AFTER 20 YEARS

Edinburg, Scotland, July 20:-Oscar Slater, convicted of the murder of Miss Mary Gilchrist. an aged woman, twenty years ago, Friday won his fight to clear his name of the conviction.

Slater, who originally was sentenced to death and then served more than eighteen years of a commuted life sentence, before he was released, began a fight to prove his innocence soon after he was released from prison. His case had attracted wide notice and interested many prominent people including Sir Conan Doyle, noted writer.

Sitting in the Scottish Crimin al Court of Appeal, the presiding Judges found unanimously that there had been a misdirection in law at the original trial. The decision was announced by Lord Justice General Lord Clyde.

It is understood that the Government will consider the question of compensation to Slater for his wrongful conviction.

Slater was arrested in New York early in 1909 as he stepped off the liner Lusitania. He waived extradition and was returned to Glasgow for trial.


