## THE CARISAR CANEAN

If we may be allowed space in the Herald, we will tell of our trip to Portales, and Carlsbad New Mexico. Thence to the cave
To speak of the crops, there was not much to encourage us till we passed Lußbock, there the scene changed for the better till we passed west and south of Portales. We spent three days at this place where Mrs Lynde has a sister. While there we enjoyed several good meals of fresh vegetable, such as roast ing ears, beans, cabbage, tomatables, etc., on Mr. Green's farm one mile west of Portales. Mr and Mrs. Green have made a steady go of their home and farm since going there four years ago. Green and the three boys have improved 80 acres of fine land, building a 6 room stucco house with sleepieg porch and all necessary outside buildings.
This family like, many others in that community have their irrigation shallow water to irrigate their entire acreage. Their principle crop is sweet potatoes. He has 65 acres and thinks he will get better than an average yield this year.
After our stay of three days there we and a portion of the Green family journeyed toward Roswell and Carlsbad, where we stayed until morning, at which time we motored to the cavern a distance of 20 miles, reaching there in time to enter the wonderful cavern.
No, we have no words to describe this cavern! We entered the cave at 10:30 a. m. On entering, the crowd of 1175 , all over 16 , were directed by government official how to place our feet on the steps going up and down in order to make the trip with the least fatigue. The officier advised that no souvenir be taken out of the cave, a heavy penalty being imposed for same The formations in this cave have been in proceess of formation for years innumerable and are still forming. We were told that 100 years of time were required for the shaping of one cubic inch of this formation.

This cave was discovered 23 years ago by a cowboy who was attracted to it by a cloud of bats which played in and out about sundown. It was declared a national monument and opened to the public under governmental the public under governmental

## To Customers Upon Whose Crops We Have

 MortgagesYou will soon be seliing your 1929 crops and in order that there may be no misunderstandings or later embarrasments we are sending out this general letter to let each customer know that we are expecting the entire proceeds of cotton sales to be applied on your indebtedness until the full amount is paid.

The law does not give the martgagor the right or privilege to hold out ary part of the proceeds for picking or any other purpose. Our suggestion in this connection is that you bring to us the check you receive for your cotton and cotton seed and permission may then be kiven to retain a reasonable amount for picking.

In regard to the sale of livestock under mortgage, the mortgage in each case covers the increase so that when any increase from livestock under mortgage is sold the proceeds from such increase is expected to be applied to the indebtedness.

Mortgages held by us cover not only the original note but also any subsequent advances and all indebtedness of the mortgagor.

We think that in most cases these matters are thoroughly understood by our customers, but to avoid any misunderstandings that this letter is written.
