# Reese begins spring clean-up campaign

Brooms, mops, lawn mowers and many other tools will get a real work out beginning Monday as the annual Spring Clean-Up Week will be held through April 26.

Reese will join with Air Force installations around the world in the yearly beautification process that will bring out the old paint brushes and fatigues once again.

Although all divisions at Reese are responsible for the maintenance of their own areas, this yearly campaign is a concentrated effort at cleaning up the little things that usually go unnoticed, in addition to regular cleaning duties.

"Clean Up 'Eyesores' "

Capt. Gary M. Sanford, project officer for the clean-up, recently remarked, "This is a good chance for everyone to get into the act. There has to be at least one 'eyesore' in every work area that people have been meaning to fix or clean up for quite some time. The special emphasis this week will accomplish several projects like this."

The Spring Clean-Up plan Air Force wide is designed primarily as a fire prevention plan. Col. Walter H. Baxter III, wing commander, stated, "The appearance of our base occasionally falls below standards. Shortages of funds and personnel have contributed to this condition. Extraordinary measures are required to improve the appearance of our base and maintain the standard once it is achieved."

Improvement Plan

The plan at reese is designed to to assist base personnel in improving their own areas, removing safety and fire hazards and maintaining their areas throughout the year. Individual units will have the responsibility for minor repairs in their working areas, painting and gardening (to include fertilizing and seeding surrounding areas).

The programs branch is spearheading a drive to see that all materials are available for units to use during the week. Commanders and chiefs placed orders several weeks ago in preparation for the clean-up activity. Captain Sanford informs those units that have not yet been notified of the arrival of materials that they will be contacted as soon as the materials arrive.

In Reese Village, residents will be expected to make the same minor repairs, and to care for their immediate areas. During the week, civil engineering personnel will be seeding areas, applying fertilizer and planting trees. Residents in the village who have identified areas in their homes that need special attention are encouraged to contact CE for appropriate corrective action.

Bachelor Requirement Residents in bachelor housing areas will be expected to clean their areas and identify needed repairs that are beyond their capabilities and to contact CE for the corrective measures.

Colonel Baxter went on to add, "Junior Officers, NCOs, Airman Councils, Wives and Teen Clubs, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts are encouraged to participate in the Spring Clena-Up Campaign." They may do this by taking special efforts to clean up the areas where they have their meetings.



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# frame of reference

"...anyone can avoid injury if they are willing to prevent accidents."

Between Jan. 1 and March 31 this year, an average of two people per day presented their bruised and battered selves at the Reese USAF Hospital for necessary repairs. On a cash and carry basis, that cost each of us a little less than two bucks apiece—not even counting the time lost from work, extra paper work and the hundreds of other "hidden costs" of any accident.

Nor has any dollar basis been set for pain and suffering of the injured parties or the anguish experienced by loved ones and friends. We can be thankful that no loss of life or permanent injury resulted from any of these senseless mishaps.

After reducing the the assorted cuts, burns, bruises, fractures, strains, and other pains to impersonal statistical data, the Safety Staff found the following information:

• Injuries were up 51 per cent over the same period in 1973.

• More than half of the permanent party personnel

involved in on and off duty accidents were airmen in grades E-3 and below.

• All permanent party personnel injured in vehicle accidents were in grade E-3.

• On duty accidents nearly doubled compared to the first quarter of 1973.

• Injuries in private quarters almost doubled, while most other off duty classifications showed only small increases.

• Most accidents could have been prevented had the injured person simply paid attention to the task at hand.

• The use of seatbelts and motorcycle helmets probably kept the operators of private motor vehicles from receiving greater injuries.

To keep from being included in future tabulations, the Safety Office urges that everyone be aware of the hazards inherent to any activity in which a person may choose to participate. Once the hazards are know, anyone can avoid injury—if they WANT to. And if they are willing to do whatever is necessary to prevent accidents.

I've been around since the beginning of time and shall be present for all eternity. I am ageless. I never sleep, I owe allagience to no one. I am versatile, I perform my functions all over the world, at the same time, destroying mankind's most precious possessions. My enemies are few, my friends are many.

There are a few people who know me in a special way. These are the fire inspectors. They continuously check throughout the

when you don't take the time to listen to the fire inspector.

In most cases, you know me more than they do. Besides, I only happen to someone else. Your time is ". . .more valuable for other things," You pay outrageous insurance prices to protect your property and loved ones and who am I not to agree with you? Without your help, I am just another statistic waiting to happen.

In Air Training Command, I was able to cause panic and havoc seven times just in the month of February. These were: three dorm fires, one family house fire, one communication center fire and two hospital fires. I came through careless handling of smoking materials, faulty electric cords and even when specially brought in by a hospital patient throwing a book of lighted matches onto a bed. The hospital was full of patients. I could have had a field day with this one if it hadn't been for the fire inspector's training of hospital personnel in the use of fire extinguishers.

Reese is conducting the annual Spring Clean Up Sunday through April 27. The base fire inspectors will give you some tips on how to take care of your area. But, if you choose to ignore their advice, I will personally pay you an unexpected visit—soon.

## Remember when streak meant stripe?

Funny how the meanings of words change with the generations.

"Prestigious," used today to denote importance based on recognition of the subject's power, authority and standing, once had a far different definition, one resting on its Latin root-word, meaning deception. Respected dictionaries still define it as "of, or pertaining to, sleight of hand; hence, deceptive."

Or take "lifer." Over the years a member of the over-30 geriatric set had heard it used many ways—referring to a careerist (not necessarily disparagingly), bandied about humorously between Air Force friends, or a bit sarcastically when, for instance, a crew chief had ordered a coup of his men to do a rush job they felt could have been scheduled during a justcompleted slack time—"Isn't that just like a 'lifer?' "

But in recent months he had become increasingly aware that nowadays all young airmen apparently use the term solely in a derogatory sense. His curiosity finally prevailing, the next time he heard a young enlistee snort "lifer" contemptuously, he asked the young man why he resented someone choosing the Air Force as his life's work.

The airman looked at the questioner as if he were bananas. "What are you talkin' 'bout, man?" he asked. "I don't put anybody down for that.

My first sergeant's got over 22 in and he's a great dude."

Now it was the old gaffer's turn for bewilderment. So the airman explained slowly and patiently, as to a backward child: When he said "lifer," he was referring to an incompetent, bungling goof-ball whom he was convinced would starve to death on "the outside." That's all. While his "lifers" had invariably been in the service longer than he had, the fact that they might be going for 20 or 30 had nothing to do with it.

That cleared up the muddled semantic waters for the ancient one, and sparked a thought he'd like to lay on young enlistees: Their kind of "lifers" are rapidly becoming an endangered species; because as the Air Force becomes leaner, the thinning ranks are making goof-ups easier to spot than male streakers at a women's lib convention.

The moral of the story is that going for 20 or 30 is fine; but in today's streamlined Air Force, for reasons of personal survival it behooves one not to fall into the young airman's category of "lifer." (Added thought: For darned sure not "prestigious" one.) (ATCPS)

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# Management team solves man problems

The Air Force Management Engineering Program's objective is determine requirements, systematically improve distribution

and utilization of manpower resources by developing and maintaining manpower standards. It also provides management engineering services in the form of Management Advisory Studies which furnish solutions to manpower problems.

The description is an excerpt from Air Force Manual 25-5, the charter under which the Management Engineering Detachment (MED) operates.

### Local Detachment

The local MED or "MOM," as some people call us, is a detachment of the 3314th Management Engineering Squadron, operating under the direction of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Plans, Headquarters Air Training Command (ATC).

The Reese MED is your link with ATC in all manpower problems concerning manpower allocation and distribution.

The MED is organized into two separate branches, the Manpower and Organization Branch and the Management Engineering Team. The detachment commander, Capt. Harold W. Bonham, although directly responsible to the ATC

Director of Manpower and Organization, supports the wing commander at Reese and provides services to all base agencies in manpower matters.

In the Manpower and Organization Branch, Jeanne Yarbrough processes all Manpower Change requests and Unit Detail Listing changes. The conduct of day to day business in the Manpower Branch requires Mrs. Yarbrough to come in contact with almost every supervisor on Reese. The delicate business of applying congressional directed manpower reductions requires a great deal of diplomacy and patience.

### **Workload Evaluation**

How do you let someone know that he is going to lose some personel and keep him from blowing his stack. . or crying? Fortunately it is not usually like that. In addition to her other duties, Mrs. Yarbrough also processes the requests for valid workloads which result in increased authorizations.

The Management Engineering Team, under the direction of 1st Lt. Leslie W. Barnett Jr., performs Standards Setting Studies and Managemnet Advisory Studies. These are commonly referred to as the "leg work" of the program. These are the interviews, observations, timings and samplings. This is the facet of the Management Engineering Program that most people come in contact with.

This data gathering is of extreme importance because it reflects the manpower expenditure required to accomplish the mission at a certain workload level.

### **Team Members**

Lieutenant Barnett's team consists of MSgt. Carlos G. Gonzales, TSgt. Sam Tribble, SSgt. Terry Dill, SSgt. Perry Ellison and Sgt. Randy Rowan. All Management Engineering Technicians attend a 10-week course at Keesler AFB, Miss., Technical Training Center prior to assuming his duties in the field.

Back in the early days of the Management Engineering Program, 1958, when Headquarters USAF was faced with what seemed at that time to be insurmountable problems, the Manpower Validation Program was created. The goal was

to create a system whereby all major air commanders could "accurately and authentically validate their manpower requirements."

System Improvement

Although we have continued to make great advances in improving the system, the standards have never changed. The data needed to create a valid standard must come from the people in each organization.

For this reason, it is necessary to fully cooperate with the Management Engineering people when they come to your shop to conduct a management study. They are there for one reason and that is to help you, the wing and the Air Force.

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
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# Annual 'Law Day' planned for May 1


WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Air Force members joined with the other services, Reserve and National Guard forces to provide rescue and recovery aid to victims of a ninestate tornado disaster east of the Mississippi River April 3.


At Xenia, Ohio, 365 military personnel and 35 civilian employees from Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, provided immediate assistance to the community. The base also provided 6 light sets, 69 vehicles and 10 generators to the community, as well as opening the base hospital to 52 injured citizens and providing the services of the base blood bank to local medical authorities.

A photo reconnaissance mission was flown over the town at the request of local officials.

At Monticello, Ind., 40 Airmen from Grissom AFB, including members of a medical unit, assisted local authorities.

In addition to Regular and Reserve forces, 5,485 National Guardsmen are on state active duty in six states to provide disaster and cleanup assistance. States in which guardsmen are providing assistance include: Kentucky (1,253), Ohio (2,200), Indiana (912), Alabama (850), Tennessee (200) and West Virginia (70).

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# Payments go up for PCS-TDY

WASHINGTON (AFNS) Beginning July 1, members traveling by privately owned vehicles (POV) on either a permanent change of station (PCS) or temporary duty status (TDY) will receive an increased mileage allowance as a result of a Department of Defense decision.

The increase, first in more than 20 years, will pay members eight cents per mile instead of six for a PCS move. In addition, a sponsor will receive seven cents a mile for dependents over 12 years of age on a PCS move. The present rate is six. The present rate for dependents 2-11 years old is three cents per mile. The new rate will increase that payment by one-half cent.

There will be no limit as to the total amount of payment a member can receive for his dependents on a PCS move under the new policy, as opposed to the present 18 cents a mile limit.

Members traveling by POV on TDY status after July 1 will receive seven cents per mile, compared to the present five cents per mile standard. The current statutory seven cents per mile rate for TDY travel by POV, when it is more advantageous to the government, will remain in effect.

The new rates are contained in a change to Volume I of the Joint Travel Regulations, distributed in April.

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

# Karting combines safety, speed in racing

If you were to go up to someone and ask them to describe their image of a go-kart, you would probably end up with a description of a lawn mower engine mounted on a homemade frame with a freckled 10 year-old at the wheel putt-putting around a circular track on a Saturday afternoon.

Not too long ago, that would have been a pretty accurate description. Today, however, the image of a kart (no longer called a go-kart) has radically changed. Frame modifications, spoilers, exotic carburators and fuel mixtures have turned the putt-putt set into a group of 100-mile per hour plus racers.

### **New Image**

The kart is now an open-wheeled platform with front bumpers, padded (often custom made to fit the driver) seats, side fuel tanks which are capable of carrying up to 14 gallons of fuel, and an engine, or engines, mounted next to the rear wheels. They can have no longer than a 50-inch wheelbase, a 42-inch overall axle width and be no higher than 26 inches from the ground. Maximum ground clearance is 2 inches, which means that their center of gravity is extremely low. This is a big safety plus since the low center of gravity makes them almost impossible to flip over.

The modern cart is generally fitted with four wheel disc brakes and the driver is required to wear a full coverage helmet, gloves, heavy leather or vinyl jacket and full length trousers. Personal safety is not the only factor in kart racing. In order to make sure that all contestants are driving safe karts, special licensing requirements are imposed on the drivers to insure that they are experienced enough to race in a particular class.

### "Challenge!"

"Karting is a challenge to ones ability to think straight, react fast and do everything right in just a short time. When you're doing over a hundred miles an hour," says Airman Sarsycki, "you have to be aware of everything that's going on around you, the position of the other racers, your speed and the condition of the road ahead of you. When you are in something as small as a kart, even a little rock on the track can cause you to spin or lose control. I'm not worried about flipping over, but

Before they can be licensed, their when something like that happens, you lose a lot of time and that is what a race is all about.'


Compared to some other hobbies. karting is fairly economical. A beginner can get a good used kart and engine for about \$250. If you just want to drive around the local track and leave the racing to the pros, you can get a kart for even less than that. But for the more adventurous, a good cart can be modified, rebuilt and readied for track competition.

Airman Sarsycki usually races in the "Enduro Class." Enduro Class racing is like a miniature version of the Monte Carlo Grand Prix, complete with winding tracks between 2 and 8 miles long, curve speeds as low as 10 mph and straightaway speeds over 100 mph.

Sunday Airman Sarsycki will once again takes to the track in competition at Buffalo Springs Lake. The winding lake road and room for thousands of spectators,

make the lake an ideal site for competition. Airman Sarsycki hopes that a lot of Reese residents will come out to the track this weekend to watch the race. If enough people get interested in karting, both for family recreation and racing, he might be able to set up a karting chapter.



## Artificial respiration saves lives

Some day you might have a chance to help a dead person return to life. How could this happen?

A person who has stopped breathing may not be dead. Mouthto-mouth breathing, or artificial respiration, has saved many lives. The mouth-to-mouth technique, as well as heart massage, is easy to learn and should be known by evervone.

Although a person who has stopped breathing, or whose heart has stopped beating may not be dead, he will die if breathing and circulation stop for more than about three minutes, thus starving the brain of the oxygen it needs.

If you panic, you may make mistakes. Start respiration immediately. Here is how to apply mouth-to-mouth rebreathing:

• Turn the person on his back.

• Quickly remove any foreign matter from the mouth. Turn the head to the side and remove all obstructions with the fingers.

• Put one of your hands under the neck and the other under the chin. Pull the chin upward until the head is tilted back as far as it will go. This assures that air passages will remain open throughout the process

• Place your mouth tightly over a

small child's nose and mouth. In the case of an older child or an adult, put your mouth tightly over the victim's mouth and pinch the nostrils to prevent the leakage of air.

• Breathe into the mouth and/or nose until you see the chest expand.

• Remove your mouth and listen for the sound of returning air. If you don't hear this, recheck the victim's position of head. Again, check for any obstructions in the mouth.

 Repeat breathing. Remove your mouth from the victim's mouth and nose each time to let the air escape. For a small child take relatively small breaths and repeat about 20 times per minute. For an adult, breathe about 12 times vigorously per minute.

• Continue mouth-to-mouth breathing until the breathing begins, or for at least four hours, or until the patient is pronounced dead by a doctor.

If the victim begins to breathe on his own again, you may congratulate yourself. But do not become overconfident. Always be ready to start aiding in the breathing process again.


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# Balsillie earns month's top award

\* Model SK-26, 12-inch aluminum cooking surface.

\* Model SK-26AVT, 12-inch nonstick cooking surface, avocado color.

\* Model SK-27AVT, buffet skillet, nonstick surface, avocado color.

\* Model SK-27HRT, buffet skillet, nonstick cooking surface, harvest gold color.

Patrons who recently purchased a GE electric skillet should check for the lot numbers 407 through 411. Any skillet with those lot numbers should be returned immediately for a refund.


