Wheat sowed now will make good winter pasture, it season is good in the spring, it will make a money crop. This is safe risk. This country makes wheat when the season is right. The season here has been bad for wheat for a number of years, and most farmers are afraid of it, but this might be the luckey year, who knows?

It is no bad idea to take advan tage of this season and sow some wheat.
