Hermleigh Community Fair Goes Beyond All Expectation.

For some time the people of Hermleigh and adjacent communities have thought they were standing in their own light-knowledge but not using the means at hand and at last decided to have a Community Fair. When this was decided definitely the time was growing, short the County Fair was near at hand. But the short time in which to do all these things proved no difficulty, for every one went to work and the Fair was staged in good way last Saturday the 10th. The streets were crowded with people. They were here from all over the country. Every body was carrying a smile of gratitude growing out of the phenomenal success of the Fair. The Fair belongs to the people, not a part of them; but to all of them. No one man can claim the honor, it belongs to all. There was great response on the part of the people from all parts of our Community.

The community tabernacle was used as a place of exhibit. The spacious enclosure there was tastefully arranged and filled to its fullest capacity. Each business interest of the town had its booth. These booths were very beautiful. Everything which belong to a great industrial people was seen there. It would not be an exaggeration to say that it measures up to that which might be expected of a much larger community than ours.

There was on exhibit everything which grows out of a rich soil which has been prop-

erly cultivated and watered. Corns and kaffirs; sorgums and maize; peanuts and potatoes; alfalfa, wheat and King Cotton. So much of this that we all wanted to move to the farm where the better part of our citizenship now live, judging from the fruits of their skillful labors. Live stock were there to such an extent that one would be inclined to think that this is nothing but a livestock country. Horses, fine horses, well kept horses were shown until one would forget that we live in the days of tractors and automobiles. Cows and hogs were seen until the fear of hunger was gone from us all; chickens march on display until wing flopping and the cacklin music of the hen house, caused every one to forget all his troubles and go on rejoicing with the gaiety of an enthusiastic crowd of happy people at the closing of a successful summer.

The blue ribbon prizes were carried to the County Fair at Snyder Thursday where the third prize was won. The poster representing "Agricultural Hermleigh" arranged by Messrs Kinney and Randals was the attraction in the Hermleigh booth. It was brought home and left in the Herald office. The editor is anxious to have it photographed and a cut made of it to be used in connection with any advertising the town might see fit to do later. The poster is a thing of beauty.

125 BALES GINNED UP TO TUESDAY.

According to an unofficial report from the gins here, about 125 bales of cotton have been ginned to date. The weather this week, while to the advantage of cotton at length, has slowed the picking down considerably. It will only be a few days now until the cluck of cotton wagons and the noise of busy gins will attract the attention of a people who have about lived over the financial hardships of last year.

It is thought there will be something like 4,000 bales ginned here this season, as compared with little better than 6,000 last year. With the great increase in price over last year 4,000 bales of cotton will put the country in fairly good financial condition, considering there is a good feed crop. Every body seems to be in good spirits as the autumn season makes its way through West Texas.

The Herald Means Nothing But Good.

The Hermleigh Herald is now being established. It will enter the postoffice here Friday, the 23rd, under the Act of Congress 1897. It is wanted to be understood in a strict business way that the present management of the Herald can not be responsible in any way for the failures of other individuals who have attempted to establish a news paper here. If such attempts have been made and proved a failure, it is not chargeable to the institution, but to the individual or the individuals who attempted it.

The editor is not necessarily a stranger here any longer. There are people here who know others in other places who are our intimate friends and, moreover, it is presumed that some inquiries have been made as to the risk of trusting the editor with such an undertaking as this. Mr R. D. Kinney Jr., is given as business reference, and the Rev. Hudson is given as a reference as to life, purpose and character before coming here.

We have had to decline our work in the ministry for reasons growing out of declining health, and we have no other means of making a livelihood except to work, laboring with the hands. We have chosen to edit a news paper in Hermleigh (it makes no difference how many before us have failed) and this thing we purpose to do. We are not doing it alone for the good of others but we have an interest of our own which we must safely guard.

What every thing is set up which has been ordered for this shop it will entole something like \$1500.00, and all this is our own except \$400.00 which is yet to be paid on the equipment. With this much money invested, by one who has a limited capital, certainly he mean just what he is doing. We invite you all to fall right in to line with us, as we are sure you will after a little reflection. Hermleigh needs a weekly paper, they now have it; every thing looks good here for a small country paper and so we go forward.

High School Opened In Big Way Monday September the 12th.

School opened here Monday with a good attendance of both pupils and patrons. After singing devotional exercises, very helpful talks were made by several school patrons, and several pupils rendered pleasing numbers. Everything seemed to presage a successful year's work.

The faculty for this year is B. M. Grambling Supt. and science teacher; Mr. A. D. Hill, Principal and English teacher; Miss Ocelle Chrane, History and Spanish teacher; Miss Hazel Lee Rainbolt, mathematics teacher; Mrs. Minnie Duncan 5th and 6th grades; Miss Francis Gills 4th and 5th grades; Miss Ruby Forrester 2nd 3rd grade; Mrs. Delia Forrester, 1st and 2nd grades; Mrs. Cleve Patterson and Mrs. S. C. Randles music teachers and Miss Gray expression.

Hermleigh High School is now classified as a four year High School with eleven units of affiliation. We shall this year try for at least five more units. Spanish two, English one, Civics Economics one half each, and Physics one \$350. for laboratory and \$150. for Library have been allowed this year by Board for needed equipment.

The state has granted \$300. special aid to assist in installing equipment for teaching Agriculture and Farm mechanics to the boys and cooking and sewing to the girls

This equipment has been ordered, and the work will be started at once. Mr. Grambling will have charge of the Boys work and plans to accredit this work also. Miss Rainbolt will have charge of the Girls work and will begin the sewing as first term work at once. We believe this industrial training, is one of the most valuable causes offered in school if we can make it go over big.

We feel that the pupils and teachers of last year will feel proud of the granting of eleven units of affiliation. This is the first year the school has run nine months, and is the first try for credit. Every unit asked for was granted, and with very little advance criticism of the material submitted. We shall indeed be proud if we can succeed in adding four or five units this year. The old parody of the man who had no fish of his own buying those of the boy and passing them off as his own catch, seems to fit those schools that buy up the virile young manhood, of rural districts to replace their own jelly beans.
