 Wildest New GuineaFollowing the curve of the beaah Nong the bay, and passing the gorornor's unpretentious but beautiful. ly located residency, you come to Hanuabada, a populous native cown. Here you will see native life oractically unchanged from what it was before the white man came. Scores of frail, thatched houses on tall stilts over the water with the tide rising and falling beneath their limsy floors! Naked children, dogs. lugouts, hewn from single logs, the beat of tomtoms, swarming, bushyheaded Papuans, all make an untorgetable picture. I saw incredibly roung children climbing the bamboo ladders to the houses, and dogs too. Naked women rocked their babies in nets ssuspended from the ceiling. Whole families lived in a single room with the cooking fire in the middle.
I more than half suspect that most of the thrilling pictures of "wildest New Guinea" were taken in this village, for all the children were familiar with cameras.
One night we went to Hanuabad. while a dance was in progress. Fifty or more young people arrayed in bird of paradise head-dresses were dancing a slow rhythmic measure to the accompaniment of tom-toma and a queer haunting chant.-John T. McCutcheon, in Hearst's Inter-pational-Cosmopolitan.
