

Is prostate cancer inevitable?

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Is it true that ALL men will experience cancer of the prostate gland if they live long enough? Further, is there any research report on the correlation of men who have had vasectomies and cancer of the prostate?

DEAR READER: It's not true that all men will develop cancer of the prostate as they age, although the rate of prostate cancer rises astronomically as men get older.

It is true that, sooner or later, if he lives long enough, every man will experience prostate enlargement. Called benign prostatic hyperplasia, this non-cancerous condition causes familiar symptoms: hesitancy, dribbling, less forceful urination, nighttime urination, urgency, and frequen-

This affliction is diagnosed by a series of tests, including blood tests, ultrasound and biopsy Heretofore, it often required surgery. Now. a prescription drug (Prosear) shows promise in shrinking BPH.

On the other hand, prostate cancer (diagnosed by biopsy) is treated with

Despite early reports that vasectomy was associated with prostate cancer, recent studies have failed to prove a correlation

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 49-year-old female recently diagnosed with early chronic active hepatitis. I'm on a decreasing dosage of prednisone, yet my physician states that I will have to remain on a low dosage for two years, to be followed by another biopsy. What is the prognosis for this diagnosis and what are the dangers of long-term use of prednisone

DEAR READER: Certain forms of chronic hepatitis (liver infection from a type of virus) retain a low level of activity for years, slowly destroying the liver and leading to death Prednisone, a form of cortisone, reduces inflammation and often stabilizes chronic hepatitis, thereby prolonging life. Your gastroenterologist is

You will need periodic liver biopsies to assess the effectiveness of the therapy. With treatment, the prognosis of chronic active hepatitis is quite favor-

You're correct that prednisone causes many unwanted side effects, such as diabetes, cataracts, hypertension, weight gain, osteoporosis, and others. It also interferes with immunity and the ability to fight infection.

Nonetheless, these complications (which can be minimized by lowering the dose of prednisone) are a necessary trade-off. Without the drug, your liver would progressively malfunction. 1994 NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.

But even before Zedillo's first full day on the job, some 10,000 protestors marched in downtown Mexico City to demand his ouster on the day of his inauguration.

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District judge lets Penthouse distribute Paula Jones issue

NEW YORK (AP) - A judge her allegations. found journalistic grounds for publishing topless photographs of Penthouse were taken in 1987 by a lowing Penthouse magazine to re- only. sume distributing its January issue

Earlier this week, U.S. District Judge Peter K. Leisure ordered the magazine not to distribute or promote the article while he considered a \$30 million lawsuit filed by Paula Jones, the subject of the photos.

Leisure lifted the restraining order Thursday after rejecting Jones' argument that publishing the photos served no journalistic purpose and was only meant to promote Penthouse.

"This court finds that the pictures in question have a relationship to the accompanying article and that the matter is in the public interest," Leisure said.

The judge said a further order would be of little use anyway since more than 400,000 copies of the January issue had already been sent to subscribers and distributors. It is due at newsstands Tuesday.

Jones, who waited in a restaurant near the courthouse, cried after hearing the ruling as several men taunted her about her alleged meeting with Clinton, then the governor of Arkansas, in 1991.

The former Arkansas state employee said in a May lawsuit filed against Clinton in Little Rock, Ark., that he exposed himself to her and suggested they engage in a sex act after summoning her to a hotel room. She said she quickly left the room. Clinton has denied

That applies to today's deal, bu when East made a great play, Sout found to her dismay that she didn' have enough spades to get home.

Sitting East was John Wignall, who lives in Christchurch, New Zealand One of the best bridge players on the World Bridge Federation Executive Council, Wignall opened with a weak no-trump, promising 11-14 high-card points. South bid two spades, which showed a two-suiter with spades and minor. North asked for the minor with two no-trump (no, I don't know why either) and then jumped to game in

The defense began with three rounds of diamonds. After ruffing, declarer immediately led a heart to dummy's 10. Wignall won with his jack and the critical moment had arrived.

Suppose Wignall returns a club. Declarer wins with the ace, runs the spade queen, plays a spade to dummy's 10 and leads the heart king. Whether East plays his ace now or on the next trick, South ruffs and leads a trump to dummy's ace, simultaneously drawing West's last spade and giving access to dummy's established heart

However, Wignall played a fourth round of diamonds, which killed the contract. If declarer ruffed in the dum my, West would win the setting trick with his spade king. So South ruffed in hand. She ran the spade queen, played a spade to dummy's 10 and ruffed out East's heart ace. But now South had no trump left in her hand. West had to score his spade king to defeat the con-

Demos pick Daschle, GOP selects Dole

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senate Democrats selected Sen. Thomas Daschle today as their minority leader for the next Congress, opting for a young, amiable lawmaker with scant experience in the national limelight.

Building, the incoming Republican majority chose Sen. Bob Dole to be majority leader for the second time in his career. But the GOP senators, in a 27-26 vote. chose Sen. Trent Lott, R-Miss., an ally of Dole's possible presidential rival, for their No. 2 job.

Daschle, a two-term South Dakota Democrat, defeated the more feisty, combative Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., to succeed Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, who is retiring.

The leadership votes today by lawmakers who will begin official business in January could affect the tone and politics of the chamber for the next several years.

Now minority leader, Dole, R-Kan., was unopposed in his quest to lead his party in the majority beginning in January. But his top lieutenant, veteran Whip Alan Simpson, R-Wyo., was being challenged by the conservative Lott, an ally of presidential aspirant Sen. Phil Gramm of Texas.

There were few ideological differences between the two contenders in either contest, being decided by secret ballots as Democrats and Republicans met separately in the Capitol. Their main distinctions were over style, and in each case a man with an easygoing persona was being opposed by one with more pugnacious tendencies.
