With such events as Voyager I sailing past Saturn happening, it is fitting sometimes to reflect upon some of the situations that existed only a century or so ago.



John Ganrecki, who suffered a shattered bone in his finger, said, "I heard a noise up front....It sounded like a string of firecrackers. People were falling on the floor and there was a screaming and velling ..

"It was like something in Al Capone; there is a row of bullet holes across the glass behind the bar," he said.

One wounded man died on the operating table, said spokeswoman Rita Conyers at St. Vincent's Hospital. He was not immediately identified, and more than 20 patrons of Ramrod had gone to the hospital in an effort to identify

Another victim, identified as Joig Wenz, 21, of New York 5. City, came to the hospital in critical condition and died early today, Ms. Conyers said. Another person was in serious condition and the other five were "in better shape," she

After the gunman drove off, a pursuing radio patrol car crashed into a mailbox and a parked car. The two officers inside received minor injuries.

Police later spotted Crumpley's fedora on the sidewalk and found him under a car, trying to pull himself up into the undercarriage so he

would not be seen. He said Crumpley, married and the father of three, is an unemployed cab or truck

Crumpley's father, the Rev. G. Grant Crumpley of New Rochelle, said in a telephone interview, "I know that he is a sick man and this is a terrible thing....I'm very tired and

7 Students Convicted

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) Seven University of Texas students from the Middle East, have been found guilty of violating university rules . when they disrupted a speech last Jan. 31 by the former Iranian Ambassador to the United Nations, Fereydoun,

Hoveyda. Professor George Dix, hearing officer for the university disciplinary proceedings, said another hearing would be held to consider penalities for the students. The 11 possible penalties range from a written admonition to suspension or expulsion.

The students were among 12 demonstrators, nine Iranians and three Palestinians, who were found guilty in September in a non-jury county. court trial of disrupting the speech by the former spkoesman for the late Shah of Iran. Each was fined \$200 and given a jail sentence. None had to serve any time because the judge credited them for time already spent in jail after their arrests in Januaryr.

"I really haven't given it a lot of thought," he spoke, Wednesday morning after Western Texas beat Cisco 74-65 the night before.

"I thought we were going to have a real good ballelub. and I'm pleased with us being 8-0 on the year, but it hasn't been something I've concentrated on. 



Cancer Patients To Get Pot Pills

thetic marijuana pills may be prescribed as early as Friday it the University of Texas M.D. Anderson, Hospital and Tumor Institute here for cancer patients suffering the painful side effects of chemotherapy, a hospital spokesman says.

Dr. Fred G. Conrad said Tuesday the National Cancer Institute has mailed 1,200 capsules to the hospital, where '15 physicians have been approved by federal authorities to prescribe the medication.

Conrad, vice president of patient care, said the pills probably will be given to 48 patients:

Personally, I have at least or 8 patients on chemotherapy coming to the clinic Friday and if any of them are having bad nausea, I will tell them about the new pills," Conrad said:

The man-made pills contain a synthetic form of TCH, or delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol. marijuna plants.

The new and somewhat reconstructit. controversial pill will be prescribed to patients undergoing chemotherapy and suffering excessive nausea and vomiting that standard medication has not relieved.



We don't think the Infernal, an excuse us, Internal Revenue Service is really conducting a nefarious plot to destroy culture and impoverish the life of the mind. Nonetheless, in their quest to exact every possible penny from the economic lifeblood of the economy, they seem to have stumbled on a way to do just

At issue is a determination last year by the Supreme Court in the case of Thor Power Tool vs. the IRS. What does that have to do with life of the mind? Hold on, the plot thickens.

It seems nasty old Thor was depreciating the value of its spare parts and other stock for tax purposes while continuing to sell them at full retail price. The IRS said that was naughty, and was apparently unmoved by arguments that keeping those parts on hand involves inventory costs and warehouse expenses that justify depreciating their value. The decision of the supreme court to-uphold the IRS will mean lots of manufacturers who've carried a large inventory of spare parts will probably reduce their inventories. Want to keep your old lawnmower or appliances going? Want to fix up that '37 Chevy? Forget it. Because of this ruling, carrying lots of spare parts becomes a money-losing proposition. Another blov for planned obsolescence has been struck.

Last February the IRS decided that the decision applied to book publishers as well. Most publishers have been taking a similar kind of depreciation on their backlists for years. Almost every publisher prints hundreds of books that don't sell well, and keeps copies available in warehouses until at least the first printings have been sold out. That's because most publishers, despite their knowledge that they need a profit to stay in business, also have an antique fondness for publishing works of literary merit or scholarly distinction that they feel deserve to see print. The economics of publishing are such that the bestsellers subsidize the obscure poet or the promising author of a first novel or the works of little-known scholars.

Publishers generally take a bath on many of those books. They'll lose money. They keep them around, collecting dust in a warehouse, because they know that they'll get an occasional order from a scholar, or because they hope that merit will be recognized in the future. The backlists of some of our more distinguished publishers constitute a cultural resource kept intact by the foresight and willingness to forego larger profits of publishing companies.

Since the IRS ruling was announced, some publishers have already shredded books on their backlist. Others have told authors that their books will be destroyed unless they buy them up themselves. Some have increased their sales by 30 percent to remainder houses, which buy and sell books at discount.

The probable resits of this ruling also include: an increasing reluctance to publish slow-selling non-commercial or scholarlybooks, a more conservative attitude about publishing first books by young unknown authors, titles going out of print and becoming unavailable to researchers sooner and smaller first printings, which will drive up the cost of books for all readers.

The IRS has made its ruling about publishers retroactive to 1979, forcing publishers to amend previous tax returns. A bill to hold off implementation until the returns for 1980 (HR 7390) has been introduced by Rep. Barber Conable (R-NY) and Sen. Gaylord Nelsen (D-WI). That would offer a bit of relief, but would only postpone the problem



Chaos over custody

DEAR DR. BLAKER Last week I went to my 11year-old daughter's school for a conference with her teacher. Although my ex-wife has custody of the girl, I have visited her school every year to keep up with her progress.

But this time I met with a violent reaction. The teacher said I had no right to see my daughter's records because I am not considered a parent unless I have custody

She claims that is the law.

Is she right?
DEAR READER - The teacher's remarks may stem from a common misinterpretation of the 1974 Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. This legislation limits the right to inspect official student records to parents and legal guardians.

When this law is improperly interpreted, the parent without custody may be denied access to all of his or her child's records - even report cards. But, in fact, a parent retains the right to review those records regardless of whether he or she has custody.

Talk with your daughter's principal about this problem. If the problem persists and you don't want to take legal action, ask your ex-wife to officially authorize you to see the records.

Reinforce your interest in your daughter's progress at school by requesting duplicate report cards and school calen-

By all means, don't give up. Your daughter - and you, too can only gain from your continued involvement



Many causes of heel pain

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I have a foot spur on my right heel. It is very painful. I have been doctoring for three months with no results. I have had cortisone shots, ultrasound for me. Would you suggest everything I can think of for it surgery? I'm 70 years old.

DEAR READER - No. most people with heel spurs do not require surgery. The little bony prominence on the bottom of the heel bone often has nothing to do with the pain. There are many people who have the same kind of heel pain that you complain about and don't have a spur. Others have a spur that is clearly seen on an X-ray and have no pain. There are many causes for painful heels. That's why individuals who have such problems need an examination by a good foot

A common cause for such disorders is an inflammatory process involving the tendons and connective tissue that stretches across the long arch of the foot and inserts on the bottom of the heel bone. One explanation is that these tendons across the long arch are under strain and literally pull on that portion of the heel bone. The pulling action may a tiny fracture of changes in the bone which can result in a spur, as a complication of the process and not as a cause of the problem.

In some ways it's a lot like Osgood-Schlatter's disease that affects the knees in adolescence. The difference is that it more often involves older people and that may be because of years of strain across the arch of the foot itself.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) Reps. Hector Uribe, D-Brownsville, and Jerry Benedict, D-Angleton, say they considered putting parking meters at railroad crossings but decided stiffer fines would be just as good.

The two pre-filed a bill Tuesday for the 1981 Legislature that would allow judges to assess fines of \$500 to \$1,000 on railroads for blocking intersections. The current law, passed in 1921, sets the fine at \$5 to \$100.

"The existing penalties are simply too low to provide a deterrent to the railroads," said a joint statement. "The railroad companies simply treat them as another cost of doing business. We thought about putting parking meters at railroad crossings but couldn't find any that would take \$500 bills.

Their bill also would allow any railroad employee to be ticketed, not just the "driver."




