



At the center of Thurmond's plan is the abolition of the Judiciary subcommittee on anti-trust and monopoly. That subcommittee was a thorn in the side of big business and a target of conservative Republicans ever since its founding almost a quartercentury ago - and especially in recent years under the activist chairmanship of Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio.

The subcommittee investigated mergers and held hearings on anti-competitive practices. Perhaps most importantly, it held oversight authority over the Justice Department and the Federal Trade Commission, spurring both to vigorous enforcement of anit-trust laws.

In the new Senate, the subcommittee would have fallen into the hands of Sen. Charles Mathias, R-Md., unless Thurmond had claimed it for himself. Conservatives and big business do not trust Mathias, who is Judiciary's second-ranking Republican and perhaps the most liberal member of his party remaining in the Senate.

Thurmond had his staff draw up a plan to "streamline" Judiciary by eliminating the anti-trust panel and assigning its responsibilities to the full committee Mathias then became chairman of a less influential subcommittee on

criminal law. Of far greater importance is the Judiciary subcommittee on the Constitution, whose chairmanship will pass from Indiana's Birch Bayh, one of the Senate liberals defeated in November, to Utah's Orrin Hatch, who shares Thurmond's conservative political philosophy. Hatch and

The president-elect paraded in and out of the offices of a great many people who might have had their egos bruised had he ignored them. Furthermore, he seems to have the knack for saying the right things to the right people. That is a trait that will stand him in good stead, regardless of how he fares in battling the monster Inflation and handling the can of worms called Foreign Policy.

Reagan crossed party lines by meeting leading Democrats in the Congress, not forgetting that the Democrats are still in control in the House even though the Republicans have cap-

REAGAN'S TAX CUT

Reagan says he intends to cut personal income taxes 30%. Whether he is able to do that next year, if at all, is yet to be seen.

Since there will be an effort on the part of his administration to cut taxes, it may be worthwhile postponing income to later years.

Consider having your year-end clearance sale in January, selling your livestock in January that would normally be sold in December, or holding the sale of capital assets until January or later. All of these postponements must be viewed with economics in mind. Seldom is it advantageous to do any planning strictly for income tax reasons.

In addition to postponing your income to next year or later, consider acelerating whatever deductions are possible into 1980.

If you would normally pay your property taxes in the first part of 1981, pay them this December. You may want to pay all of your anticipated 1981 charitable contributions in 1980. You could pay the accrued interest on all bank notes that would normally come due after the first of the year.

If you have already paid sizable medical bills for the current year, you might get a double benefit by paying all your additional unpaid medical bills by December 31. Since your medical bills must exceed three percent of your adjusted gross income, some medical bills could be non-deductible in 1981.

This is one year in which you could be well rewarded for planning the timing of your income and expenses.

Most hearts will skip a beat

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 67-year-old man. I take Inderal and Hydrodiuril for high blood pressure. These medicines keep my pressure around 150 over 85. My one worry is that I notice when I am taking my pulse that every 60 to 70 beats my heart stops beating for a beat or two and then starts beating again. My heart is strong and steady except for this.

My heart doctor listens but never waits to catch the miss. The electrocardiogram never picks up the missed beat. When my heart stops for one or two beats, will it cause a heart attack in time? I do not drink, never smoked and never use coffee or colas. If you have any information on this; please send it to me so I will be better informed.

DEAR READER - You are doing great. Your blood pressure level for your age group is well controlled. The Inderal you are taking also helps to prevent heart skips.

Now you think your heart stops but that is not likely. nave a premature beat that isn't strong enough to pump blood out to your wrist so you feel it as a skipped beat when it is really early. This is explained in greater detail in The Health Letter number 6-12, Heart Irregularities, Skipped Beats, Tachycardias that I am sending you. These are quite common and if we were able to record continuous heart beats on everyone, we would find almost everyone has some. All the astronaut candidates I examined with long-term monitoring had an occasional irregularity that they were

totally unaware of. Their significance has to be juageu in each particular case. In the young healthy person, such as the astronauts, they may be of little or no significance. An increased number along with heart pain may be a complication of an acute heart attack.

dangerous. They have a habit of occurring when you are quiet at home and like an automobile going to the garage, fail to occur when you get to the doctor's office. That is not unusual.

I'm glad to hear that your are following a good program. We do know that smoking cigarettes, drinking alcohol and coffee or tea may aggravate the condition.

The infrequent early beats you now experience probably do not require any treatment If they were frequent or really bothered you, then there are medicines to control irregularities. Inderal is one of these that works for many

But you are also taking Hydrodiuril, which can wash out potassium as well as sodi-um. So be sure and eat a reasonable amount of fresh fruit or drink fruit juices every day to keep your potassium level up. A low potassium level can increase the heart's tendency to have irregularities such as you describe.

DEAR DR. LAMB Recently I had a mammogram done. Everyone seemed to have been so busy that I was left in the X-ray room after the X-rays were completed for about a half hour before the doctor came in. Is there any danger of my being overexposed to harmful rays during that time?

DEAR READER The machine doesn't emit additional rays unless it is turned on. There will not be enough residual rays scattered in the room to pose any problem either.

Christmas Trees Tough To Grow

ROSE HILL, Texas (AP) -With the price of Christmas trees growing taller than the evergreens, more and more Texans are getting into the business of nurturing young

A lot of people think Texans can grow nothing but oil wells and cactus.

Not so, says Hugh Epps, a Walker County extention

But, he warns that it takes a lot of work, from the day of planting to the day of har-

"You've got to watch your trees closely, year round," Epps said in a recent interview. "It's not easy. Gophers can attack the root systems of seedlings and the pine moth is tough on the trunk and limbs.

Donnelly Hawkins, a 75year-old retired plumber, cleared himself a plot a few years ago and planted a crop of Virginia pines. He sold his first trees wholesale to the Tomball Optimist Club, which sells the trees at about half the price charged on commercial

Hawkins said the Christmas tree project "just kind of grows on you.'

Lanny Dreesen of the Agricultural Extension Service office in Houston, said Christmas-tree growing sprouted in this area in 1972 and the project was such a success it has spread to other areas of the state.

The Texas trees, he said, are cheaper, fresher, greener and safer because they are not cut until December.

Dreesen says a Texas crop of Virginia pines cost about \$2,000 an acre with a maximum of 1,299 trees an acre. The Virginia pines, he says, adapt well to the Texas climate and need only three to five years of growth as opposed to 15 years for other varieties

Christmas tree farms in Texas are now found in Montgomery, Walker and Harris counties; near Quitman in Wood County; in Sacul in Nacogdoches County: near Ben Wheeler in Van Zandt County: at Laneville in Rusk County and near Jacksonville in Cherokee County.
