A newsparer is an enterprise, and will not grow except in an enterprising atmosphere. A little town, a little newspaper; no town, no newspaper. Our fight is purely in defense of our own personal inter ests. We want it thoroughly understood that we are defending ourselves and that we care nothing for politics.

It shall not matter with us who is elected to constitute the city council, just so we have a council. We have interviewed those who are opposing the present administration and they say that their purpose is to defeat the present efforts to change Hermleigh from a village to a town. The objection to having a town is that it requires good schools, adequate water power, lighted streets and the like. These are objected to on the grounds that, 1st, they are not needed. 2nd, they cost money. This is the one side, while the other side take a different view of the thing.

Hermleigh has the territory, the agricultural strength and population. It is approximately 30 miles from Colorado on the west. 30 miles from Roby on the east, 22 miles from Roscoe on the south, and 11 miles from Snyder on the north. It is located in the very heart of the best section of the four adjoining counties here around.
