## COUNTY IS NOT BAD

According to J. J. Lee, recognized authority on local crop conditions, Scurry County will gin 27,000 bales of cotton this year. This estimant is based on the present prospect, with several weeks of opportunity yet to our credit The dry weather cotton crop is the crop which always turns out best in the long-

The county ginned less than 12,000 bales last year, according to Mr. Lee, and the increase this vear over last will be near 15,000 bales, according to this estimate.

Hermleigh will probably gin 2,500 bales, as compared with 1,-200 last year. The price of cotton is looking up some, and Supt. Mize, of the German which is encouraging to cotton
