### I. The Twelve Ordained (Mark

Jesus, knowing that His earthly career would be cut short, made pro wision for the carrying forward of His work after He was gone by calling and ordaining the twelve. Before doing this He spent a whole night in prayer (Luke 6:12) The burden of His prayer is indicated by what He immediately did. From among His disciples He chose twelve, whom He ordained for a twofold purpose.

1. "That they might be with Him' Fellowship with the Lord is not only

the highest privilege of a disciple but the indispensable qualification for witnessing for Him: Personal association with Jesus Christ-the Interaction of personalities-the impact of His personality upon ours is the essential preparation for Christian service. 2. "That He might send them forth
