The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has come out with an interesting and colorful folder unsuitable for mountain titled "Texas Rocks and Fossils. villages above 3,000 feet.

It documents a surprising number of mineral and gem stones that are found in substantial quantities in the state. The folder divides the state into seven regions, each with its

own "specialties" in rocks.

Scurry County sits near the line separating the High Plains and North Central Texas regions, both rich in minerals and gem stones, according to the accompanying lists. However, the best bets for collecting interesting rocks on the High Plains are along the Caprock and in the Palo Duro Canyon area, according to the information in the folder.

The North Central Texas region has the biggest variety. Its area begins just south of Big Spring, veers southeast to include San Angelo and northeast to cover the area roughly from Scurry County to Weatherford and north to the Oklahoma line. It has fossils dating back 300 million years, several varieties of quartz, calcite and petrified wood. And this is the region that includes the famous dinosaur tracks in Dinosaur Valley State Park near-Glen Rose.

Such things as topaz, garnet, amethyst, quartz, agate, tourmaline and citrine are listed as more or less common in Texas, if you know where to look for them.

Judge Warns Strikers

HOUSTON (AP) - A state judge has ordered union members picketing a major supermarket chain here to refrain from threatening or committing acts of violence against employees who cross the lines.

A lawsuit filed by J. Weingarten's Inc. prompted State District Judge Lynn Hughes to issue the temporary restraining order Tuesday

Acts of violence and intimidation have occured repeatedly since a strike by the Meat Cutters and Allied Food Workers Local 408 and the United Food and Commercial Workers Local 455 began Nov. 20, the suit said.

Ford Pays In Bias Suit

DETROIT (AP) - Some 12,500 minority and women employees of Ford Motor Co. will be receiving awards ranging from \$400 to \$2,000 following the settlement of a 7-year-old discrimination dispute between the No. 2 automaker and the federal government, officials say.

The \$23 million agreement was announced Tuesday by Ford and the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunities Commission.

Under the plan, the automaker agreed to pay \$13 million in damages and spend another \$10 million on training and affirmative action programs.

In addition, Ford promised to fill 20 percent of all foreman openings and 15 percent of all general supervisor openings with minorities. General supervisors are a grade above foremen. Ford also pledged to fill 30 percent of all hourly openings with

The automaker made no admission of discrimination in the public release describing the settlement.

The other victims were not identified immediately.

The blasts and fires knocked out power lines and plunged the area into darkness. Hours later, firemen were still toppling burning utility poles while electrical lines crackled overhead.

Officials evacuated 200 to 300 people from surrounding homes and opened an emergency center at the Kenner City Hall. Officials said most of those evacuated stayed with friends or relatives.

Only shattered hulls remained of four vehicles caught in the blast -- the 18wheeler and its cab, another tractor eab, a pickup truck and the car at the crossing.

In addition, the parking lot of the bar was littered with the debris of up to a dozen other burned out cars.

foreign aid pitfalls

Baron Rudiger von Wechmar, the president of the United and Nations Assembly, has set diplomats in that tunnel of winds on their ears by openly criticizing his own country, West Germany, and other rich western nations for not cooperating fully in negotiating a new international economic order, and for being stingy in the aid they give to struggling Third World nations. We're not upset that von Wechmar has committed the diplomatic sin of saying something of substance at the UN, where substance and sense are so rare as to be foreign entities. But it's too bad that the good baron is so wrongheaded about what he thinks will really help the Third World nations

The term "new international economic order" has become a widely accepted code word for a set of proposals that certain government leaders in the Third World want the West to adopt. Among them are the development of cartels among countries with raw material resources in order to raise prices and massive western government aid to poorer countries. The net effect of the program would be to make the rulers and elite of Third World countries, who are already affluent in terms of their own countries' economies, much richer and more powerful than they are now. The impact on the truly poor and hungry of the Third World would be practically nil.

The problem with the kind of aid envisioned by the baron is that it is government-to-government aid. It is the kind of aid that is generally aimed at making the existing government . situation more stable. The existing arragement in most Third World countries is some sort of quasi-socialist regime with control or ownership firmly in the hands of a small group of government officials and their friends. Aid to such governments won't help the poor or feed the hungry


What will help Third World countries is for them to get out of the government ownership rut and permit individual ownership, entrepreneurship and free trade. The problem isn't scarcity of resources or overpopulation, but repressive political systems that discourage production and the striving of individuals to better their circulstances. Anyone who thinks aid from rich western governments will abet these kinds of salutary changes in the Third World is living in Fantasyland.

It's encouraging to note that more Americans outside the government aid establishment are taking note of these facts. The Institute for Food and Development Policy in San Francisco has published a book called Aid as Obstacle which deals at length with 10 questions regarding foreign aid. The institute is a collection of radical reformers who aren't your old diehard foes of giveaways. Yet the book's authors say chronic food aid should be terminated and ask us to consider the following circumstances.;

-U.S. food aid is not focused on those countries where there is the greatest hunger and the least productive potential.

-Food aid distributed through food-for-work programs, in fact benefits rural elites to the detriment of the rural poor. -Government-to-government aid seems like a dramatic and

simple solution to hunger in the world. But, like so many government programs, it accomplishes the opposite of what its sponsors claim for it. Policies and programs which offer genuine hope of relieving hunger and poverty in the real world are more complex, less expensive and less dramatic than the superficial expedient of hiking government aid.

Despite all the charges and countercharges, many Americans are still unclear on the specifics of the Reagan taxplan. This is the first of two columns that will examine the arguments on both sides of what will doubtless be one of the hottest political and economic issues facing the nation in the months ahead. In essence, Reagan has

called for a 30 percent cut in tax rates over three years. This plan was born in 1977 as the Kemp-Roth bill, proposed by Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y., and Sen. William Roth, R-Del. It is based on the work of economist Arthur Laffer, a conservative young Californian whose theories are as much philosophic as

economic. As taxes increase, Laffer contends, people's incentive to work decreases. If tax rates were raised to 100 percent, with all income going to the government, no one would bother to work. But if taxes were eliminated, with workers keeping all of their earnings, virtually everybody would be highly motivated to work -

but the government would be penniless Laffer further theorizes that

there is some point at which tax rates are low enough to maximize the incentive to work but high enough to generate sufficient government revenue. Raising taxes above that point would be counterproductive because less money would go into the federal treasury with fewer people working

It is Laffer's contention that lowering taxes by one-third would inspire so many Americans to work so much harder that federal revenues would increase rather than decrease



-Management decentralization can come about only after the team has first learned to work together in tight harness.

-Decentralization can work only when the chief executive fully respects the team members, and knows from observation their strengths and weaknesses. -Decentralization is no

better than the amount and reliability of information shared by and with the team. Decentralization, says

Jennnings, is an invitation to subordinates to grab and hold power. It works only when the chief has clearly established a sense of purpose and communicated it.

Jennings believes President Carter failed to establish a clear sense of purpose, and that "if he had delivered decision-making authority widely to department heads he would have had sheer chaos." Reagan, he says, has effectively stated his purposes - build military strength, rally the economy, reduce government, for example but 'may have committed himself too strongly to decentralization.

"To get control of government," he said, "Reagan must have dedicated, politically active department heads who believe in his purpose and who make decisions that are faithful to the cause.

The President-elect, he said, may have blundered if he has already committed himself to a decentralized structure rather than remaining flexible and permitting a workable, compatible structure to evolve.







However, sickness seems more "socially acceptable" for women, and men are more reluctant to acknowledge and treat illness, Ms. Taylor adds. The specialist is on the home



Psychic Comes Up With Clues

SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP) Concho River near two - Police say a Dallas psychic has given investigators "extremely sensitive" new information in the effort to track down the bandit who killed a jewelry store clerk nine months ago.



"How could you consider (a child) a goddess if she cries like any of the other girls?' asked Guru Ma.

So, at age 11, Sunina retired. One of the first things Sunina had to do after returning home was learn how to walk correctly, neighbors recalled.

Also, she suddenly had a family instead of servants, and was expected to assume her share of household chores.

"My mother scolds me for not taking care of my brothers and sisters," confided Sunina, the eldest of the three girls and two boys in the family. For the first year, to ease the transition, Sunina was tutored privately in her home.

Sunina as a girl of "a very few words," and these do not include reminiscences about her life as a goddess.

"I should not speak about the temple....I have forgotten the role (of goddess)," she said shyly.

Sunina «also is learning English, but would like to forget two words she heard frequently as a goddess.

Many tourists who came to see her would shout "Hi! or Hello! in a loud voice," she confided. "These are words that I do not like to hear anymore.

As Sunina grows older, her parents expect to have a problem finding her a husband. Ex-goddesses live with the superstition that men who marry them often meet untimely deaths.

But a temple maid said the superstition was not true: "All (former) Kumaris were married. Only some girls lost their husbands




