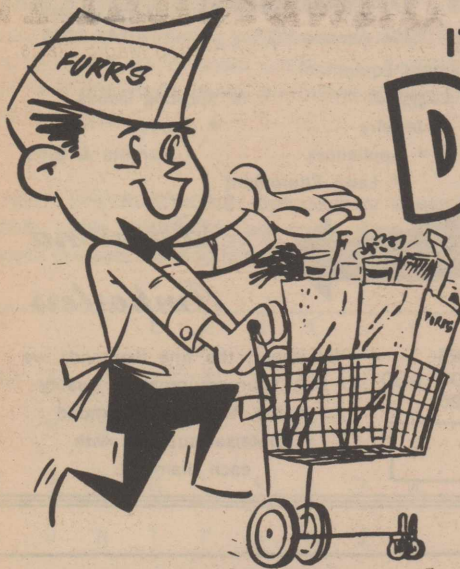

SOLVES SEWING PROBLEMS
How do you remedy a baggy seat in pants that are already made?
First, do not take up or make the crotch seam larger. If you do, it will make it larger not smaller. The crotch seam is just like an arm hole. If your pants are too tight or short in the crotch you make your line of stitching as shown in illustration #1.

In order to remove the fullness from the seat of the pants you must rip open the inseam (the one inside the leg) down to about the knee, then pin the front over on to the back of the leg—removing as much as you need to at the crotch seam—and tapering it to the knee (illus. #2), then restitch your seam. Now, place one pant leg inside the other and restitch your crotch seam.
