Pay Taxes Early Avoid Penalty

BAIRD — You are asked to read the Public Notice appearing in this issue concerning the penalty and interest that will be added to each 1971 past due or delinquent tax.

If you are retired, receiving social security benefits, or on a pension, you especially are reminded to read this notice so you will not be charged with this penalty.

This announcement comes from the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office. Due to Senate Bill 414, which was passed by the last session of the Texas Legislature, the law requires that \$1.00, in addition to any other penalty and interest that may be due on each 1971 past due of delinquent tax statement, issued after February 1, 1972. You can save this additional \$1.00 penalty by paying your taxes before February 1, 1972.

The office states that it is opposed to the additional penalty, but has no choice in the matter. You are also reminded that not any of this money is retained by Callahan County or the State of Texas. It goes to the Legislative Property Tax Committee, created by Senate Bill 414. This applies to state and county tax only.

NEW RECORD EXPECTED TO BE SET IN VOTER REGISTRATION

BAIRD — Albert Lovell, Callahan County Tax Assessor-Collector, announces that approximately 3,000 persons have registered for the upcoming elections to be held in this county in 1972. A new record is expected to be set for registered voters, since some 4,500 are expected to register.

The previous record was set in 1968 as 4,230 voters registered. In 1971, 3,771 registered to vote, which is a record for an off-year.

Each persons who registered to vote in Callahan County for 1971 was mailed a notice in October, and if you wish to register for the upcoming elections, these must be signed and returned to the tax office.

If a person did not register in 1971 and wishes to vote in 1972, he may register by going to the tax office or write for an application to register by mail.

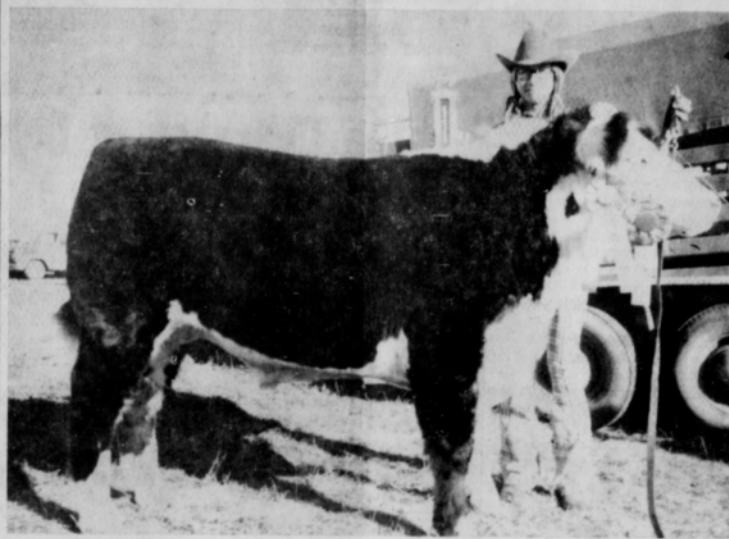
This year, 18 year olds may register to vote. The 1972 voting year begin March 1, 1972 and in order to be eligible to

vote on that date, a person must register or file his application not later than January 31, 1972.

For the first time this year, voter registration certificates are for permanent use. The only requirement is for the voter to vote in a primary or general election at least once in a 3-year period, beginning March 1, 1972. This will renew his registration for the succeeding three years. If a voter does not vote within this three year period, his registration is canceled.

Beginning February 1 after the close of the registration period provided for, the registration shall be conducted at all times, anytime the tax office is open for business. A registration on or after that date become effective on the 31st day following the registration. All persons who wish to vote are urged to register prior to February 1, 1972.

The people in the Clyde area may pick up an application for voters registration at the Peoples State Bank or Clyde City Hall.

Mrs. Frances Greenway, present school secretary, will be employed in the newly located office.

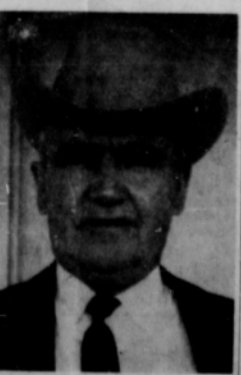
CECIL MINGS CANDIDATE FOR COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 1

CROSS PLAINS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DESTROYED BY FIRE

CROSS PLAINS — The Cross Plains Elementary School was completely destroyed by fire Wednesday night. Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Dept. was called to the school at 11 p.m. Wednesday night and continued to fight the blaze until early morning hours Thursday. Area fire department units joined in trying to save the school.

The fire department trucks were still on hand at 6 a.m. Thursday morning to keep the fire in check. The grade school students and faculty were conducting classes in local churches. The fire was not considered extent until other fires were discovered throughout the building. Fire fighting units from Cisco, Rising Star and Coleman joined the three units from Cross Plains in trying to prevent the blaze from destroying the school, but was unable to

save the building, which is reported to be a total loss. Reports on the cause of the fire is scarce at press time, however Fire Department officials and Callahan County law enforcement officials were investigating the possible cause, Thursday morning.

District five - Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble, McCulloch. District six - Stephens, Youngs, Clay, Jack, Palo Pinto, Burnet, Parker, Hood, Somervell, Eastland, Erath, Comanche, Hamilton, Bosque, Brown, Mills, Coryell, McLennan, San Saba, Lampasas and Bell.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Box 1486, San Angelo, Texas 76901 before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced sheep or goats for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches and their tenants and shareholders. If such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

AUSTIN — An interesting political poll was taken at the Gulf Coast Press Association's board of director's meeting in Houston January 8. Fourteen newspaper publishers were asked: "Who do you think will win the 1972 Governor's race in Texas?"

Seven said Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, four named Dolph Briscoe and two listed Gov. Preston Smith.

The same editors were asked about their vote.

Eleven voted for Dolph Briscoe, two for Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and one for Governor Smith.

SENATE CAMPAIGN — The 1972 political campaigns moved into full swing with announcement by former U. S. Sen. Ralph W. Yarborough that he would make a comeback try for a Senate seat.

Yarborough, 68, revealed his plans in a series of whirlwind news conferences at Austin, Houston, Dallas, Ft. Worth and

San Antonio. He seeks the Democratic nomination to oppose Republican Sen. John Tower. Barefoot Sanders of Dallas, already running for the Senate as a Democrat, welcomed one-time political ally Yarborough to the race as "one of our fine senior citizens." He said both Yarborough and Tower "are out of touch with the majority of Texans."

Yarborough said he had never had so successful a campaign opening day. He stressed his nearly 14 years' experience as a progressive senator, and said in answer to questions about his age: "I'll be around campaigning as long hours as anybody else, if not longer."

The former senator's entry took some of the spotlight away from the warming governors' race where Gov. Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Uvalde rancher Dolph Briscoe are starting to mix it up.

Treasurer Jesse James, Comp-

troller of Public Accounts Robert S. Calvert and Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White during the last week announced for re-election Calvert and James are expected to draw some opposition.

State Rep. Frances Parent-hold of Corpus Christi announcing she is "taking a serious look" at prospects for a gubernatorial race, but has not ruled out challenging Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

SCHOOL DECISION APPEALED — The State Board of Education voted unanimously to appeal the monumental federal court decision that the Texas property tax method of financing schools is unconstitutional.

Meanwhile, the Board assumed responsibility for drafting a new plan for supporting the school system and ordered a task force be formed to do the study job in the event an appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court fails.

The state, according to Texas Research League, has several options. One is full state financing, which by 1984 would require an expenditure of a billion dollars a year to maintain the status quo.

Another alternative is state-local financing that would provide approximately equal resources for each child. The League suggested redrawing district boundaries to redistribute property values or superimpos-

ing multi-district taxing regions over present operating districts to provide equalization by regions.

A decision, the League noted, must be made as to whether the goal is educational expenditures at the present level in rich districts or at a lower "average level." The latter would mean reducing the number of teachers and lowering salary supplements in some districts to create more positions and higher salaries in the poor districts.

SHORT SNORTS

Governor Smith is considering a recommendation for a statewide food stamp program which would call for about \$17 million in state aid to counties and would produce \$286 million in federal assistance for the needy.
