

# Global Oil Supply Gets Grim Report

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a grim report on global oil supplies, the Senate Energy Committee said today the United States is fooling itself if it believes reduced oil imports will insulate the nation from the hardships and possible conflicts resulting from the continuing energy shortage.

The committee, reporting on a year-long investigation into the international implications of the energy shortage, said the U.S. focus on reducing imports ignores the fact that energy self-sufficiency "is highly unlikely within this century, let alone within the next 10 years."

The committee said the stress on long-term energy independence has led the United States to neglect the urgent need to stockpile oil — for both civilian and military needs — to prepare the nation for likely supply disruptions.

It also said that producing nations have turned oil into a powerful political tool. "Oil has been used to induce the United States, France, Germany, Italy, Japan and Brazil to trade advanced weapon systems and certain technologies which have military applications to the Middle East," the report said.

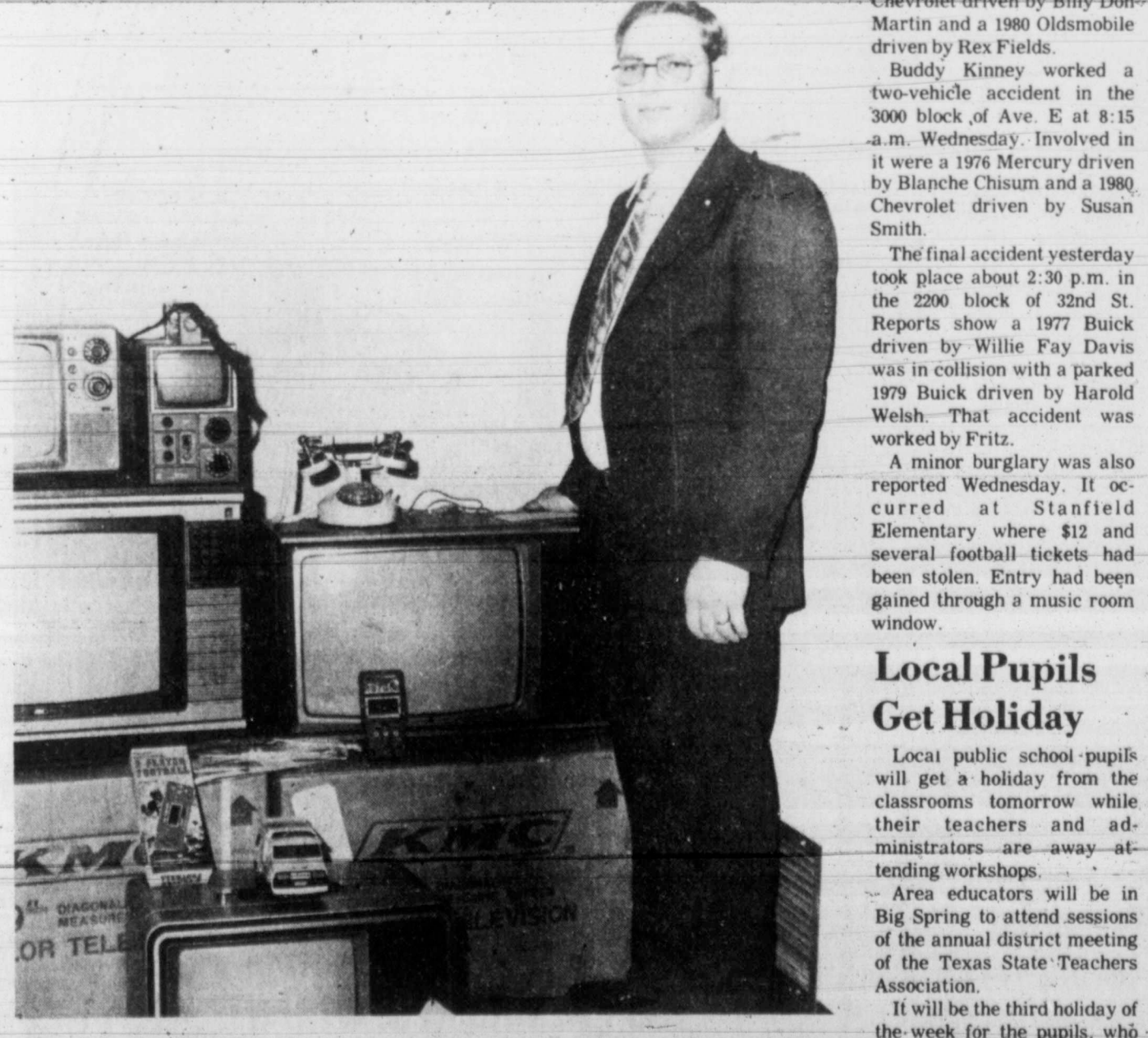

## 31 Gas, Oil Finds

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Railroad Commission said Wednesday Texas operators reported 31 oil discoveries and 31 gas discoveries in the state during the first half of November.

Through the first 10 1/2 months of the year, the commission said, operators have reported 636 oil discoveries, 175 more than in the same period last year.

Gas discoveries this year, total 1,228, an increase of 187 from the first 10 1/2 months of 1979, the commission said.

The new oil discoveries included eight in the San Angelo area; four each in West Central Texas and North Texas; three in the Refugio and Midland areas; two each in Southeast Texas, Lubbock and the Panhandle and one each in South Texas, East Central Texas and the San Antonio area.

The new gas discoveries included nine in Southeast Texas; five in the Refugio area; four in the San Antonio area; three each in South Texas, West Central Texas and North Texas; two in the Panhandle and one each in the Midland and Lubbock areas.

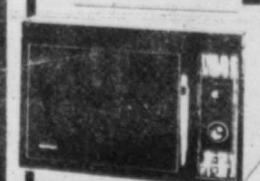

# Research Key To Food For Future

WASHINGTON (AP) — The head of research for the Agriculture Department has a long list of areas he says need to be explored if people are to adequately feed and clothe themselves in the future.

If basic research is not expanded, for example, he warned that agricultural production will not increase enough to keep pace with rising needs.

Anson R. Bertrand, director of the Science and Education Administration, said it will be expensive but that basic research "is a big priority" for the 1980s.

Bertrand's views were outlined Wednesday in a paper at the department's Agricultural Outlook Conference. The report was titled, "Food and Agricultural Research Agenda for the 1980s."

But a former department official, who served as the agency's chief economist in the Republican administrations of Richard Nixon and Gerald Ford, said Bertrand's report was "not really an agenda; it is a wish list."

Don Paarlberg, a Purdue University professor emeritus, raised questions about the method of setting priorities for expanded research projects, financing them and coordinating the projects.

"Requests for across-the-board increases for each of the disciplines will not be convincing to the appropriations committees," Paarlberg said. "In fact, this has turned them off in the past."

"Across-the-board requests for increased funds appear to the appropriations committees more as a defense of the research bureaucracy than as an earnest effort to solve the problems of agriculture."

In his research agenda, Bertrand offered a list of what

he said are "some of the broad issues" that will confront scientists, farmers and virtually all others in the coming decades. Those include global as well as domestic aspects of food production, and the use and care of land and water.

But it is basic research — literally, starting from

scratch — that is needed "before we can make the really dramatic improvements needed" in agricultural productivity, in loss reduction, in energy use and generation," Bertrand said.

"The plain fact is that we do not know enough today to be

able to increase significantly the efficiency of food production, preservation, processing and usage.

"Without planned and accelerated basic research efforts and some major breakthroughs, the rate of growth of our food crops and animal production will not

keep pace with needs."

Bertrand said the base of fundamental knowledge from which most scientists work is "a very thin foundation."

"I don't believe that the general public — whose human needs are in the forefront in setting our priorities — has the slightest

idea of how precarious our position is or what it takes to

## White Motors Bought By TIC

DALLAS (AP) — The chairman of the board of TIC Investment Corp., a privately owned local investment firm, says he intends to make the bankrupt White Farm Equipment line a "strong competitive force" in the farm equipment industry.

TIC Investment has agreed to buy the farm equipment and forklift truck businesses from White Motor Co., a Michigan-based truckmaker undergoing reorganization under federal bankruptcy laws.

The price of the purchase was not revealed. The sale is subject to the approval of the U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Cleveland, which is supervising White's affairs.

# Gay Bar Shooting Spree Kills Two

NEW YORK (AP) — A spray of machine gun fire outside two Greenwich Village gay bars has left two men dead and six wounded, and police have charged a former transit policeman who had an "intense" dislike for homosexuals.

"The shots just never stopped," said a bartender. "They just kept coming and coming...The bullets came right over the bar and hit a couple of bottles."

The former transit policeman, Ronald Crumpley, 38 of Manhattan, had been

cruising Village streets Wednesday night in a blue Cadillac belonging to his father, a minister, police said. Crumpley was dressed in a dark wool topcoat and a black, red-feathered fedora, police said.

Crumpley was charged with murder, attempted murder and illegal possession of a dangerous weapon.

"He has a dislike for homosexuals, a rather intense one I would say, under the circumstances," Lt. John Yuknes said.

The first shots were fired from the Cadillac shortly before 11 p.m. at Sim's Deli, where at least three people were wounded and the front plate-glass window was shattered with slugs from an automatic handgun, police said.

The weapon was one of three

purchased in the South a few days ago, police said.

Minutes later, the man drove to Christopher Street, left the car and gunned a man down at the curb with an Israeli-made Uzi machine gun, police said. He shot at another man and then leveled the weapon at Sneakers and Ramrod, two gay bars next door to each other, police said.

"The man in the Cadillac...stepped out of the car calmly, walked up to the curb and shot a man standing on the curb waiting for a cab," said Dann Hedges, 30, who was in Sneakers at the time.

"The man fell to the ground, then he (the gunman) shot another guy who ran around the corner. He started spraying both bars through the plate-glass windows. Then he got back into the car and drove off," said Hedges, who scribbled the car's license plate number on a dollar bill and gave the number to police.

John Ganrecki, who suffered a shattered bone in his finger, said, "I heard a noise up front...It sounded like a string of firecrackers. People were falling on the floor and there was a screaming and yelling..."

"It was like something in Al Capone; there is a row of bullet holes across the glass behind the bar," he said.

One wounded man died on the operating table, said spokeswoman Rita Conyers at St. Vincent's Hospital. He was not immediately identified, and more than 20 patrons of Ramrod had gone to the hospital in an effort to identify him.

Another victim, identified as Joig Wenz, 21, of New York City, came to the hospital in critical condition and died early today, Ms. Conyers said. Another person was in serious condition and the other five were "in better shape," she said.

After the gunman drove off, a pursuing radio patrol car crashed into a mailbox and a parked car. The two officers inside received minor injuries.

Police later spotted Crumpley's fedora on the sidewalk and found him under a car, trying to pull himself up into the undercarriage so he would not be seen.

He said Crumpley, married and the father of three, is an unemployed cab or truck driver.

Crumpley's father, the Rev. G. Grant Crumpley of New Rochelle, said in a telephone interview, "I know that he is a sick man and this is a terrible thing...I'm very tired and numb about this."

He said his son had been a Transit Authority policeman for nine years.

7 Students Convicted

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Seven University of Texas students from the Middle East have been found guilty of violating university rules when they disrupted a speech last Jan. 31 by the former Iranian Ambassador to the United Nations, Fereydoon Hoveyda.

Professor George Dix, hearing officer for the university disciplinary proceedings, said another hearing would be held to consider penalties for the students. The 11 possible penalties range from a written admonition to suspension or expulsion.

The students were among 12 demonstrators, nine Iranians and three Palestinians, who were found guilty in September in a non-jury county court trial of disrupting the speech by the former spokesman for the late Shah of Iran. Each was fined \$200 and given a jail sentence. None had to serve any time because the judge credited them for time already spent in jail after their arrests in January.

Dix did not set a date for the disciplinary hearing.

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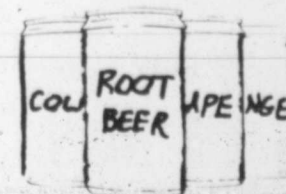
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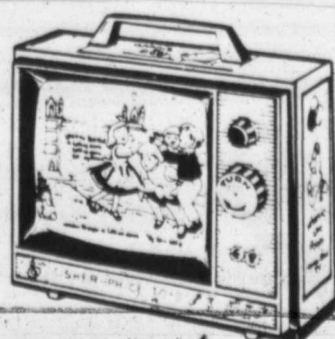
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# Duster Group Intelligent, Says Coach Cushing

Ask Joe Cushing about his Dusters' 8-0 start this season and you're likely to get some honest, but indirect answers.

"I really haven't given it a lot of thought," he spoke, Wednesday morning after Western Texas beat Cisco 74-65 the night before.

"I thought we were going to have a real good ballclub and I'm pleased with us being 8-0 on the year, but it hasn't been something I've concentrated on. I don't think the girls are dwelling on it, either. I'm not even sure they are all that aware of it, in the sense that it's a big thing with them. We haven't talked about it or anything."

But since he brought the subject up, Cushing does have ideas on why the team is undefeated heading into the Hawk Queens Tournament tonight at Big Spring.

"This bunch is real intelligent in their approach to the game. They do what they have to do to win. You notice we haven't blown anybody out...with the possible exception of Ranger (70-36)," he pointed out. "They've played good basketball when they've had too. They are very intelligent about what they want to do and what they are trying to accomplish, and I have a great deal of respect for them for that," he added.

Which is one reason Cushing won't be worried if the Dusters beat Tyler at 6 tonight, and Cisco knocks off Odessa. That would set up a third WTC-Cisco match of the season tomorrow night at 6. The Dusters have already beaten the Wranglerettes twice this year.

"I really don't think we'd be overconfident," Cushing stressed. "Cisco has a good ballclub. I think we're smart enough to realize that if we should play them again we can't afford to let up."

Another force Cushing has working for him this year is his freshman members.

"We've had a lot of freshman girls coming through for us in clutch situations. These people are coming on. They're beginning to realize they are going to have to play right now. They've been the difference in most of the close ballgames we've encountered so far.

"Also, that 8-0 record includes only three games at home, which means we've played extremely well on the road. I think that speaks well for the girls, too."

## Duran Confident, But Sugar Ray Says He's Ready

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Good fighters learn by experience. So what did Roberto Duran and Sugar Ray Leonard learn about one another in Montreal that will help them in their rematch for the World Boxing Council welterweight championship Tuesday night in the Superdome?

Duran, who won the title on a close but unanimous decision June 20, is cagey when asked.

"I learned a lot," said the Panamanian Wednesday. "I'll show you at the fight."

As for what Leonard learned that might be useful in the rematch, Duran said, "I don't think he can do anything more than he did in the first fight. If he does anything more, I'll be ready for it."

"There have not been any drastic changes," Leonard said of battle plans. "I just found out I have a left jab. I'll just pace myself more carefully this time."

"The left hand will be in play this time," said Angelo Dundee, who trains Leonard.

Dundee and Janks Morton, another Leonard aide, feels Leonard didn't jab and move enough in the first fight and that he shouldn't have tried to fight it out in the early rounds when Duran gained his winning edge.

"We're going to fight him, but this time later on when Ray has taken the steam out of Duran," said Dundee.

Freddy Brown, who helps train Duran, doesn't think it matters what strategy Leonard employs. "Duran will fight the other guy's fight," said Brown. "When Duran walks into the ring, he's the boss."

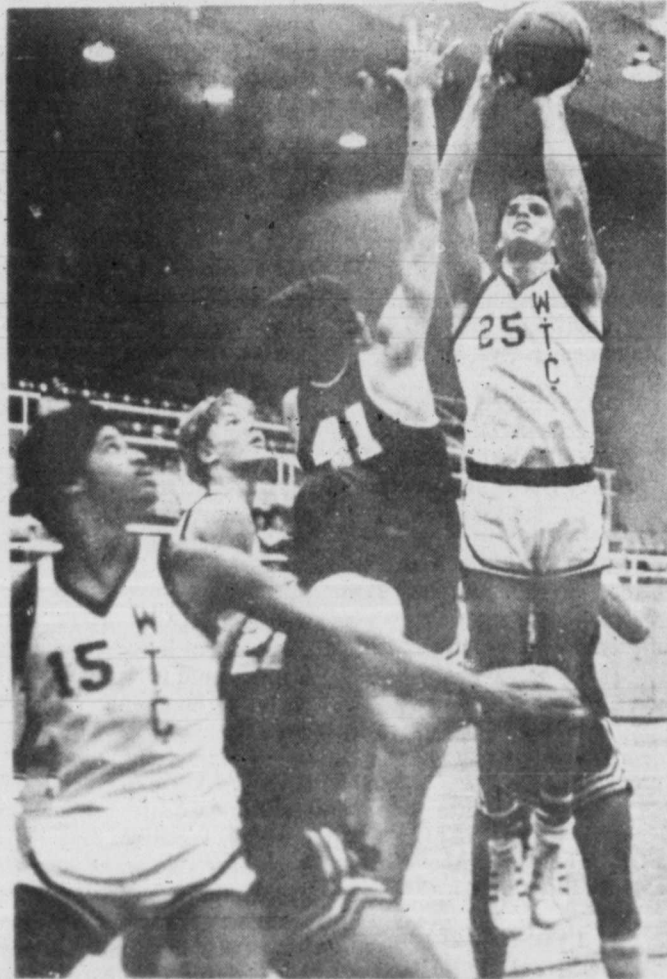
Ray Arcel, another of Duran's strategists, feels the first fight might have left a scar on Leonard. "It affected Leonard mentally," said Arcel. "It took all the guts out of him. It's a boy in against a man."

"The 15 rounds with Duran is all he needed," said Dundee. "He knows Duran now. He's seen Duran. Duran doesn't punch a lot, two-punch combinations and everything else is a foul. He does everything in there."

Morton chimed in that Leonard "learned he butts a lot. He learned he holds a lot. That's the main thing. He learned he uses his head more than he punches."

The Leonard camp was not happy with referee Carlos Padilla in Montreal, claiming he let Duran maul and wouldn't separate the fighters. There also was dissatisfaction over the judging. One judge scored 10 even rounds and the other two called five rounds and four rounds even, respectively.

"But this is not a one-man show," May said. "It's a team effort all the way, and I'll be honored to accept it on behalf of my team. I'm also very happy for my parents."

May, who will receive the award at a dinner in Seattle in February, was a high school standout in Oneonta, N.Y., and he has been a starter at Pitt since he was a freshman.

Pitt offensive line Coach Joe Moore says, "Pro scouts tell me that he is the finest offensive line prospect in the country. His size, speed, agility and intelligence are unbelievable."

Gil Brant, the player-personnel director of the Dallas Cowboys, has said, "He

looks like a pro lineman right now. He is so big and so strong and obviously a great pass protector."

Pitt Coach Jackie Sherrill said it was a pleasure to put the finishing touches on the talented tackle.

## Cancer Patients To Get Pot Pills

HOUSTON (AP) — Synthetic marijuana pills may be prescribed as early as Friday at the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute here for cancer patients suffering the painful side effects of chemotherapy, a hospital spokesman says.

Dr. Fred G. Conrad said Tuesday the National Cancer Institute has mailed 1,200 capsules to the hospital, where 15 physicians have been approved by federal authorities to prescribe the medication.

Conrad, vice president of patient care, said the pills probably will be given to 48 patients.

"Personally, I have at least 7 or 8 patients on chemotherapy coming to the clinic Friday and if any of them are having bad nausea, I will tell them about the new pills," Conrad said.

The man-made pills contain a synthetic form of THC, or delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol, a natural substance found in marijuana plants.

He predicted doctors at M.D. Anderson will need a "minimum of 3 to 6 months" will be needed to evaluate the usefulness of the pills.

The new and somewhat controversial pill will be prescribed to patients undergoing chemotherapy and suffering excessive nausea and vomiting that standard medication has not relieved.

Use of the marijuana-type capsules is "highly experimental" but early research at other cancer centers has indicated it has been a boon to patients taking potent anti-cancer drugs, he said.

Conrad also serves as chairman of a Texas

Department of Health committee formed to monitor the use of marijuana for medical purposes throughout Texas.

He said several other treatment centers across the state probably will be using the synthetic pills soon.

Patients must sign consent forms before the synthetic pills are prescribed.

## Bones Belong To Mososaur

DALLAS (AP) — An expert has determined that bones discovered by a brick company employee belonged to a mososaur — a 60-million-year-old, 30-foot aquatic reptile.

After years of scrapping clay to make bricks, Luvénson Davis of Ferris thought he had found his first dinosaur Friday.

But Southern Methodist University paleontologist Bob Slaughter Monday declared the fossil that of a mososaur, a member of the lizard family that lived at the same time as dinosaurs.

If enough of the animal's bones are found, Slaughter indicated he would attempt to reconstruct it.

## Man Shoots Wife

RICHARDSON, Texas (AP) — A belief that his wife was having an extramarital affair caused Allen Monroe to chase her out of the house with a .38-caliber revolver, police investigators said Monday.

Kathy Monroe, 36, was shot and killed as she screamed for help on her next-door neighbors' porch Sunday.

Monroe, 37, was released from Richardson City Jail Monday after posting \$15,000 cash bond, police said. His bond was reduced from \$100,000 during a hearing before state District Judge John Vance Monday, said Monroe's lawyer, Mark Holland.

Richardson Police Chief Kenneth Yarbrough said Monroe heard reports from three associates on a hunting trip that his wife was having an affair.

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# Defeat Leaves Carter A More Humble Man

WASHINGTON (AP) — A different Jimmy Carter has emerged since his election defeat. In contrast to the hard-driving, almost self-righteous Carter of the past, he now appears more humble and seems no longer to be trying so hard to impress. He is considerably more likeable, human and accessible.

From the moment he conceded defeat the night of Nov. 4, the president has borne his pain in a graceful, self-deprecating way that has aroused empathy even among some people who may not have been fans of his.

In the past, Carter seemed unable to poke fun at himself, taking most things very seriously. But the jokes come more easily and the pain shows through, too.

This changed Jimmy Carter has been evident in his public appearances since the election

quite so heavy a schedule these days as I have had in the past.

When he was asked if he made any "obvious mistakes" in his campaign, he joked: "Well, I obviously didn't get enough votes."

His sadness about the campaign was obvious. It was in his face and his demeanor, especially at church last Sunday, when his Bible class read him a resolution of condolence.

Rosalynn Carter, who attended church with her husband, kept her eyes riveted on him as he taught the lesson. She seemed demoralized.

It may have simply coincided, but some observers saw symbolism in his lesson about Christianity, based on a Bible verse that basically says, "Be kind to one another, forgiving as God forgives you."

For the first time in his presidency, he appeared unannounced last week in the White House press room. It was the second time since the election that he'd met informally with reporters.

### Many causes of heel pain

**DEAR DR. LAMB** — I have a foot spur on my right heel. It is very painful. I have been doctoring for three months with no results. I have had cortisone shots, ultrasound and Trilisate tablets three times a day plus aspirin. I also wear supports. Nothing works for me. Would you suggest surgery? I'm 70 years old.

**DEAR READER** — No, most people with heel spurs do not require surgery. The little bony prominence on the bottom of the heel bone often has nothing to do with the pain. There are many people who have the same kind of heel pain that you complain about and don't have a spur. Others have a spur that is clearly seen on an X-ray and have no pain. There are many causes for painful heels. That's why individuals who have such problems need an examination by a good foot doctor.

A common cause for such disorders is an inflammatory process involving the tendons and connective tissue that stretches across the long arch of the foot and inserts on the bottom of the heel bone. One explanation is that these tendons across the long arch are under strain and literally pull on that portion of the heel bone. The pulling action may cause a tiny fracture of changes in the bone which can result in a spur, as a complication of the process and not as a cause of the problem.

In some ways it's a lot like Osgood-Schlatter's disease that affects the knees in adolescence. The difference is that it more often involves older people and that may be because of years of strain across the arch of the foot itself.

Heel spurs are discussed in The Health Letter number 11-10, Common Foot Problems: What to Do about Them, which I'm sending you. Others who want this issue can send

It sounds like your doctor is doing the right things. Resting your foot is very important. Using different types of pads or support which changes the weight bearing so you don't have so much strain across the arch is the usual approach. The other ingredient that you need is time.

In general, I'm not enthusi-

astic about surgery for most cases of heel spurs. In the first place, it often doesn't solve the basic problem and in some instances it makes matters worse.

**DEAR DR. LAMB** — Could you please tell me what causes an uncontrollable itch of the scrotum? Short of going to a doctor, I have done about everything I can think of for it — sitz baths, ointments, etc. This is the only area affected. I've had this problem for the last six months. I've heard that a kidney condition could cause this problem.

**DEAR READER** — To put it plainly, the most likely cause, is "jock itch." That's sort-of like having athlete's feet of the crotch and it's caused by a fungus. If that's what you have, the proper ointments will correct it. See your doctor and let him find out for sure what you have and suggest a proper local treatment that can clear up the condition.

## Attorney Says Case Will Determine Who Rules Kids

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The lawyer leading evangelist Lester Roloff's umpteenth battle against state licensing of his children's homes says the outcome of this fight could determine if only the state can decide how to care for youngsters.

"This is a very important case, however, it goes," attorney William Ball said during a break in Tuesday's civil trial. "It could determine whether there will be methodology other than the state's chosen means for the care of children."

The State of Texas long has argued that Roloff needs a state license to operate his homes for wayward youth and courts previously have ruled in favor of the government.

The evangelist, however, has steadfastly refused. He has testified the state has no right to license what the Lord has called him to do.

Roloff recently shifted control of his homes from Roloff Evangelistic Enterprises to his People's Baptist Church of Corpus Christi.

He argues that the state cannot require a license because the constitution guarantees separation of church and state.

Assistant Attorney General David Young, who is seeking \$46,000 in civil penalties and an order forcing Roloff to get a license, put on the state's short case Monday. Testimony continued today in

the suit.

"Comprehensive, suffocating, minute surveillance is a very, very dangerous thing where First Amendment liberties are involved," Ball said.

The Harrisburg, Pa., lawyer said State District Judge Charles Mathews' ruling could also decide "whether to carry out a religious ministry to children one has to be under state control."

Since Monday, Ball has called residents of the homes, Roloff officials, and Roloff.

During Tuesday's testimony, Ball tried to show

education laws. In both cases, he said, courts decided the religious groups had the right to keep their children out of high school.

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# Voice Of America Adds More Tongues To Arsenal

WASHINGTON (AP) — America is renovating its communications weaponry in an intensifying competition for the ears of the world. Exotic tongues like Uzbek and Azeri, spoken by Islamic nationals in the Soviet Union, are being added to the language arsenal of the Voice of America that daily beams news and policy views around the globe.

More powerful transmitters are joining the 100 already on station at home and abroad to reach more of the estimated worldwide audience of 400 million shortwave radio listeners. "The Voice of America should be heard in every square inch of the earth," says John R. Reinhardt, director of the U.S. International Communications Agency (USICA), the body charged with the nation's "public diplomacy"

effort. In addition to broadcasting, the effort includes educational and cultural exchanges. But even as the Voice of America is strengthened in its competition with the 122 national radios that crowd the airwaves, there are worries that the other arms of America's public diplomacy are withering. "We are a poor fourth in the world today after the French, the West Germans and the

Soviets," says Alice Ilchman, associate director of the USICA for educational and cultural affairs. "Thirty-five presidents and prime ministers currently in office came to America at some time in their careers on our exchange programs. But because of funding problems we are in danger of losing contact with a whole generation of new leaders." The Voice of America is benefiting from increased

congressional interest in spreading the U.S. message abroad. Nearly a quarter of the half-billion-dollar budget for USICA is spent on broadcasting, and money has been appropriated for new equipment. "We need it badly," says director Mary Bitterman, whose staff works in a building at the foot of Capitol Hill on equipment that was installed in the early 1950s. "I was very troubled to find how

aniquated it was." Radio Moscow is VOA's chief competitor, broadcasting around 2,000 hours each week in 85 languages. VOA broadcasts 885 hours in 39 languages. Other, friendlier competitors are the British Broadcasting Corporation and West Germany's Deutsche Welle. VOA says it reaches about 80 million regular listeners around the globe, and it's particularly pleased with its

16 hours of Chinese and English language broadcasts to China. "A recent delegate here told us our audience is in the millions," Mrs. Bitterman says. "You don't call on Chinese officials between 8 and 8:30. That's when they listen to the Voice of America." Whether its program philosophy is on the right track, however, has been a matter of continuing debate. "There are those who

believe we're a Goebbels-like propaganda operation," says Mrs. Bitterman. "Others feel we should talk less about America's own difficulties. They point out that the Soviet Union does not share its problems with an international audience." Mrs. Bitterman, 36, a former manager of public television station KHET in Honolulu, says credibility is of

VOA uses foreign and American and foreign news services and 19 domestic and foreign bureaus to supply the news and analysis that make up 65 percent of its program.

VOA buttressed its credibility, says Alan Baker, chief of the Near East and South Asia Division, "by our candid reporting of the

Watergate affair. After hearing us report on it for months, our listeners realized we were honestly reporting the dismantling of our government."

A congressional charter for VOA in 1976 further aimed at strengthening VOA's credibility. It decreed that VOA would serve as a "consistently reliable and authoritative source of news," would represent America and "not any single segment of American society," and present the policies of the

United States "clearly and effectively."

In addition to the news and a bit of Americana, VOA also serves up news analyses and commentaries that reflect the views of the U.S. government.

These are "almost like a commercial break for the government, suitably labeled," says News Director Bernard Kammensky. News Editor John Scultz puts it this way: "Our news reports are the engine, the commentaries the freight we have to carry."

In commentaries directed at

Southeast Asia, the Voice seeks to reassure allies of continued U.S. interest. "Some may have thought that the American departure from Vietnam portended a larger United States departure from Asia, and abandonment of America's longstanding role as a Pacific power. Nothing could be further from the truth. The United States today remains strongly committed to policies aimed at protecting the security and enhancing the economic future of this key part of the world."

Not everyone on the staff raves about the commentaries. Ronald J. Dunlavy, one of VOA's team of news analysis and com-

mentary writers, says they tend to be "heavy-handed and flat-footed" because "it sends a shudder through the bureaucracy to be casual. We're tied down by policy guidelines."

But policy surveillance can be more intrusive.

An analysis Dunlavy wrote on the Bicentennial celebration deplored commercialization of the event. "The piece was killed by the policy office uptown with the comment that it was one of the worst examples of the VOA running down America," he says.

Director Bitterman says VOA doesn't close its ears to critics. "There used to be much more oversight, par-

ticularly by ambassadors. We aren't opposed to hearing from ambassadors today, but neither they nor anyone else can tell us what to broadcast."

Suggestions nevertheless abound.

Some demand a harder propaganda line. Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., recently urged VOA to encourage the Afghan people to "rise up" against the Soviet occupiers.

Rep. Lionel Van Deerlin, D-Calif., complained earlier this year that the voices of Moscow and Peking were louder in the Middle East than America's and said, "this is a war of words we can't afford to lose."

Soviet exile Alexander Solzhenitsyn has complained that the Voice of America

avoids angering the Soviet leadership. "In their zeal to preserve detente, they remove everything from their broadcast which might irritate the Communists in power."

But Sen. Charles Mathias, R-Md., counselling against a greater political role, says, "the losers in a successful effort to change VOA from the voice of truth into an instrument of propaganda would be ourselves. It is the simple truth about America that we seek to communicate, not some hoked-up message."

John Reinhardt, the director of the parent USICA, agrees. "This country does not need

and should not want a propaganda agency. We do not need to trim the truth. The power of our ideas, the grandeur of our accomplishments, speak for themselves."

VOA officials doubt if they need to match the Soviet advantage in broadcast hours and languages because what they mostly put on the air is straight propaganda "and we don't bother counterpunching."

Already broadcasting to the Soviets in five languages, more than 20 hours a day, the Voice will add Uzbek and Azeri, aimed at the Islamic nationals in the Soviet south.
