They were enroute to Abilene when the car in which they were riding collided with another car. Both cars were totally ruined and all occupants were slightly wounded.

George, the older boy had spent the week-end in Hermleigh and the car occupied by his father, mother and smaller brother, stopped here Sunday morning and picked him up. They were gone only a short while when the accident occurred.

A Hudson from Crockett Texas which was enroute for this place came only just a few minutes after the accident occurred. The occupants of this car reported the accident here before word was received that it was the Eoff car which was wrecked.

It is feared that the faces of the boys are scarred permanently. No life was lost in the wreck.

## CITY "DADS" STUCK IN DEEP CATALOGUE RUTS

That idea of going out of town to trade is a bad enough from an individual point of view much less from a public.

What is said here is not said to be understood that we are hitting at any of our fair counciloes, but we do want it understood that we need to condemn the policy of handling public funds carelessly and of setting a public example of boycotting home business concerns. **SHORT COURSE**

Two merchants of Snyder are offering open trips to all of the Club boys in the County belonging to the 4-H Clubs on poultry and pig projects and every boy in the county in this business should be making his plans to make one of these trips.

The Stinson Bros. trip is given on the best report that is made by July 21st on pigs. The pigs must be weighed about twice a month and the daily gain kept. The feed fed them must be kept up with and the story of how fed and handled will amount to 40 percent. This trip will not be given on extravagant feed. The cost of making the gain is very important. Every boy with a pig should be making his plans for this.

The Higginbotham trip will be given upon chickens. There are 4000 chickens enrolled in the Club this year. This trip will be given on the best record, number of chickens started with, per

cent raised, and story of how they were handled will be the main points on which the winner will be selected.

Any boy wishing to compete for this trip should keep a record book so that he will be in shape.

**PLANS MADE TO GET A LOAD OF REGISTERED HEIFERS.**

Good livestock means better farms, homes, and folks. An effort is being made at this time to get in a load of registered jersey heifers that will be the foundation for better Jerseys in the future.

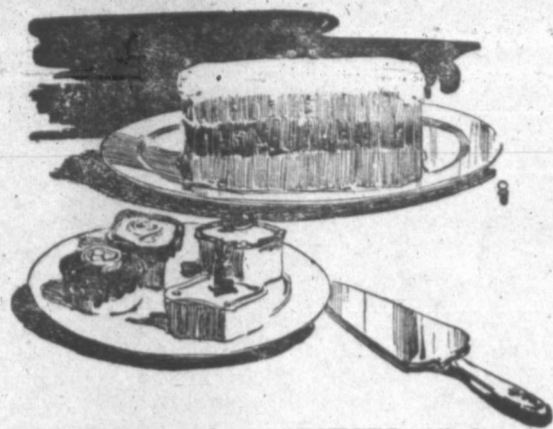
