

FONDOS PARA VIVIENDAS

La ciudad de Lubbock esta en el proceso de aplicar otravez este año por fondos para el programa de Desarrollo de la Comunidad (Community Development Program). La ciudad de Lubbock esta aplicando por un total de \$5,328,000 para diferentes proyectos dentro de la ciudad. La mayoria de los fondos, aproximadamente 46.3% o \$2,464,560 seran usados para la reabilitacion de viviendas, 15.1% o \$801,970 sera usado para los proyectos de parques y los lagos del canyon; 13.8% o \$736,000 sera usado para proyectos para poner mejor sistema de la agua; 9.2% sera usado para calles; 6.0% o 488,250 sera usado para luces en las calles; 1% o \$50,569 sera usado para administracion; 1.3% o 70,000 para el control de trafico; 2.5% o \$135,694 para enforsamiento de reglas, y 4.7% o \$252,143 se alsara por el consilio.

La reabilitacion de casas se hara en 5 diferentes areas de Lubbock. En la area

del Arnett Benson se usaran \$935,487. Se reabilitaran 9 edificios y se compraran 47 edificios. Se usaran \$17,475 para "site improvement". La area al noroeste de la escuela McWhorter es donde se hara el trabajo. En la area de Roberts-McWhorter que esta en la vecindad de el Clovis Road y la avenida T, se compraran 28 edificios y se usaran \$16,302 para site improvement por un total de \$514,861. En la area de la escuela Bean, se compraran 5 edificios y se reabilitaran 23 edificios por un total de \$330,647. En la area de la escuela Ruel Martin se compraran 7 edificios y se reabilitaran 44 edificios. Se usaran \$29,580 para site improvements. En la area Butler se compraran 8 edificios y se reabilitaran 9 edificios. Se usaran \$12,210 para site improvements.

El trabajo bajo este nuevo program empieza desde el 1º de Junio de 1977.

SE HACE

A report covering selected social, economic, and demographic characteristics of persons of Spanish origin in the United States was released today by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce.

Among Key findings summarized in the report are these:

--There were about 11 million persons of Spanish origin in the U.S. in March 1976, according to the survey. An estimated 6.6 million of them reported Mexican origin and 1.8 million reported Puerto Rican origin.

--The median income in 1975 for families with a head of Spanish origin was about \$9,600, whereas the median income for all U.S. families was \$13,700.

--In 1975, one in every four Spanish origin families was below the low-income level.

--Of the Spanish origin population 25 years old and over, 39 percent were high school graduates, compared to 64 percent of the total U.S. population.

Data in this report were collected in the March 1976 Current Population Survey and are subject to sampling variability. A brief explanation appears in the report. The full report on the survey's findings will be published soon.

En un reporte sobre las carísticas sociales, económicas, y demográficas de personas de origen Hispano en los Estados Unidos, el departamento del Censo dio las siguientes carísticas para las personas de Habla Espanol.

--Hay algunos 11 millones de personas habla español en los EEUU segun figura este pasado Marzo. Algunos 6.6 son de origen Mexicano y 1.8 millones son de origen Puerto Riquenos.

--El promedio en salario es de \$9,600, comparado a un promedio de \$13,700 para personas en total de los EEUU.

--En 1975, una de cada cuatro familias que son de origen Hispano vivian con un salario de bajos ingresos. (low income)

--De la poblacion Hispana de los EEUU, 39% de los que tienen 25 años o mas tienen una educacion secundaria. Esto es comparado a 64% de la poblacion total de los EEUU.

WELL BABY CLINIC

The Well Baby Clinic, located at 102 Ave. J. (formally located in the Guadalupe Park) is an agency of United Way.

The services which are provided include:

1. Immunization for infants beginning at 2 months of age to age 18.
2. Baby care classes
3. Physician examination
4. Referrals to other agencies for continuous health care.
5. A health and nutrition program providing Iron supplemented foods to women, infants and children that may have a special need for these foods.

The clinic is open 5 days a week from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. except Thursday when the clinic opens 6:15 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. for doctor examinations.

PROGRAMA

The South Plains Association of Governments sponsors the CETA Programs for the Balance of Lubbock County, or outside Lubbock City Limits with the CETA Intake Center at 1906 4th Street. This center processes all applicants into the CETA program; all services to participants are available at this facility.

C.E.T.A.: This Act provides job training and employment opportunities for economically disadvantaged, unemployed and underemployed persons and assures that training and other services lead to maximum employment opportunities that enhance self-sufficiency. The purpose of the Act is to be accomplished by the establishment of a flexible, decentralized system of Federal, State, and local programs.

In almost every occupation, skilled workers are in demand in Lubbock County. Entry-level positions in most occupations are continually available because of the interplay of economic expansion, the shortage of skilled workers, and employee turnover. However, despite the general prosperity and full employment, some of the Lubbock County population does not share fully in the opportunity.

A large pool of unskilled labor and workers trapped in low pay or high turnover occupations comprises a significant portion of the County population. Most earn poverty level incomes and many others are near poverty. A sizable portion are members of minority ethnic groups and women, historically disadvantaged in the job market. Various socio-economic forces combine to prevent some groups from being in the mainstream of the labor market, able to take advantage of job openings. Educational deficiencies, language barriers, and lack of skills are some of this title, such as . . .

1. OUTREACH to make persons aware of the availability of the services and encourage them to use the service.

2. INTAKE & ASSESSMENT of the individuals needs, interest, and potential in the labor market and referral to appropriate employment, training, or other opportunities.

3. ORIENTATION & COUNSELING

4. EDUCATIONAL & INSTITUTIONAL SKILL TRAIN

The City of Lubbock announces that it has submitted a grant application to the U.S. Department of Labor for funding under Title II of the Comprehensive Employment & Training Act of 1973, as amended (CETA) P.L. 93-203. The intent of this application is to request a grant allotment of funds under Title II allocation for FY 1977. The total amount of funds available for the City of Lubbock for the remainder of the FY 1977 program year will be \$18,905. Expenditures will not be accrued prior to January 1, 1977. The purpose of these funds will be to provide job training and employment opportunities for economically disadvantaged, unemployed and underemployed persons and to assure that training and other services lead to maximum employment opportunities and assist program participants to become economically self-sufficient. Special emphasis will be given to significant segments of the population which include, but not be limited to youth age 16-21. The grant total \$18,905 of substantial unemployment census tracts 7, 8, 10 and 11.

Cost categories and their dollar allocations are:

It is planned that these activities will provide assistance for, but will not be limited to, the alleviation of such problems as economically disadvantaged youths needing assistance to stay in school, and vocational and employment assistance for other economically disadvantaged, unemployed and underemployed persons 16 to 21 years of age. Approximately 45 individuals are to be served by this program. All will be terminated and 3 will be placed in unsubsidized employment. Significant segments and the number to be served are:

FINAL REGULATIONS

Final regulations for the Runaway Youth Act, Title III of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974 (PL 93-415), were issued today by HEW.

These regulations will continue to implement a Federal program which provides immediate crisis intervention, temporary shelter care and aftercare services to runaway youth and their families.

The Office of Youth Development within HEW's Office of Human Development has the responsibility for administering the Runaway Youth Act. Under the Act, grants are made to States, localities, and private non-profit agencies for the development of local facilities to deal with the immediate needs of runaway youth and their families outside the law enforcement structure and the juvenile justice system.

Among its provisions, the Runaway Youth Act provides for the establishment or strengthening of runaway houses for the purpose of reuniting youth with their families, encouraging the resolution of intrafamily problems through counseling services, and helping youth decide upon a future course of action. The final regulations clarify



existing policy as stated by the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking, issued in April 1975 for the Runaway Youth Act. In response to public comment on the proposed rules, the final regulations reflect several minor changes designed to strengthen the intent of the Act. The revisions made were in the area of affording runaway youth greater control over their lives by requiring their consent in decisions which may affect their physical and mental well-being while residing at the runaway house and which would protect the confidentiality of their personal records.

More specifically, the consent of youth receiving services will be required prior to the disclosure of information contained in records (to include access to individual records by parents without the consent of the youth involved); involvement in any research or experimentation; involvement in any medical, psychiatric or psychological treatment; disclosure of information on the identity of youth; and, disclosure of information on all records of evaluation. Those instances in which a youth and/or parent's consent is not necessary are reflected in both the Act and the Regulations, whereby disclosure of information is allowable to agencies compiling statistical data or counts involved in the disposition of criminal charges against an individual runaway youth. However, when information is released it must be done in a personally identifiable way. Additionally, runaway youth under the supervision of program staff members, shall have the right to review their records; to correct any information or file a statement of disagreement; and to be apprised of the individuals who have reviewed their records.

The final regulations have been prepared to more effectively and responsively address the needs and concerns of runaway youth and their families by providing assistance to potential grantees in the development and efficient operation of a local runaway youth program.

CAMBIA EL G.I. BILL

Este Viernes sera el ultimo dia que una persona se podra ingresar al ejercito y poder tomar ventaja de beneficio de educacion bajo el G.I. Bill. Al empezar el año toda persona que se enliste en el ejercito de los Estados Unidos tendra que contribuir una parte del costo de educacion si es que quiere educarse despues que salga del servicio.

Las personas que quieran participar en el nuevo programa de educacion podran hacerlo con contribuir de \$50 a \$75 por mes a un limite de \$2700. La Administracion de Veteranos dara \$2 por cada \$1 que el soldado gane de su salario. Esto le dara un total de \$8,100 para cada persona que se quiere educar despues de salir del servicio militar.

Los pagos educacionales sera hecho por la duracion de tiempo que el participante haiga hecho pagos al fondo con un maximo de 36 meses. Para una persona que haiga

contribuido por 36 meses y tenga el maximo de \$8,100, el pago mensual sera de \$225 por 36 meses para sus costos educacionales.

Bajo el programa viejo cada persona que sirvio en el militar era elegible para \$292 por mes si era soltero y \$347 por mes si era casado. El Pentagono dijo que mas de 30,000 personas se an engresado al servicio militar bajo un programa en donde la persona que enlista no se tiene que ir al servicio hasta los ultimos de 1977. Estas personas tendrán los beneficios viejos.

Los beneficios del nuevo programa se tienen que usar dentro de 10 años. Los que no es usado por el participante se puede regresar. Cada persona que se enlista al nuevo programa tiene que participar por no menos de 12 meses con excepcion de los que tengan razones serias o se salgan del servicio. Se es que se muera el participante su familia recibira el dinero que el participante contribuyo.

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—At the top of everyone's list of New Year's resolutions should be the determination to become a more knowledgeable consumer in 1977.

And the lawyers in our Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division have put together a list of things you can do to get a better return on each dollar you spend, in the way of products, service, and satisfaction.

Keep a record for one week of every expenditure, so you know where your money really goes. Then set up a budget for household expenses and don't exceed it.

Buy first for "needs," then if there's cash left over, for "wants."

Organize your shopping and shop only from a prepared list, to avoid impulse buying. On food purchases, avoid "filler" foods with little nutritive value. And be sure you realize how much extra most convenience foods cost. Is the time you save worth the cost?

Plan ahead for your large purchases and save up for them when possible, so you can pay cash and avoid interest or

carrying charges.

-Comparison shop—comparing not only price, but quality, warranty, service, and finance plans. When comparing financing, look at the annual percentage rate of interest you will pay. The lower the APR, the lower your finance charges. And remember, you don't have to finance your purchase where you buy it. Check banks, credit unions, savings and loan institutions, and finance companies to get the best APR and pay-out schedule.

-Study all advertising carefully before responding to it.

-Say "no" to all high-pressure or deceptive sales tactics, including "last chance" offers and "bait and switch" selling.

-Look for the "catch" if an offer appears too good to be true.

-Examine merchandise thoroughly before buying, to be sure it's what you need and want, and that it's in good condition.

-Be aware of the dangers of dealing with itinerant sales persons or contractors who may not be around to make

good on their promises.

-Deal instead, with established, reputable firms that stand behind their products or services.

-No matter who you deal with, always "get it in writing" instead of relying on oral promises.

-Follow manufacturer's instructions and care labels, so you get the best possible service from each product you buy.

-Stop and think before responding to a charity solicitation—is it really for a worthy cause?

-Be cautious when signing a contract. Read and understand every word and fill in any blanks. Never allow anyone to rush you.

-Investigate before investing in speculative deals to "get rich quick." Get the advice first of reliable, knowledgeable persons. If someone tells you he can't wait for you to check, tell him "good bye" right then.

-Look for practical ways to save energy and money—insulate your home properly, buy energy efficient appliances, set thermostats higher in summer and lower in winter, and use your car efficiently by running all errands in one trip.

-Try to settle any consumer complaints first with the individual or store involved. If that doesn't work, contact our Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, your county or district attorney, or district attorney, or your local Better Business Bureau.
