Many have wondered concerning this yerse in Revelations 17 8. "The Beast which thou sawest was, and is not; and shall come up out of the abyss and go into perdition." The Beast was not, because the government of the Papal Era from about 500 to 1500 A. D. was not yet established. It was, because each form of the Roman government from first to last, could be said to have existed from the founding of Rome in 750 B. C. It was to come, because that form of the great government of Rome had not at the time the Revelator wrote become distinctive from the other seven forms of the great government. This is as plain as can be, and yet there are not as many as one man in ten thousand who understands it. The Papal government grew up out of the efforts of Jusinian the Great to restore the Emperi al government which fell in 470 A. D. some time between 527 and 560 this, the eighth form of the Roman government was set up. According to Bible figures it was in 549. It was an eighth and was of the seventh, i. e. the Exarchal form of the government, which lasted for a short while only, ended in the development of the great Papal form of government and which lived through the longest period time in all history-1000 years.
