
ARMISTICE PASSES



COTTON LOAN IN TWO STATES O. K'D.

Washington, Nov. 13 .-Loans of \$1,000,000 to the Louisiana Farm Bureau Cotton Growers' Co-operative Association and \$750,000 to the Arizona Pima Cotton Growers were approved today by the Federal Farm Board to supplement funds received from commercial and intermediate credit banks.

The additional amounts are to enable the associations to make larger initial payments to grower members when they purchase the cotton.

4-H CLUB

The 4-H Club boys are getting a carload of lambs on feed over the county, and are trying to get about fifteen pigs on feed for the Southwest Exposition and Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth in the Spring. They are carrying on these demonstrations not especially for the show, but to demon- 3 strate to local men that growing feed crops and marketing them through livestock is profitable and more so than cotton. Club pigs were fed at a cost of six cents and even less the past year. A lamb was 2 shown at the County Fair that made gains by proper feeding at less than seven cents per pound gain.
