COTTON NEEDS MORE HOT DRY WEATHER

The pessimistic view of the 1928 cotton crop is the safest to trust. It is spotted all over the country. Only a few counties have a reasonable percentage of bolls already matured. All kind of insects are reported to be at work every where.

Our county agent has been a little optimistic concerning the Scurry county crops, but this grows out of the fact that he has forgotten that it is now time to begin picking cotton, and there are no matured bolls. With the exception of insects, which are numerous, the crops would be fine for the 15th of July. It is easily 30 days late. There is considerable acreage in the county which is absolutely hopelessly late this year.

If we should have a prolonged season like last season, and if the weather should turn off dry this morning (Monday) there would be plenty of time to make a cotton crop. But who know it is going to do this? "One bird in the hand is worth three in a brush."

To the People of Hermleigh and Adjoining Precincts

In the Hermleigh Herald of August 9, 1928, in a political announcement Judge Holley said: "Our county's finances are in a healthy condition," and again says, "According to the Treasurer's Report we have more than nine thousand dollars cash on hand now than August 1st, 1927." He made these statements in answer to my statements in the papers and in speeches, "That the county is a way behind on CURRENT EXPENSES and I advocate putting it back on a cash basis."

In answer to the above I wish to say that on last Saturday in our speaking at Snyder I read the actual figures from the signed report of the Treasurer on the Current Expenses of the county before several hundred people and in presence of Judge Holley and the County treasurer and proposed to withdraw from the race if that were not the report of the treasurer signed by her, giving the facts as of August 1, 1928, if Judge Holley would withdraw if I were right, and he declined. Here are the figures: We owe on current expenses one hundred thirty five thousand nine hundred and nine 15-100 (\$135,909.15) and have only \$6,019.91 to pay it with, and this small amount of cash has to be held back to pay old warrants that have not yet been turned in by the owners, therefore, we owe net \$129,889.24 on current expenses and no money to pay it with. Her report shows that we owe \$291,000.00 in bonds, but these bonds have nothing to do with the CURRENT EXPENSES handled by the court. We have to pay interest on this debt, and we have five months from August 1, to run yet this year, aside from the fact that all of the tax money paid in has been spent.

I tried to get a fuller reply ready last week but was prevented by a funeral, therefore I am giving only his statements which you have read and the figures of the treasurer which were given in Snyder Saturday: I believe that you are entitled not to be misled by his statements and that is fair to me for you to know the whole truth.

Give me a chance by voting for me Saturday, and I shall give you my best to bring Scurry County back to a cash bases, and the best service possible in every way.

Again thanking you, and winning or losing, we are all for Scurry County.

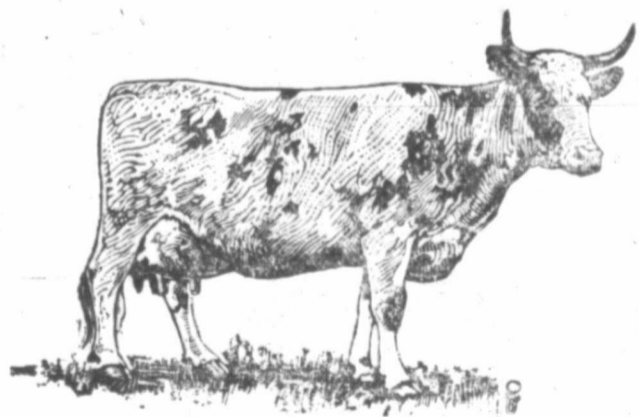
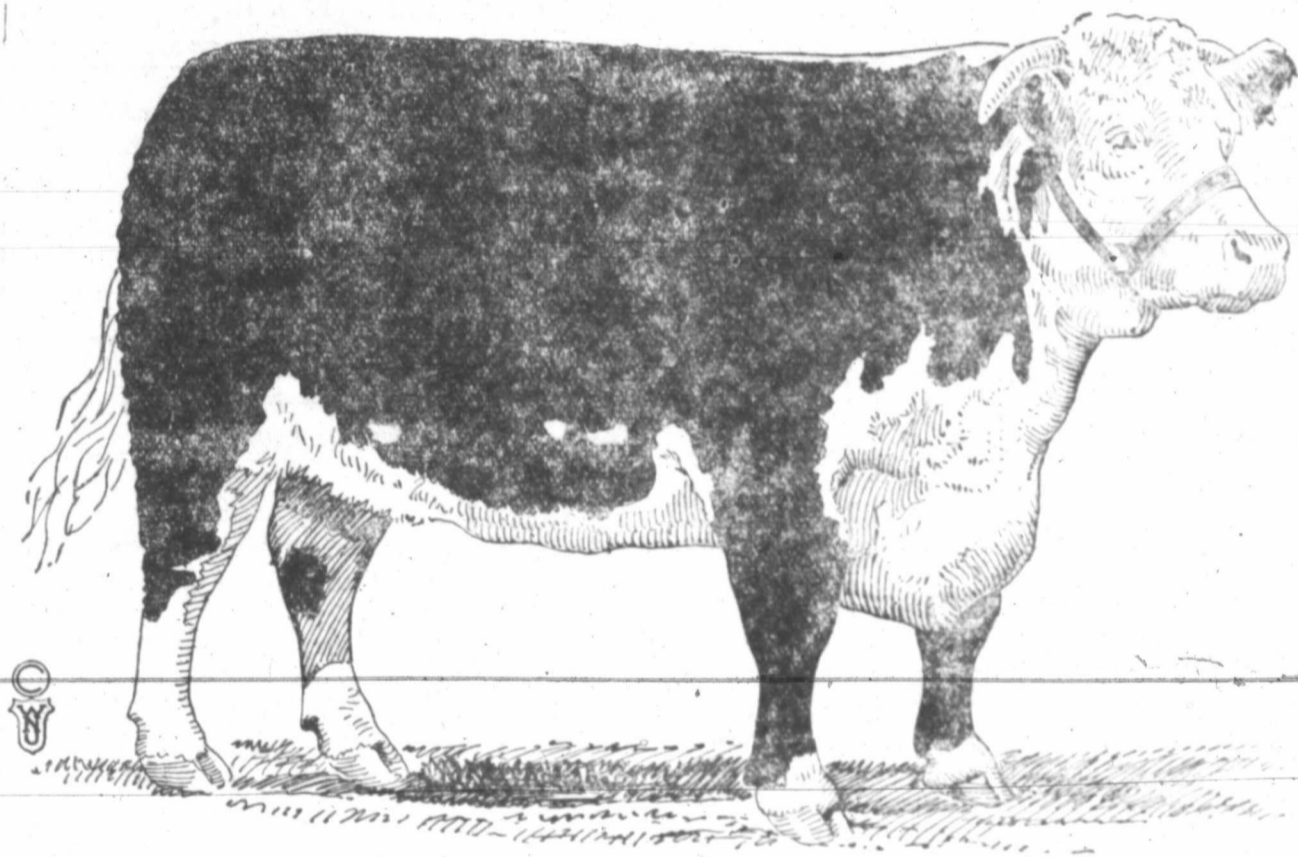
