The leaf worm has scruck the cotton fields here in places despite the fact that the weather has been open and dry. There has been no serious alarm made as yet, but danger signals are

We have had a few light showers during the last few days but only enough to make poisoning impractical. The leaf worm can do cotton much serious enjury. but farmers do not dread them like they dread the boll worm and weevil.

As the cotton country develops and the acreage is increased there is also an increase in cotton pests. When the cotton acreage is cut down to what it aught to be, not to over flood the market, then there will not


