for what he produces? If our for what he produces? If our farmers, and if they are in position to do it they can best do it by stabilizing our marFets. instance: We made a poor cotton crua, this year, bu it the country would have been in reasonably good condition. The thing that ruined us was the slump in price. The farmer needs a chance. That is all he needs. When he gets care of himself. There is no market for cotton ; there is no market for turkeys and chickens; there is no market for cream, and what chance has a producer under these conditions? When he does his best factel lie? It lies in the fact that we have no market for what we produce.
When a man has a fair chanse and doesn't take ad. Itage of it, his failure is his
own: but how many southern $\mathrm{m} \rightarrow$ have a fair chance? The south-western states produce, while the north-etstern states ufacture. When the sou$m$ dity of any sort he lugs it to market and asks "what will he wants to buy an article which was manufactured some place else and shipped into his town, he asks: "what will you What ohance has a producer under these conditions? He the south produces and the north manufactures, and so long as there are those who stand between the two and do all the trading, we producers shall have trouble. Yes, there is coming relief, i.e., the farmer will be able to get credit. but credit is only a solution in part to the farmers problem. It is immediate relief, it.
