Iran claimed it sank four Iraqi missile boats and six Iraqi gunboats and that its commandos raided the Iraqi oil harbor near the major port of Fao, killing 10 Iraqi troops and setting huge fires.

Iraq claimed it sank three Iranian warships and shot down three Iranian fighterbombers in the battle, near the Iraqi oil pipeline terminal of Mina al-Bakr at the Gulf's northwestern edge.

Iraq also said it sank two Iranian navy vessels in the Karun River in Iran's southwestern oil province of Khuzistan.

Tehran Radio said Iran's helicopter gunships staged fresh attacks on Iraqi lines around Abadan and the highway town of Susangerd, 85 miles to the north, claiming 27 Iraqi deaths in both areas.

Iran has been claiming Iraq was moving fresh reinforcements of troops and tanks for a third penetration assault into Susangerd in order to open a 30-mile stretch of highway for an Iraqi advance on Ahwaz, the Khuzistan capital.

Iran claimed to have repulsed two Iraqi attempts to capture Susangerd last week. The Iranians say the Iraqis attempted to take Susangerd to save face for failing to capture Abadan.

Abadan is the last major stronghold left for Iran on Shatt-al-Arab, the 120-milelong estuary that Iraq is fighting to bring under its exclusive control.

A 1975 agreement, which Iraq abrogated five days before the war broke out on Sept. 22, put the two countries' common border midstream at the Shatt, Iraq's only waterway to the Persian Gulf.

Iran's Pars news agency claimed President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr rode river boats, jeeps and motorcycles in inspection tours that took him to within 200 yards of Iraqi bunkers on Friday.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - House Speaker Bill Clayton has proposed that the state plough its surplus tax income into a permanent trust fund for water projects. Clayton made the suggestion Friday during a seminar on

He said revenue in excess of state appropriations should be 'saved" and allowed to accumulate until it equals the amount of the bonded indebtedness allowed by the Texas Constitution -

At that point, profits from investing the fund could be spent on water development projects, including importation of water from outside the state.

3 Burned In Rig Fire

MORGAN CITY, La. (AP) - A flash fire on a natural gas rig 40 miles out in the Gulf of Mexico burned three men, one seriously, officials of Shell Oil Co. said.

Shell spokesman John Wright said nobody else was on the rig when the fire broke out Friday.

We are approaching the anniversary of a date that is firmly. etched in history books as "that day of intamy," Dec.7, 1941, the Here Friday day that Japan attacked Pearl Harbor. Those who remember, if they pause to reflect a few moments, will recall that, despite awesome development in various fields, some things don't change much. In those days preceding that attack which finally brought the United States into World War II as an active participant, there had been those who all but demanded that we jump into the European struggle that had been going one for some three years. There were others who demanded that we turn our heads and mind our own business.

But when the Pearl Harbor attack came on that quiet Sunday, the word spread rapidly and suddenly the nation was united in a common goal---to mobilize and whip those Japs.

This year, Pearl Harbor Day again falls on Sunday. The world was supposed to have learned a lesson in World war II. America did indeed whip those Japs and also helped England and what was left of France put down Germany's Adolph Hitler. But in the European affair there was some help from another source, one that was viewed with suspicion but with enough manpower to make a difference. The Russians had a hand in toppling Hitler, and that fact has been a irritant ever since because the Russians were not on our side, except when it 6-0.

But, as we mentioned, the world was supposed to have learned the folly of war in that tragic event which some called "The War to End All Wars." War and politics make strange bedfellows



Ironically, it seems that man seldom learns from history. The past Friday was the anniversary date of another tragedy that happened in 1942 and was virtually repeated a few days ago. The Cocoanut Grove, a popular Boston nightclub, burned on Nov. 28, 1942, claiming 492 lives. The anniversary date falls just a few days after a similar tragedy occurred in Las Vegas, Nev. The Cocoanut Grove fire caught the attention of youngsters throughout the country because one of those who perished there was Buck Jones, a famous western motion picture star.

Now, the experts are trying to determine whether the MGM Grand in 1980 was any better prepared to combat such a fire than the Cocoanut Grove was 38 years ago.



FIREPLACE SAFETY

Today's popularity of fireplaces-in many shapes and sizes-calls for more emphasis on safe operation. Consider these fireplace safety tips:

-Keep highly combustible materials, such as loose papers, cardboard and fabrics, away from the fireplace area. These materials could easily be ignited by stray hot ashes, glowing embers or flying sparks. Place ashes in a metal container with a tight-fitting lid, pending final disposal.

-Make sure the chimney and flue lining are clean and the damper is in proper working order. If the flue is obstructed, smoke, carbon monoxide and other toxic. gases can escape into the living area. Soot and tar deposits can build up on the walls of the chimney and flue. These deposits are -flammable, and if they are not periodically removed, can be the source of a fire.

-Open the damper before starting a fire and keep it open -until every ember is completely out--again, carbon monoxide gas can fill the living area

-Place a close-fitting screen or door over the front of the fireplace to prevent sparks and hot coals from popping out

-When building a fire, don't overdo it. Overfiring can make the firebox and flue lining red-hot, causing a flue and chimney fire. Place a moderate amount of fuel in the use lighter fluid on a wood or coal fire are asking for trouble--a flashback fire can result, and invisible vapor can travel throughout the room.

-Fireplace fires consume oxygen while burning. Therefore, make certain that there is proper ventilation, both for burning efficiency and for safety of those in the

-Store wood in a dry area prior to burning. A six-month storage period is desirable. The drier the wood, the more evenly the fire will burn. Using wood that is not sufficiently dry increases the possibility of soot and tar deposits as well as flying

-A factory-built fireplace or fireplace stove should bear Underwriters Laboratories listing mark, indicating that it meets reecognized safety standards.

When installing a factorybuilt fireplace or freestanding fireplace stove, seek experthelp and follow the manufacturer's instructions closely. Make certain that freestanding stoves are placed an adequate distance away from combustible materials.

Animals Reflect Human Workers...

Rats Have Own Race To Run

Texas (AP) - Rats and pigeons can run the economic treadmill just like human beings who scratch out a daily living, economists at Texas A&M University say.

Dr. John Kagel and Dr. Raymond Battalio say their research shows the term "rat race" doesn't apply only to the lives of humans.

In experiments with rats using food pellets, water and cherry cola as the consumer products - researchers have found the animals can use simple reasoning as well as

situations.

"Those who say humans are not able to behave in an economically rational manner may be saying we are as dumb, or dumber, than rats or pigeons," Kagel said.

"Rat consumers and workers are basically consistent in their choices in the sense that the data from rats can be organized by standard economic theory," said

FEDERAL TAX RETURNS

|Can I Change Mine?|

The period of time (statute of limitations) for changing a federal income tax return is normally three years. This means that the taxpayer and the government both have the opportunity to make changes, large or small, in the past three years' tax

There are a large number of taxpayers who prepare their own tax return or have them prepared by someone other than a full time tax counseior. If you are one of these "self-preparers" we recommend that you have your tax returns reviewed at least, every third year by a professional preparer.

A review will cost far less than the preparation. If amendments are necessary, the fee should be somewhat in line with the benefits to be had.

Contrary to popular belief, these amendments do not automatically trigger an audit of your returns. Some IRS districts require examination if the tax refund is substantial, say \$5000 or more. If you are amending the third oldest year immediately before it is ready to "close under the statute," you should attach an explanation of why you waited so long to amend it. It is logical far the IRS to assume that the person requesting adjustment immediately before the "closing" may be trying to slip by with a questionable adjustment. Unless you have a bad conscience about a prior tax return, you should feel comfortable about amending for a refund of your money .-

The three year review by a professional preparer is adequate for many tax returns. If, however, you have a major financial decision to be made, don't leave it to chance. Seek the help of a qualified practitioner to determine the tax effects before the business transaction is completed. Good tax planning cannot be done after the fact.

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

Crashed Plane Was Target Of Narc Probe

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





Plants react to the weather just as people do, so it is a good idea to prepare them for the cold days ahead, too. With just a little special attention, you can guarantee your plants a healthy winter and a beautiful, blooming spring.

First of all, try to keep in mind the conditions in which your plant grew during the warm, sunny summer days, These ideal conditions are the ones you want to imitate in-

Place your plants in your home according to their light and humidity requirements. Keep them out of drafts and out of the airflow from heater degrees at night.

free from build up so that plants can obtain as many benefits as possible from natural sunshine. The use of artificial lighting is a good idea where needed. For maximum benefit, artificial lighting should run for about 12-14 hours a day and lighting should be approximately 12-18 inches from the plants.

foliage clean. And don't forget to clean the foliage as often as necessary. Use clear water at room temperature and a soft cloth to wipe dirt and other grime from leaves. Not only does it give shine and gloss to your foliage, but it improves the life

of the leaves. Remember to keep your plants in areas where there are no extremes in temperatures. Plants don't mind temps in the 60s or 70s at night, but they do mind 80 degrees in the day and 30

When your plant's growth begins to slow and blooms drop, your plant has reached its dormancy period. Cut down your watering and fertilizing for several months, until you notice new growth appearing. That is the signal that the

dormancy is over. Generally, treat your plants as you would treat your

bracketed americans

While there may still be a few Americans who haven't heard of "braket creep," there are virtually none who aren't being

affected by it - to their disadvantage. For the benefit of the first group, bracket creep may be defined as the impact of inflation upon taxes. As wages rise in the race with living costs, incomes move up the tax-rate scale with government taking an ever larger bite out of the total. With no effort at all, the wage-earner can get himself into a situation where what he must pay out in taxes is increasing at a more rapid rate than what he can take in even with ever-larger

paychecks. How it works is illustrated in the November issue of "Across the Board," magazine of the nonprofit eceonomic research organization, The Conference Board. Taking the finances of a typical urban family of four, the magazine notes that the Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics set the cost of maintaining a 'reasonably comfortable' standard of living at \$20,771 in 1974. Five years later, the same family in order to enjoy the same comfort required \$30,317. That's a cash increase of \$9,546, or 46

percent More money was needed, of course, because of inflation in the market place which boosted the cost of goods and services purchased by the family during the five-year period by 40.7 percent. But that's still significantly less than the 46 percent

income increase necessary to maintain standards. Why the difference? Because the family tax bill was boosted even more as rising income raised it into stiffer tax brackets, to which must be added the effect of escalating Social Security payments. Personal taxes in five years went up 63 percent and Social

Secuity 79.5 percent for a combined tax increase of 65.8 percent. Looking at the family 's finances in another way, if you haven't already gotten lost among the percentages, a breakdown of the \$9,546 five-year increase shows that 20 percent of it went for food, 16.2 percent for shelter, 9.3 percent for tran-

sportation and lesser percentages for medical care, education, recreation and other major expenditures. But the largest single chunk of the additional money went for taxes - 32 percent. Bracket creep, it is figured, is adding bet-

ween 3 and 4 percent to the family's real tax burden every year. That's the story of our "reasonably comfortable" family. But they are not alone. Low-income and affluent families also are scrutinized in the government's statistical profiles of national

living standards. Taking the effects of bracket creep alone, the former may appear to be getting off fairly easy. Personal taxes have gone up a modest 15 percent, Social Security deductions 40 percent in the same five-yea period. But considering that the lowincome family has less discretion in budgeting to start with, it can less afford even low-gear creep. Food, for example, ate up a third of increased living costs during the period under study but only a fifth in the case of the affluent family, which does

have discretion in budgeting. As compensation, however, bracket creep has encroached most deeply on the finances of the affluent. Personal income


