

"I think it will slow up considerably. There will be expenses you've never had before, that's for sure, but it should throttle back," said Arrington.

City officials said a large portion of the cost was start-up. It was noted that the city was having to contract out labor for excavation the cell due to time constraints, but that future cells could be excavated by city employees. Arrington also suggested that the city continue lobbying for a less expensive liner for the cell.

The vote to approve the bid was unanimous. Contract Paving Co. has proposed a 90-day project completion timetable.

Freese and Nichols' Laynee Jones briefly outlined some broad options the city has in providing water to the landfill. The mayor then directed city staff to break down the options as to materials and cost and asked that the item be placed on a future agenda.

The subject of transfer of the Round Top water system emerged earlier this month when council members were told that the owner, Farm Credit Bank of Texas, did not want to keep it. Corky Kruse, director of the Ira WCID, requested that the Round Top system be transferred to the Ira system. He further requested that the rates for Round Top Acres be set the same as the city charges the Ira system for water.

Council members favored the transfer, but not the rate change the city was selling water at \$2.17

Avoid diet pills in weight-loss plan

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 31-year-old female who has been overweight my entire life. I'm 5 feet 2 inches and weigh 250 pounds. I don't want my stomach stapled, and have recently heard about diet pills to help the prob-

lem. What other options might I try? DEAR READER: Diet pills are not the answer to weight reduction because they are inappropriate for long-term use and may cause physical harm — by dangerously increasing blood pressure, for example. Operations to reduce the volume of the stomach, while effective, are a last

I subjest that you work with your family doctor (and a registered dietitian) to develop a weight-loss diet and a program of exercise to help you shed pounds at a healthful rate: a pound or two a week is desirable.

DEAR DR. GOTT: You recently mentioned Zantac, Tagamet and Prilosec as medications to limit the production of stomach acid in reflux cases. An August 1994 Reader's Digest article suggests that Zantac and Tagamet are listed as potential sex depressants. Can Prilosec produce the same side effect after prolonged use?

DEAR READER: Many authorities consider Prilosec (omeprazole) to be the medication of choice for the heartburn and chest pain caused by reflux. Unlike Zantac and Tagamet (which may cause sexual problems in some patients), Prilosec has not been reported to affect sexual functioning. The drug's manufacturer recommends that it not be used for longer than eight weeks.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Mein Gott! You sure shot yourself in the foot when you recently put down reflexology. I'll bet there are a million people in the world who would like to do a Bobbectomy on you... me included. Is acupuncture a pseudo-science, too? DEAR READER: Maybe. The final word is not in yet.

Reputable medical authorities are in common agreement, however, about reflexology: It is pure quackery. This fraud is based on the idea that pressure on a hand or foot can relieve disease in other parts of the body.

This is pure hogwash, merely another way of separating the sucker (Mein Gott! Is that you?) from his


SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -Novelist Danielle Steele is being sued by a former household employee who claims he was emotionally abused.


