# HeRMLEEGH CONMUNTY HAS BEST '29 CROP 

While the cotton prospect here is nothing to be elated over, it is perhaps the best anywhere in this country. The county is rather fortunate so far as the cotton crop is concerned, and its best prospects center around this place. The black land is leading in crop production this year.
Survers have been made out of here reaching far across the country east, west, north. and south an discloses the fact that Hermleigh is well at home, as compared with the rest of the cou try around. Our crop is short, and the area of it seems to narrow as the weather continues dry. Rain this late in the season might change things greatly, but farmers are no longer depending on this prospect

The feed crop is short at the very best, and our farmers facing a challenge to make the br st of their ofportunity. The cotton crop will probably be less than 75 per cent of normal.
