Ed James Baptist Missionary and blind, spoke to a large audience here Tuesday evening. His address was of much interest, bearing as it did on his South American missionary experiences.

Rev. James is a Missourian by birth, and has been preaching since the age of thirteen years. At the death of his parents he and his lone brother became missionaries, going to South America. His brother died while there and he narriwly escaped death at hands of the natives many times, according to his experiences as related in his address here.

He once was "beaten with stripes" and buried. Once he was shot in the face which resulted in the loss of his eyes He says we Americans do not know how to appreciate our peace and happiness and other good things.

The blind Missionary was a guest in the C. E. Ross home while here.

What chance has a producer under these conditions? He simply has none. So long as the south produces and the north manufactures, and so long as there are those who stand between the two and do all the trading, we producers shall have trouble.

FARM RELIEF! Yes, there is coming relief, i.e., the farmer will be able to get credit, but credit is only a solution in part to the farmers problem. It is immediate relief, and we shall gladly welcome it. The government is at work at this time, and this temporary relief will come. It will give us another chance. Those who are going to need money next year will, in all probability, be able to get it. But the farm'ers relief will not come until he gets a stabilized market for what he produces.

THE SECOND MILE POST

Just what the giver of all good meant when He said:"If a man compel thee to go a mile, go with him two. If he sue thee at law and take thy coat, give him thy cloak also,' we are unable to understand. It looks like this would give the man of greed the advantage of the honest man. God never intended to do this, we are sure. What does it mean, then ?

The expression: "If a man shall smite thee on one cheek. turn the other unto him," is interpreted to mean that, after the other is turned, one is at liberty to take his own recourse. .So we would suggest that the meaning of this is, "when one has gone the other mile and starts back, he is at liberty to do as he pleases."
