Avoid diet pills in weight-loss plan

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 31-year-old female who has been overweight my entire life. I'm 5 feet 2 inches and weigh 250 pounds. I don't want my stomach stapled, and have recently heard about diet pills to help the problem. What other options might I try?

DEAR READER: Diet pills are not the answer to weight reduction because they are inappropriate for long-term use and may cause physical harm — by dangerously increasing blood pressure, for example. Operations to reduce the volume of the stomach, while effective, are a last resort.

I suggest that you work with your family doctor (and a registered dietitian) to develop a weight-loss diet and a program of exercise to help you shed pounds at a healthful rate: a pound or two a week is desirable.

DEAR DR. GOTT: You recently mentioned Zantac, Tagamet and Prilosec as medications to limit the production of stomach acid in reflux cases. An August 1994 Reader's Digest article suggests that Zantac and Tagamet are listed as potential sex depressants. Can Prilosec produce the same side effect after prolonged use?

DEAR READER: Many authorities consider Prilosec (omeprazole) to be the medication of choice for the heartburn and chest pain caused by reflux. Unlike Zantac and Tagamet (which may cause sexual problems in some patients), Prilosec has not been reported to affect sexual functioning. The drug's manufacturer recommends that it not be used for longer than eight weeks.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Mein Gott! You sure shot yourself in the foot when you recently put down reflexology. I'll bet there are a million people in the

world who would like to do a Bobbectomy on you... me included. Is acupuncture a pseudo-science, too?

DEAR READER: Maybe. The final word is not in yet.

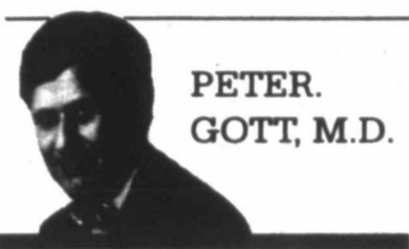

Kiwi suspends all flights

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Kiwi International Air Lines indefinitely suspended its 42 daily flights on Thursday after the Federal Aviation Administration questioned the company's pilot training.

Following a routine inspection Monday, the FAA told the airline to show that its pilot training program meets federal standards, FAA spokeswoman Holly Baker said.

"That did not happen," Baker said. "Kiwi voluntarily suspended all flights."

Baker said she did not know what action the FAA would have taken if Kiwi had not voluntarily suspended its flights.

The FAA's inquiry centers on Kiwi's records of pilot training, company Chairman Bob Iverson said in a statement. Spokesman Rob Kulat said no passengers had been in danger on Kiwi flights.

Kulat declined to elaborate on what problems the FAA found. Kiwi was arranging for other airlines to take its passengers, he said.

The suspension won't be lifted until Kiwi proves to the FAA that its training practices meet FAA standards, Baker said. She said it could be a matter of Kiwi's improving its record keeping or upgrading its pilot training.

Kiwi, an employee-owned carrier, on Dec. 6 announced a pay cut to immediately reduce monthly costs by \$1 million. The Newark-based airline started service with 200 employees in September 1992, many of them victims of industry layoffs and closings.

Kiwi serves Atlanta, Chicago and San Juan, Puerto Rico, as well as Orlando, Tampa and West Palm Beach in Florida. The airline has 11 Boeing 727 aircraft in its fleet.

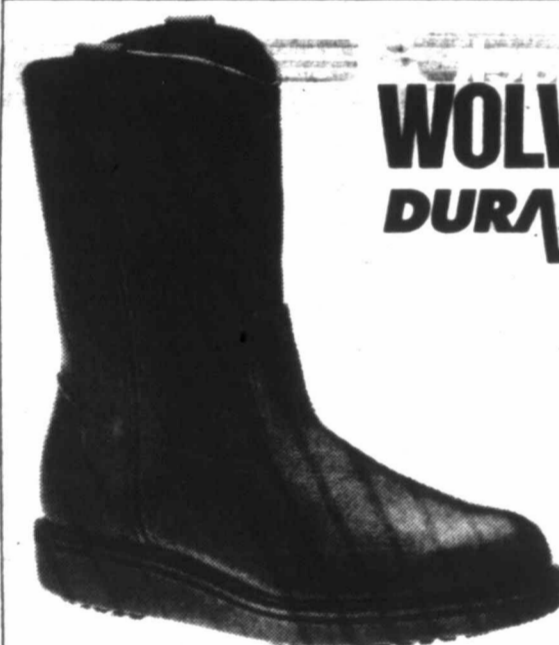
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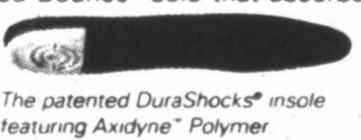
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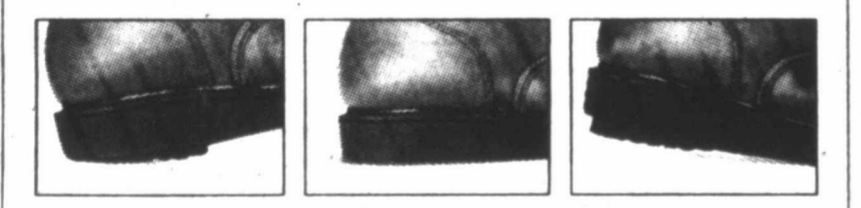

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Claim filed for disputed ticket

AUSTIN (AP) — An uncollected \$10.5 million Lotto Texas jackpot was claimed Thursday, but lottery officials have not decided whether to pay up.

The Nov. 23 jackpot-winning ticket was sold through an unlicensed agent, Texas Lottery Commission officials said.

"Let me state from the outset that we have not yet determined whether this is a valid claim for this prize. Nor have we determined whether we will pay the claim," said Nora Linares, executive director of the Texas Lottery Commission.

Ms. Linares would not identify the holder of the ticket bought from Heart's Discount Liquor, a licensed retailer in Houston.

However, the ticket-holder ordered the winning ticket at a hardware store in Croydon, Pa., five miles north of Philadelphia, according to Pic-A-State Lottery Service, based in Lakewood, N.J.

The service sells the \$1 Texas tickets for \$2.

State law says it is illegal for unlicensed retailers to sell a Texas Lottery ticket. It also is illegal to sell a lottery ticket for more than its face value.

Additionally, Pennsylvania law prohibits the sale "of any interest in a lottery of another state," said Ms. Linares.

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Man sentenced to 51 years in prison for wife's murder

GREENVILLE (AP) — A man with a history of violence toward women has been sentenced to 51 years in prison for murdering his wife.

Charles Henry Tarver, 48, of Greenville, was sentenced Thursday after pleading guilty Tuesday to murdering Marilyn Keith Tarver.

Since a deadly weapon was used in the offense, Tarver must serve at least half of the sentence before becoming eligible for par-

ole, officials said.

Tarver could have been sentenced to life in prison, having had two prior felony convictions in which a deadly weapon was used.

At the time of the murder, Tarver was on parole from a 20-year prison sentence.

He had been imprisoned in 1981 after he was convicted of shooting a woman once in the head after an argument, placing her in the trunk of his car and driving to Oklahoma, where he was la-

ter arrested on another charge.

The woman survived, and Tarver was convicted of aggravated kidnapping and eight years for the aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

Tarver also had a previous conviction for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon dating from 1977, when he was convicted of firing a gunshot at his wife of the time. Tarver was sentenced to two years in prison for the conviction.

a suitable hand for diamonds with a control in hearts. South took a shot at the slam.

Sitting West was Dorothy Truscott, of Riverdale, N.Y. She has won four world women's team titles and is one of only two women (Helen Sobel is the other) to have played for the United States in the Bermuda Bowl. Truscott found a larcenous opening lead: the club seven.

The declarer was Marijke van der Pas, from the Netherlands, who has won many national and international titles. Worried that the opening lead was a singleton, declarer called for dummy's ace (East played the two). After trumps had been drawn, it looked natural to continue with the spade ace and another spade, establishing dummy's queen for a club discard. If instead declarer had played a club and West had led a singleton, a spade switch from East would defeat the contract.

However, van der Pas decided that Truscott might have underled the club king. After long thought, she led her remaining club. Up popped West's king and the contract was promptly claimed.

Suspect says...

God ordered Dahmer's death

PORTAGE, Wis. (AP) — A lifer hid a metal bar from a prison exercise machine in his pants leg, found Jeffrey Dahmer alone cleaning a locker room and then proceeded to bash his head in, according to court papers.

Christopher Scarver said he left Dahmer gurgling on the floor, beat another murderer in a nearby shower room, then returned to his cell, according to a complaint filed Thursday.

When a guard asked Scarver why he was back early from work detail, he replied: "God told me to do it. You will hear about it on the 6 o'clock news. Jesse Anderson and Jeffrey Dahmer are dead." Dahmer, who killed 17 young men and boys in an orgy of necrophilia, dismemberment and cannibalism, had been serving 16 consecutive life sentences. Anderson was serving a life sentence for killing his wife.

Dahmer died on the way to a hospital after guards found him in a pool of blood. Anderson died two days later.

Scarver sang a melancholy song during a court hearing Thursday. The judge ordered the convicted murderer who once claimed to be the son of God to undergo a mental examination.

According to the complaint, at first Scarver said he didn't know why he attacked Dahmer and Anderson. But almost two weeks after the killings, he told interrogators that "the spirit" had come upon him "right there." He said he had no regrets be-

cause he was simply a tool of the spirit.

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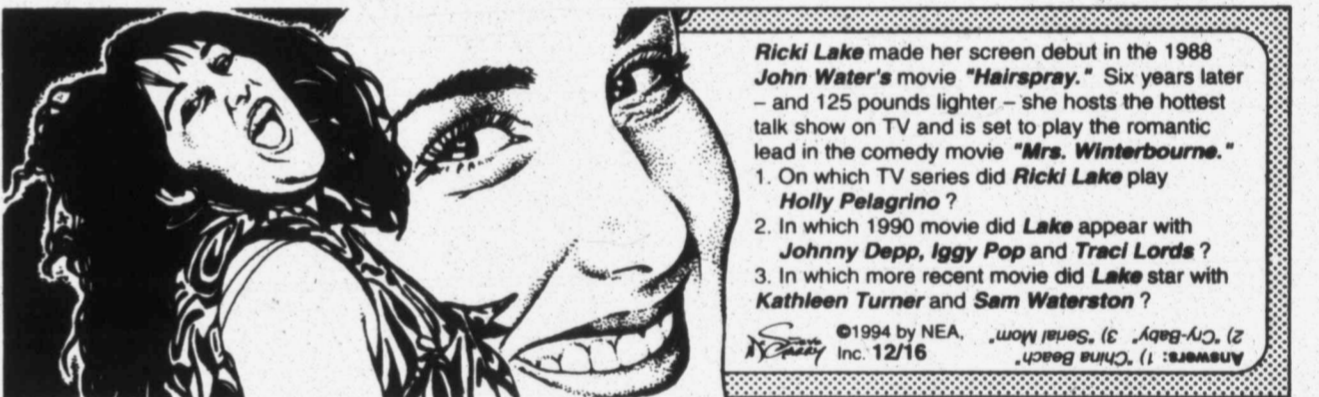

Mitchell makes All-State Six other District 5-4A performers named

It's official. Snyder senior tailback Chris Mitchell is one of the best running backs in the state of Texas, according to The Associated Press Sports Editors.

Mitchell was named to the offensive honorable mention squad for his work during the 1994 season.

In a year that saw the Tigers manage a 5-5 overall record, Mitchell compiled 1,258 yards on 187 carries and 11 touchdowns.

One of his best games came against the Kermit Yellowjackets. In that contest, Mitchell carried

the ball just 10 times for 212 yards and two touchdowns. Each of his touchdowns came from 50 or more yards out, as the Tigers scored a 55-12 romp over Kermit.

His biggest game, however, was Snyder's comeback win over district rival, Lamesa. Against the Golden Tors, Mitchell rushed 29 times for 222 yards and two touchdowns, despite a bruised thigh and a wrenched ankle.

On the final drive of the game, with Snyder trailing 21-14, he carried the ball on 10 of the Tigers' final 13 plays for 85 yards and a touchdown. His effort helped tighten the contest at 21-20, before quarterback Matt Parker found tight end Mark Love in the back of the endzone for the game-winning two point conversion.

Joining Mitchell on the All-State team were six other District 5-4A performers, including the

passing duo of Frenship's Chad Reynolds and Donnie Hart.

Hart amassed 1,049 receiving yards and 13 touchdowns on the season. Hart, who was the sole first or second team selection from the district, has orally committed to play football at Texas Tech.

Hart's counterpart on Frenship's top-rated offensive, quarterback Chad Reynolds, took honorable mention honors along with four others district performers.

District 5-4A's defensive most valuable player, Gabe Cherry from Sweetwater was selected at the defensive line position and Mustang teammate Kerry Carr made the team as a punter.

On the offensive side of the ball, along with Mitchell, Hart and Reynolds, were Lubbock Estacado players, lineman Kendrick Turner and running back Tyson Gatewood.

Jackson, Mavs blast Celtics

DALLAS (AP) — Jim Jackson scored 40 points and Jamal Mashburn added 27 as the Dallas Mavericks matched last season's total with their sixth home victory, 122-113 over the Boston Celtics on Thursday night.

The Mavericks, who improved to 10-8, won their 10th game last season on April 12, their 76th game of the season. Dallas is within three victories of equalling last season's total.

Dallas' Popeye Jones had 25 points and 20 rebounds for his 11th double-double of the season. Rookie Jason Kidd contributed 10 points and 10 assists for the Mavericks.

Lakers slide by Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — Cedric Ceballos scored a season-high 36 points Thursday night, helping the Los Angeles Lakers hold off Houston for a 97-94 victory over

the Rockets. The Lakers, 3-0 on their current road trip, have won 10 of their last 12 games.

Ceballos scored eight points over the final eight minutes when the Rockets threatened, their comeback falling short when Robert Horry missed a

Dominique Wilkins scored 33 points and Sherman Douglas added 19 to pace the Celtics, who have lost seven of their last nine and had their five-game winning streak against the Mavericks snapped.

The Mavericks led by as many as 18 points in the third quarter, but the Celtics made a fourth-quarter run, pulling to within 107-101 on Dee Brown's 3-pointer with 4:08 to play.

But Jackson worked inside for baskets on successive possessions and Jones added a 16-footer with 3:00 remaining to cap a 6-2 run and give Dallas a 113-103 lead.

Jackson scored nine points to lead a 19-6 run as the Mavericks expanded a 69-64 lead to 88-70 with 5:26 left in the third quarter. But the Celtics finished the quarter with a 14-5 spurt, paced by eight points from reserve Blue Edwards to narrow Dallas' advantage to 93-84 entering the fourth quarter.

Hakeem Olajuwon led the Rockets with 22 points and 14 rebounds. Horry finished with 19 points and Kenny Smith and Vernon Maxwell each had 16. Eddie Jones added 16 points for the Lakers.

The Rockets cut a 90-80 deficit with 6:50 left to 96-92 with 14.5 seconds remaining. Horry's short jumper pulled the Rockets to 96-94 with 37 seconds to go and when Sedale Threat missed a 3-pointer, Olajuwon rebounded and the Rockets called time to set up a final shot.

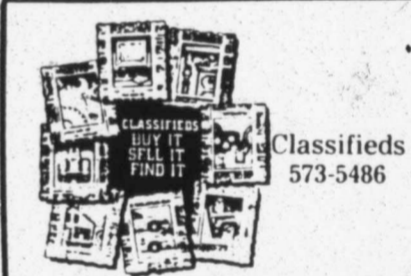

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Israeli reservist attacked; peace doubts deepen

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — When a middle-aged army reservist blundered into a West Bank traffic jam, the wrong turn nearly cost him his life. It also dramatically illustrated why a growing

number of Israelis doubt peace will succeed.

Vivid photographs of Palestinians raining blows on a soldier also embarrassed the Israeli army. Radio reports today said generals

were considering whether to court-martial soldier Shmuel Meiri, 41, for failing to open fire on his attackers.

For about 15 minutes on Wednesday, with merchants, passers-

by and other drivers in the center of Ramallah looking on, Palestinians pummeled Meiri with sticks, rocks and a knife.

Meiri was hospitalized with superficial injuries. He reportedly

told Israeli media he feared he would be killed if he had fired his gun. "I am a person who believes in miracles. I thought I could get out of there and I did," he told Israel's Channel 2 television.

Scenes of the blood-soaked, stunned soldier begging for mercy were broadcast on TV and splashed across newspaper front pages Thursday, becoming the focus of radio talk shows and political debate.

"What kind of peace is possible with such people?" asked Diti Bitman, a 29-year-old student. "It's clear the Arabs will never accept us. We need to slow down the process."

In a clash today, an Israeli settler reservist was shot and wounded while driving near a Jewish settlement outside the West Bank town of Ramallah today.

The soldier, identified as Lt. Maimon Ben-David of the Pesago settlement, was in fair condition with a gunshot wound in the shoulder, said Aharon Domb, a settlers' spokesman.

Public confidence in Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin's peace policies is already waning after a series of terrorist attacks by Islamic extremists that have killed 32 Israelis since Oct. 1.

Pollster Rafi Gill said that episodes like the assault on Meiri have an impact on public opinion because they so graphically illustrate persisting hatred.

Gill, director of the Public Opinion Research for Israel Institute, said Israelis tended to be "very susceptible to events that make them ask, 'Who exactly are my partners in peace?'"

Israeli right-wing opponents of Palestinian self-rule said the attack on Meiri demonstrated the dangers of the government's plans to pull troops out of West Bank towns before Palestinian elections.

"Look at what happened yesterday in Ramallah while the army was still there. Imagine what would be if the army pulls out," said Aharon Domb, a spokesman for the 120,000 Jewish settlers in the West Bank.

First arguments made in Cisneros suit

LUBBOCK (AP) — The intricacies of contractual law were argued in court this morning by attorneys for U.S. Housing Secretary Henry Cisneros and his former mistress.

The 40-minute hearing — an attempt by his defense team to prevent the dispute from going to trial — proceeded without either Cis-

neros or Linda Medlar present. State District Judge J. Blair Cherry said he would rule after the first of the year on Cisneros' motion for summary judgment.

Ms. Medlar accuses the former San Antonio mayor of breaking an oral contract to make monthly payments for damages she suffered after their extramarital affair

made headlines. She filed a fraud and breach-of-contract lawsuit in July seeking \$256,000 and unspecified punitive damages.

Cisneros contends no contract ever existed. He has said he paid her occasionally — about \$200,000, total — out of compassion after their relationship was revealed in 1988.

Seagal Wheatley, Cisneros' attorney in San Antonio, argued this morning that the case comes down to "routine legal issues based on a well-developed body of law."

Wheatley said the statute of

frauds requires a contract to be in writing and signed by the participants. He called the plaintiff's lines of reasoning both bizarre and inconsistent.

"She has no case," Wheatley told reporters.

But Floyd Holder, an attorney for Ms. Medlar, described Cisneros as "a man who doesn't want to put the deal in writing because he was and is an ambitious politician."

Holder argued that a jury should decide what promises Cisneros made and whether he kept them.

American Eagle suspends flights

MORRISVILLE, N.C. (AP) — Hours before the pilots of an American Eagle commuter plane that crashed spoke of engine trouble, mechanics had to repair one of the engines because it wouldn't start.

The left engine was fixed and the plane took off from Raleigh for Greensboro, American Eagle spokesman Marty Heires said late Thursday. On the return flight to Raleigh, the twin-engine Jetstream 3200 crashed in fog and drizzle, killing 15 of the 20 people aboard.

Heires said there was no connection between the starting problem Tuesday and a possible engine failure. He said the nature of the engine repairs was unknown because the repair logs were lost in the crash of Flight 3379.

"Clearly the plane was safe to

take off," he said after an National Transportation Safety Board briefing.

The cockpit voice recorders show the pilots talked about a "flameout," or engine failure, just before the crash 31/2 miles from Raleigh-Durham International Airport. It was not known which engine they were talking about.

Calling his \$60 billion package a "middle-class Bill of Rights," Clinton promised to pay for it with deep budget cuts that hurt programs, not people. "I want a leaner, not a meaner government," he said.

Playing catchup with Capitol Hill, Clinton proposed a smorgas-

bord of tax breaks and deductions that would give middle-class families:

—Up to a \$500-per-child tax credit for all children below age 13 in households earning up to \$75,000 a year.

—A tax deduction of up to \$10,000 a year for college or other post-high school education. Families making less than \$120,000 qualify.

—A tax deduction of up to \$2,000 for putting money into individual retirement accounts. Families making up to \$100,000 qualify, up from \$50,000 now.

—Flexibility to withdraw money from IRA accounts without penalty to pay for college education, purchase a first home, cope with catastrophic illness or care for an elderly parent.

—Job training vouchers worth \$2,000 to \$3,000 for workers to use at the job center of their choice.

"I guess you've got a water system," said Mayor Paul Zeck. "I think it's the best deal for both of us."

Mayor Zeck presided Thursday. Councilmembers present were Gambrell, Shaw, I.E. Martin and Jerry Webb. Ernest Tippens and Dayton Robertson were absent.

Body found might be Tech student

DALLAS (AP) — A body found in the Oak Cliff area of Dallas may possibly be the one robbed from a grave earlier this week.

Investigators were trying to determine Friday if the body is that of Melinda Ann Lee, a Texas Tech honors student who died Dec. 7 from injuries she suffered in an October traffic accident.

"They're not making an official confirmation. We're expecting some reports back in from pathology," said Dallas County Sheriff's Department spokesman Jim Ewell about the identification of the body.

Ewell said the body was found after Dallas police received a call from a newspaper delivery man early this morning. Police then notified the sheriff's department, which is handling the case.

Ms. Lee's body was unearched and stolen from Restland Memorial Park in Dallas sometime between sundown Monday and sunrise Tuesday.

Authorities have been investigating possible scenarios ranging from the occult to an obsessed admirer.

Sheriff Jim Bowles called the crime "hideous" and unmatched in his 44 years of service.

Officials at Restland said someone burrowed 6 feet to the grave and then broke a hole through a 4-inch concrete crypt to the coffin. Another hole was made in the coffin, through which the entire body was removed and taken away, they said.

Capt. Larry Williams of the sheriff's department's criminal investigation division said the operation would have required three to six hours to complete, depending on how many people were involved.

Study finds possible cause for cancer

WASHINGTON (AP) — A deadly cancer that strikes more than a fourth of all homosexual men with AIDS may be related to a herpes virus, according to researchers who report today on discovery of genetic evidence of the virus.

In a study published in the journal Science, researchers led by a husband-and-wife team at Columbia University report that unique DNA sequences, or fragments of genes, were isolated from tissues of Kaposi's sarcoma lesions taken from AIDS patients and that the gene material may be from a previously unknown human herpes virus.

"The DNA sequences we found contain portions of at least three different genes that are unique to herpes virus," said Dr. Yuan Chang of the Columbia Uni-

versity College of Physicians and Surgeons. "The evidence strongly suggests that these DNA sequences belong to a new herpes sequence, but additional tests are needed to confirm it."

Finding the viral gene sequences in nearly all of the Kaposi's lesions tested raises the intriguing possibility that the same virus is the cause, or at least a contributor, to the cancer, said Chang. But she emphasized this is only speculation.

Proof that a virus causes Kaposi's sarcoma could lead to developing a diagnostic test to find people susceptible to the disease and perhaps to a drug that would kill the virus and thus prevent the cancer.

Chang's husband, Dr. Patrick Moore of the Columbia University School of Public Health, said Ka-

posi's sarcoma, or KS, was a rare cancer, usually seen only in elderly men of eastern Mediterranean ancestry, until the AIDS epidemic. Since then, KS is found in 25 percent to 50 percent of all gay men infected with human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV, which causes AIDS.

Moore said that the classic KS is a slowly developing disease of the skin but that in AIDS patients the cancer can spread throughout the body and is "very serious and very aggressive."

Laboratories all over the world have been trying to determine if KS is caused by some infectious agent. Other viruses or bacteria have been suggested in the past, but were never confirmed.

"It's really good work and it could be a substantial advance," Dr. Robert Gallo of the National

Institutes of Health said in Science. "But I have major questions."

Gallo and other researchers suggest more proof is needed of the precise role of virus in KS.

Change and Moore said they plan to test for the virus in tissue from patients with the classic KS not associated with AIDS.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Novelist Danielle Steele is being sued by a former household employee who claims he was emotionally abused.

Jeremy Pearson, 26, says Steele has a history of offering employees high-paying jobs, then taking "sadistic pleasure" in making them squirm.

Pearson's lawsuit, filed Wednesday, says Steele fired him from a \$30,000-a-year job although he had performed his duties. The lawsuit says other former cooks and servants were fired arbitrarily.

Pearson is seeking unspecified damages. Calls to Steele's attorney were not returned.
