Texas Traffic Deaths Up 4%

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The number of people killed in traffic accidents, as well as the number of accidents, have increased 4 percent over 1979, the Department of Public Safety

As of Friday, 3,784 people had been killed on Texas highways in 3.295 fatal accidents. By the same time last year, 3,645 had been killed in 3,174 accidents involving a death.

Official figures for the Thanksgiving holiday period will not be released until February, a DPS spokesman said.

Winner Ineligible For Post

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - Melchor Chavez spent about \$12,000 on his successful campaign for state district judge only to find out he cannot take office.

The three-term state representative became a certified candidate for the post despite a glaring eligibility problem that went undetected throughout his campaign.

The secretary of state's office finally pointed out that Article 3. Section 8 of the Texas Constitution prohibits a legislator from holding a public office that was voted a pay raise during the

lawmaker's term. The Harlingen lawyer served in the 1979 Legislature that gave district judges a pay raise from \$35,700 a year to \$42,500.



*Congress is winding down its session this week, which should bring welcome relief to those who are wary of late-year actions of law-makers. The present Congress is sprinkled with "lame ducks" (those

who were defeated in the November general election) and some are worried that they may try to push through some foolish legislation at the last-minute, since they won't be around next year to face any consequences.

Actually, a lame duck official should be in a position to make the most objective decisions of his career. The election is already over and he has lost. He doesn't have to worry about the public opinion and popularity polls any more. He can sit back and take a clear view of the situation and then move as his conscience dictates without any concern about the reaction of various groups

Of course that is not the way it works, and that may be one reason that we haven't already changed our system to limit a president to a single term. Once elected, he would immediately become a lame duck.

But lame duck public servants move in various ways. There are those who make vigorous efforts to push across pet projects that they might be reluctant to bring up otherwise. Then there are those who use their lame duck status as an excuse for doing nothing. They take the position that "we should just sit here for the rest of our term and leave the decisions to our successors." Or, "We shouldn't saddle our successors with this," which in effect means "We're going to pass the buck."

Anyway, don't expect any miracles during the last week of this session of Congress, and if anything of consequence is enacted, don't count on it until the new Congress has a chance to look it over. The newcomers might want to nullify it, or revise it, that is, unless it enhances the status of their pocketbooks.

But the last week of this Congressional session is probably of no more interest than the news that Santa Claus has diminished---in numbers, at least. The news wire reports that stores are employing fewer Santa Clauses is attributed to economics. This may well be the immediate cause, but in our opinion the results could be good. We've had too many Santas in the past. It is confusing to youngsters when they encounter several Santas on one shopping tour with their parents. especially if they happen to see more than one in the same

All we need to further complicate the situation is to get those from Washington mingled with those from the North Pole.

Iraq Said Poised For Final Attack

Iraq said today its forces were poised for a "final assault" on the three main cities of Iran's oil-rich Khuzistan Province.

A spokesman for the Iraqi command said his nation's infantry and armor were now in advantageous positions for "final assault to overrun" Khuzistan's capital of Ahwaz, the giant oil refining complex Abadan and the army garrison town of Dezful.

"Once the political leadership of Iraq issues the order, forces in the battlefield are ready for, and capable of decisive action in Ahwaz, Abadan and Dezful," the

spokesman said. Abadan, on the eastern shore of the Shatt al-Arab estuary, has been besieged for the past six weeks. Last week, Iran claimed it broke the siege and Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr reportedly made a daring trip that included a motorcycle tour of Iranian frontline bunkers to underscore the

If you think that the gasoline pinch hurt the tourist trade in Texas this year, you might be surprised to learn that attendance at 55 attractions reporting to the Texas Tourist Development Agency through August was running two percent ahead of last year's count. August numbers this year were up 5.5 percent over the same month a year ago.

The statistics brought smiles to the state's tourist industry because not only did it have to face up to the fact that tourists were having to pay higher fuel costs but the searing heat wave, worst in many years all over the state, endured far too long. A little thing called Hurricane Allen, although its bark was worse that its bite, also drove tourists away from the coast for a time during the summer.

Last year's tourist figures were second only to 1978, and if 1980 holds up, it will become the second best year for the Texas

For the first nine months of this year, city visitor centers recorded an increase of 31 percent; state parks, eight percent; Corps of Engineers lakes, five percent; and Department of Interior sites, 16 percent.

City visitor centers in Arlington (home of Six Flags Over Texas and the Texas Rangers), Beaumonet, Dallas and Houston counted gains of anywhere from 15 to 57 percent. Only South Padre Island, which likely was suffering lingering effects of last year's oil spill off the coast of Mexico as well as interference from Hurricane Allen, off 15 percent, was below

State parks, with 10,866,384 visitors, were up almost 800,000. Attendance at lakes like Grapevine, Texhoma and Sam Rayburn were up from nine to 15 percent, but was down at Canyon, Lake 'O The Pines and Whitney

Texas national forests hosted 799,851 during the January-August period, up one percent.

Six Flags Over Texas amusement park, with a count slightly over two million, was seven percent under what it did a year ago. Visitors at the Johnson Space Center hosted only 826,912 visitors this year, whereas it had over a million callers in 1979. Eight other attractions drew more, however.

Traders Village in Arlington was up a whopping 37 percent, while Ashton Villa in Galveston gained 32 percent. Also posting increases were Astrodome tours, Astroworld, Gladys Porter Zoo in Brownsville, Natural Bridge Caverns, Sea Arama Marineworld and Tower of Americas in San Antonio.

The museum showing the biggest gain in visitors was Amon Carter in Fort Worth (61 percent) Most others were up,

The count was down 35 percent in Big Bend National Park. The prolonged heat wave no doubt was a factor here. It is to be noted that seven of the 10 Department of Interior tourist refuges are located in remote areas.

That's because shrewd entrenched bureaucrats long ago figured out how to deflect. indefinitely postpone or simply ignore the wellintentioned but politically naive, economy campaigns mounted by a succession of presidents.

But one federal agency has developed a new concept that's worth investigation by President-elect Ronald Reagan. It certainly can't be more of a dismal falure than the previous efforts that generally fell into two categories

The White House identified specific agencies, boards of commissions whose functions were deemed to be irrelevant, superfluous or of marginal utility, then called for abolition of the unnecessary function - and sometimes the entire agency

The White House proposed an across-the-board reduction in funding of personnel, with the heads of each government department and agency responsible for deciding which programs or units under their supervision were to be affected

'The first approach has been regularly thwarted through lobbying efforts mounted by bureaucrats who lined up an imposing array of political allies, usually including the congressional subcommittees and special-interest groups with which they earlier developed a symbiotic relationship.

The second approach has been frustrated through an equally sophisticated gambit described by Charles Peters, editor of The Washington Monthly, a highly respected magazine, as the "firemen first" technique.

That phrase refers to the response offered by municipal officials who warn that if forced to comply with citizen demands for reduced government spending, they will have to make the first and deepest cuts through drastic reductions in fire and police budgets and staffs.

At the federal level, that might mean the Justice Department proposing that its required reductions be made by slashing the number. of guards at maximum-security penitentiaries or the Interior Department threatening to board up the Lincoln Memorial.

The possibilities are endless. Nobody, of course, ever suggests abolishing the Paper Shuffling Section or the Division of Bureaucratic

Perpetuation. But a little-noticed ex-

periment conducted earlier this Administration suggests the possibility of a third approach. FDA officials conducted a survey based on response to this hypothetical Assume that the FDA has

been abolished, but Congress has authorized establishment of a new agency to take jurisdiction over some of the FDA's old functions. The new agency, however, may begin only five new programs each year. Which programs should be picked up immediately, which can be delayed for several years and which are least important?

Good bowel management

DEAR DR. LAMB - I'd appreciate any information you can send me about hemorrhoids and fissures. I had a procto but at this point I would do anything to avoid surgery. I'm going to try a diet of fresh fruits and fresh green vegetables to see if that helps any. I've tried bran,

with no luck. I've been constipated most of my life except during my pregnancy. Since my pregnancy I have had my problems. I'm in my 20s and I'd like to avoid surgery. I'm hoping my diet will improve my bowel habits and I won't have to strain to have a movement. I'd like to know what causes hemorrhoids and fissures and if they will return if I have

surgery.
Will they return if I have another child? Does pregnancy have anything to do with hemorrhoids?

DEAR READER Remember that hemorrhoids are just varicose veins of the rectum. Those veins will pop out and dilate if they are under pressure. A good way to put pressure on the rectal veins is by straining and by passing hard stools. So poor bowel habits do contribute to some cases of hemorrhoids.

You are right about pregnancy. As the baby grows and the heavy uterus presses on the deep veins which drain the pelvis, that stretches the rectal veins because they can't drain as easily. Then during the passage of the baby a lot of pressure is placed on all the pelvic structures so hemorrhoids are a common postpregnancy complication.

A fissure is a crack. Usually Catfish the skin is cracked superficially. And the most common cause is difficult bowel movements. A tight anal sphincter Often a fissure can be managed without resorting to

surgery There are many different approaches to treating hemorrhoids. In any case, good bowel management is important to both hemorrhoids and

Internal hemorrhoids often don't cause symptoms, only bleeding. External hemorrhoids cause symptoms. The treatment of the two is often different so I don't know what needs to be done in your case.

You are using the right

sufficient bulk in your diet and drink plenty of liquids. A bulk laxative may be useful.

Despite TV ads, most hemorrhoid preparations you can buy yourself are of little value. They will not correct the underlying condition. Suppositories inserted into the rectum are above the area where the external hemorrhoids which cause symptoms are located so they don't help much. The Federal Trade Commission has cracked down on some of these products and made the manufacturers quit claiming any benefits except temporary symptomatic relief. The Health Letter I am sending you discusses what you can do for yourself but actual correction of hemorrhoids will require one of the procedures
