

WITHOUT JURISDICTION IN ELECTION CONTEST

WHOLE NUMBER 1854

District Judge W. R. Chapman called the case of the primary election contest for the office of County Judge at 10 o'clock Thursday morning. October 5th, which was appealed from the decision of the Democratic County Executive Committee, on September 14th. In the Second Primary Election R. E. Lee received a majority of 25 votes over Judge Jas. P. Kinnard for the office of County Judge. Judge Kinnard filed his contest with the Executive Commitee, and the committee found two small boxes in the county, Cottonwood and Bunker Hill, where the presiding officer had failed to write their name across the back of the ballot, and those two boxes were thrown out, giving Judge Kinnard a majority of 8 votes. Mr. Lee appealed to the District Court, and after a careful consideration Judge Chapman held that he was without jurisdiction to hear a primary election contest in vacation, and refused to hear the same. Mr. Lee made application for an injunction with a mandatory order requiring the Chairman of the Committee and County Clerk to place his name on the General Election ticket. Judge Chapman withheld his order on the injunction pending a decision of the Court of Civil Appeals at Fort Worth on the same question carried up from Cook County, which he stated would likely be returned Saturday or Monday.

Judge Kinnard was represented by Murchison & Davis, Ratliff & Ratliff, and H. R. Jones, all of Haskell. R. E. Lee was represented by Stinson. Coombs & Brooks of Abilene and Smith & Grissom of Heskell.

This kind of a record is a bad reflection on our schools and on the pupils. One of the cardinal principles of success is the habit of always being prompt. It has been my experience in the many years of school work that ordinarily, although not in every case, a pupil that comes to school late cannot thing is true about the nerves. There be depended on in a pinch. So, for the success in the future of your children please see that they are never tardy. Get up in time for them to get their breakfast and do their choics around the home in time to get to school in pleaty of time. Keep your clock set at least five minutes ahead of the court house clock, the time the schools go by, and get them to school ten minutes before time for school to take up. In faci, high school pupils will be permitted to enter the building at \$:10 when they can study until 8:30, the time for high school work to start. The pupils in the grades can go to their rooms at 8:30, where they may study until 9 a, m. the time their school work begins,

However, with reference to tardies, the schools had thirty less cases thun the corresponding month the year hafore. If necessary we will have to use some drastic methods to cut these cases of tardine's to 25 or 30 cr.es per thirty-six cases of tardies. 

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

CITY IMPROVEMENT BOND

City bond issues totaling \$89,000 carried at Seymour Friday by overwhelming majorities and were apportioned as follows: Sixteen thousand dollars of sewer extension bonds received 244 votes to 40 against.

Twenty-five thousand dollars of water bonds carried 234 to 40 against. Eight thousand park improvement bonds 204 to 69 against, and \$40,000 for city hall and auditorium carried by 174 to 94

These bonds were successfully carried last July, but on account of irregularities in election orders it became necessary to resubmit under Friday's election.




