

All military continental United Stated leave commercial air travel will be at a fare of 75 per cent of the jet coach/tourist rate and will require a seat reservation, beginning Wednesday. The present military standby fare at half cost will be discontinued on the same date.

Adoption of the highly polished colonel insignia of the Navy and Marine Corps as the Air Force standard is another change. Air Force colonels have previously worn the oxidized-finish insignia. Other new authorizations make the wear of black gloves, as an alternative to gray, optional for male personnel and when authorized by the local commander, optional wear of the gray scarf with the work utility uniform. A USAF Honor Guard shoulder arc for the blue service uniform has been approved for members of that organization. Subject to the approval of their major commands, enlisted major command honor guard members may wear the command crest on the collars of the long sleeve blue shirts. Also approved is an Air Force Reserve recruiter badge, similiar to the one worn by active-duty recruiters.

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

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

I have appealed to my squadron commander on two different occasions but to no avail. Rest assured the honor guard isn't wholly comprised of volunteers.

#### Sergeant Millwee:

I regret that I was in error as to the "all volunteer" status of the Reese Honor Guard as reported in the Roundup. I had been told by the honor guard commander that the honor guard was all volunteers and he likewise was under the impression that all volunteers were on the guard. At various meetings the Honor Guard Commander has discussed the desire to have all volunteers and if anyone did not desire to be on the guard, or was having a problem, to see him. Although an all volunteer guard is desired and where possible volunteers are used to fill mandatory squadron manning, the number of volunteers is sometimes insufficient to fill this requirement. When sufficient volunteers are unavailable, it is necessary to assign non-volunteers to meet the manning requirements. While it is my desire that the guard be all volunteers, I must also assure that the honor guard be fully manned and capable of providing the services required. It is unfortunate that occasionally personnel must be assigned involuntarily to this outstanding unit when it should be a privilege to serve with such a distinguished group. I have discussed your problem with the honor guard commander and he informs me that your squadron commander is attempting to identify another outstanding airman or NCO who will perform honor guard duties as well as you.

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## 'MOB' moves in on Reese

The "MOB" has arrived at Reese. Air Force Communications Service (AFCS) made an offer Reese couldn't refuse—better communications.

Many people have been wondering what the ominous looking vans occupying much-needed parking space by Bldg. P-20 are for—especially people who normally park there. They comprise a mobile communications center which will be used during installation of new communications equipment in the 2053 Communications Squadron Telecommunications Center.

The "MOB" is Team 74-008, 3rd Mobile Communications Group from Tinker AFB, Okla. The team commander is TSgt. Marvin J. Tyler, who has the task of insuring the Mobile Communications Center provides the communications or Automatic Digital Network (AUTODIN) services for Reese personnel.

Sergeant Tyler stated, "The mobile vans, although unsightly, offer a modern and efficient telecommunications system to provide interim AUTODIN capabilities, while identical equipment is being installed in the new Communications Center.

"Additionally, the vans will provide an excellent training opportunity for 2053 Comm Squadron telecommunications personnel who will be operating both the mobile vans and the permanent Communications Center when re-activated. There will be no degradation of services while operating from the vans. In fact, the mobile center will provide transmission speed twice that of the present system in use."

Reese Communications Center and AUTODIN customers will be advised well in advance before the conversion from the present AUTODIN terminal to the mobile vans. The conversion will take place approximately May 10. The rest of team 74-008 are: SSgt. Barbarol J. James, Sgt. James R. Horst and A/C Heriberto Recio.

AFCS provides communications, Navaids and Air Traffic Control Services for Department of Defense agencies on a worldwide basis.



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
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# Aging tracksters get contest call

Pain said that the masters championships should not be considered demonstrations of the physical prowess of a small minority but rather a demonstration of the extent

to which physical fitness can be maintained throughout life.


Age divisions in the Canadian championship will be 40-49, 50-59 and 60 years and over. The following events are scheduled for each age group: 100 meter, 200 meter, 400 meter, 800 meter, 1,500 meter, 10,000 meter, 110-meter high hurdles, 400meter intermediate hurdles, 3,000meter steeplechase, high jump, long jump, triple jump, pole vault, shotput, discus, javelin, hammer throw, 20-kilometer walk, 4 x 100-meter relay, 4 x 400-meter relay.

During July 5-7, the Amateur Athletic Union Masters Track and Field Championships will be held at Gresham, Oreg. All of the aforementioned tract and field events will be held in each of the three age divisions. Some 600 athletes are expected to participate.

Masters-level competition, in its present form, began in 1968 at San Diego, Calif. By 1971, the U.S. championships were attracting large numbers of competitors, including some from Canada. In 1972, the Canadians formed their own group.


