WASHINGTON (AP) - Led by surging mortgage rates, consumer prices in October climbed another full percentage point for a 12.6 percent compound annual rate, the government said today.

October's 1.0 percent increase in the Consumer Price Index matched September's rise, the Labor Department said. For the first 10 months of 1980, inflation at the consumer level accelerated at a compound, seasonally adjusted 12.2 percent annual rate.

Last year's inflation rate was 13.3 percent.

Chrysler Makes Money Again

DETROIT (AP) - Chrysler Corp. recorded a profit last month for the first time in two years, but Chairman Lee A. Iacocca says the quarter will not be profitable unless sales pick.up.

"It all hinges" on dealers taking the three weeks of production scheduled for December, Iacocca said in an interview published Monday in Automotive News.

He did not disclose the earnings figures for October. Chrysler, like most corporations, does not report monthly results.

But the Grant Teaff-Baylor story goes back to 1972. That was the year that Baylor had to make a big decision. Their football team had won three games and lost 28 in the preceding three years. They decided to give big-time football at least one more chance. A frantic search for a successful, "name" coach began. Ultimately they announced that the mission had been accomplished. Baylor had found a coach to lead their football team out of the wilderness.

But all celebrations were short-lived. Their big name coach had second thoughts and it was back to square one on the search. Then, came the announcement that Grant Teaff, head coach at Angelo State University, had been employed to take over the Bears

There were those who doubted that the "church and private schools" would ever be able to compete again on the level with the big state institutions. None in the Southwest Conference had come close since SMU did it in 1966. But, in 1974, Teaff's Baylor Bears shocked the experts by winning Baylor's first conference football title in 50 years. This also meant the first ployment opportunities. Cotton Bowl appearance for the Bears and a full round of festivities. Snyder honored Teaff with a special day which was climaxed at a Chamber of Commerce banquet with him as the Elizabeth Potts, chairman, guest speaker.



Those who thought Teaff's sudden success at Baylor was a fluke, or a flash-in-the-pan soon learned that his program was for real. The Bears finished the 1979 season with an 8-3 won-loss record and then defeated Clemson in the Peach Bowl. This year's team, of course, has improved on that record and is looking forward to the Cotton Bowl on Jan. 1.


Grant Teaff naturally has a lot of fans in Snyder in additon to his parents, Bill and Inez Teaff. There's a sprinkling of Baylor graduates and their relatives and others, including Grant's high school coach, Speedy Moffett, whom incidentally, told this writer back in 1972 that if any body could get Baylor's football fortunes on the upswing, he believed Grant Teaff could do it.

It had been exactly 50 years since Baylor had won a conference football championsship when Grant Teaff's team did it in 1974. So he has done something twice in nine years that his predecessors couldn't do in 50 years.



A fellow named Frank Bridges was coach at Baylor when it won conference titles in 1922 and 1924. He was an innovator--one of those coaches whose imaginative systems resulted in various rules coming into being. We had the privilege of talking with Bridges in his later years while he was scouting for the Chicago White Sox baseball team. He had some fond memories of his championships at Baylor, but he had a bad year in 1925 and moved on, according to Bridges himself, at the suggestion the Baylor administration.

We figure Grant Teaff is on more solid footing and if he ever leaves Baylor it will be for a far different reason. The very hought of such a thing sends cold chills down the spine of **Baylor** fans.



Farmers' Costs Easing

WASHINGTON (AP) - Farmers' costs for producing corn, wheat and other important crops will continue to climb in 1981, but not at the rapid clip of this year, according to Agriculture Department analysts.

The department conducts comprehensive surveys and research on a variety of production costs, including selected crops and livestock

Generally, costs have increased substantially for all crops since 1978, says Robert E. Olson of the department's Economics and Statistics Service. And those will go up again next year.

Per-acre production cost increases may be in the range of 10 to 13 percent in 1981," Olson said at last week's Agricultural Outlook Conference. "This is considerably less than the increase of about 20 percent in 1980."

Pay Off Money Not Returned

HOUSTON (AP) - Walter Ray Duckett won't get his \$2,300 back

Duckett, 30, is under a 10-year probated sentence on a jury conviction on a charge of solicitation of capital murder. Prosecutors said he paid \$2,300 in an unsuccessful attempt to have his estranged wife killed.

State District Judge William Hatten was asked Monday to see that the money was returned to Duckett. Prosecutors objected, contending the state should get the money since it was linked to a criminal case.

Duckett's lawyers then said the restaurant owner would match the amount if the court awarded the money to the Shriners Crippled Children's Institute.

Hatten agreed with the prosecution and turned the money over to the district attorney's special crimes unit.

Polish Workers Slow Traffic


WARSAW, Poland (AP) - Polish workers today interrupted commuter service in Warsaw and the Baltic port of Gdansk, shut down five factories around the capital and staged a slowdown at nine coal mines in the southern province of Katowice.

The Polish news agency PAP said the railway workers from Solidarity, the nation's biggest independent union, temporarily shut down service on commuter lines in Warsaw and Gdansk.



For the last six years, the United States and a handful of other Western countries have been fighting a rearguard battle against attempts by the Third World and the Soviet bloc to sanction censorship of international news reporting. Results of the 21st general conference of the United Nations Educational. Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) leave little doubt that the defenders of a free press are steadily losing ground.

UNESCO delegates meeting recently in Belgrade voted to establish a commission charged with judging the performance of international news agencies on vaguely defined political grounds. The commission, part of UNESCO's effort to establish a "new world information order," is to report its findings at the next UNESCO conference in 1983.

This is no mere academic debate. At stake is the right of people everywhere to an unfettered flow of news and information from around the world. Communist states and goverments in much of the Third World already routinely deny that right to their own citizens. The continuing struggle among UNESCO delegates may ultimately determine whether these national censors can begin blue-penciling the dispatches of foreign corresponents, and whether this censorship will be imposed with the official sanction of UNESCO.


Understandably, the debate is couched in terms less stark than censorship versus a free press. Third World delegates, egged on by Soviet Union, talk of the "responsibility of the mass media to contribute to strengthening peace and international understanding, to the promotion of human rights and to countering racialism, apartheid and incitement to war." But behind these seemingly innocuous words lurks a principle wholly incompatible with a free press: namely, that

the media should serve ideological goals judged, by totalitarians for example, to be more important than objective truth Robin Chandler Duke, the U.S. delegate to UNESCO, said it

as well as anyone when she told the conference, "we reject the notion that a free media can or should be coerced into serving as a tool of social or economic policy."

Yet, when the committee battles and floor debates ended, only Switzerland chose to defy "world opinion" and vote against the establishment of the UNESCO commission. We think it's time for the United States as well to put the would-be censors at UNESCO on notice that this country does not and will not recognize the right of any international organization to decide the content of news reports made available to the American people



True, the press does pride tself on going to almost any length for a good story.

Even so, a billion miles might be considered extreme. Yet there it is on the front pages - Voyager's close encounter with Saturn, its mystifying rings and multiple moons. It will take years to organize and analyze all the information the spacecraft is radioing back to earth. But even the sketchy details made public so far have added immensely to our knowledge of the planet and the solar system- and also posed some immensely puzzling new questions.

Even with the photos, it is a big story. With them, it is a front-page spectacular. It is a little like the so-recently past good old days of space exploration, when man was reaching for and landing on the moon.

And there, the very success of Voyager points up a problem. The space program as presently planned may already have seen the best of its days.

There isn't much now scheduled to follow 'Voyager. A twin, Voyager 2, will reach Saturn next August for a follow-up look, then continue on to rendezvous with the two giant planets even farther from the sun, Uranus in January 1986 and Neptune in August 1989.

After that will come the Galileo mission, a spacecraft to orbit Jupiter and drop a probe into its atmosphere. Providing, that is, the Space Shuttle program does not continue to fall behind schedule. Delays already have pushed Galileo, to be launched from the shuttle, back from 1982 to 1983.

Beyond that, there are only tentative plans, and hopes. A probe similar to Galileo to Saturn and its moon Titan,"

The scientific establisment, for example, generally viewed the moonlanding program as unnecessarily costly for the rewards. Much more could have been accomplished with unmanned missions. But

Since he has been the baddest dude in the land for so long, he goes where he wants when he wants, seldom bothering to concern himself with what's on either side of him. BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - Celia and Javier Padilla squirmed in their chairs waiting for a school official to fill out their enrollment cards in a derstand.

The youngsters were among the 13 illegal aliens who enrolled Monday, in local schools after a federal judge lifted a 30-day freeze on their admittance.

"We've got some that came in who had to go across (the river) to Matamoros (Mexico) to get birth certificates. They'll be back," said Alonzo Perez, attendance officer for Oct. 17 have had difficulty the Brownsville Independent School District.

The poor, border school system tried unsuccessfully to be excused from a statewide order to admit illegal aliens to public schools. Other schools watched the case, thinking structured environment. Brownsville had the best chance to win an exemption from the order.

Last summer, U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals of Houston struck down a state law prohibiting use of state funds to educate illegal aliens.



97 Dead **After Gas** Explosion

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) - A leaking tank of liquefied gas exploded at an engagement party in a rural village near Ankara Wednesday night and at least 97 people were killed, provincial authorities reported.

They said many of the victims were children trampled in the panic to escape.

An initial investigation indicated that one of several small tanks of gas used for cooking exploded and the others then blew up in a series of blasts that demolished the complex of rooms used for the party, the officials said.

According to customs still followed in rural Turkey, the women and children were segregated from the men and the groups were just sitting down to eat when the explosions occurred, followed by a fire, according to in-

vestigators. Rescue workers said many of the bodies were found in the kitchen and main dining room. Among the victims was the bride-to-be, Dondu Daggelew.


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

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
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Westerners Carrying On Tradition

Whether or not that will continue is of no debate here. What's been done has been done, and it is the future of Westerner basketball that should be be of upmost concern to followers of the 1980-81 squad. No one has a right to compare this year's Westerner squad, nor Duster squad, nor Figer squad to the past.

WHAT'S IMPORTANT ABOUT the 11 men who make up the current WTC men's team is their attitude in facing the situation and the pressure that the past has automatically thrust on their shoulders.

The Westerners' latest achievement was to win the Crippled Childrens' Tournament in Oklahoma City. A trio of sophomores, Chuck North, Keith Denis and Donald Warren, were all selected to the All-Tournament Team. They revealed some of their feelings about the current Westerners squad early






