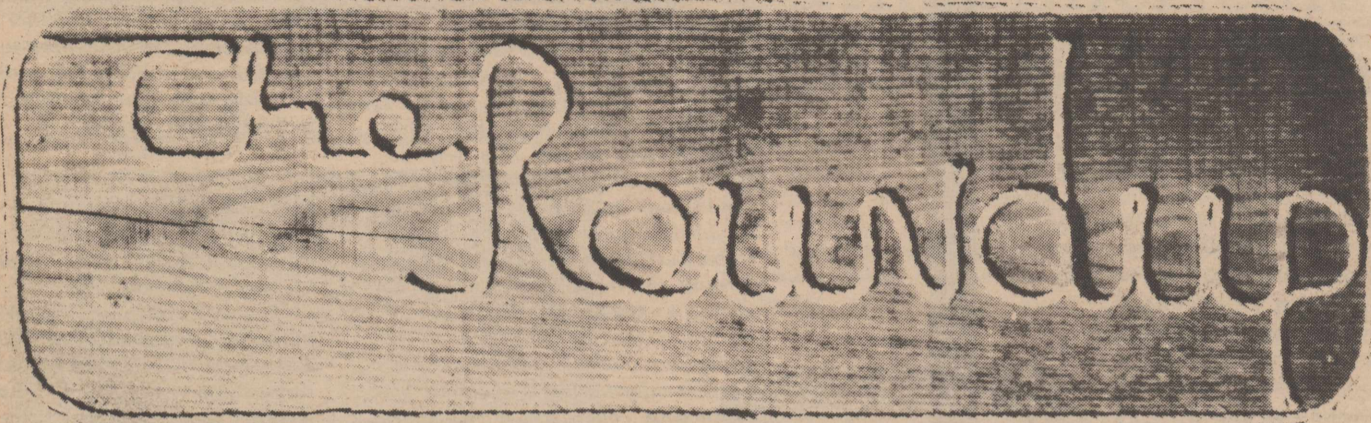

## Base welcomes citizens during Shallowater Day

Reese opened its doors Monday to the residents of Shallowater, Tex., in a special "Shallowater Day". More than 800 people, mostly school children, came to the base to view the pilot training facilities and to learn more about the mission of Reese and the Air Force. After a brief welcoming ceremony in the base theater, the first group of children and teachers were escorted around the base. Student and instructor pilots pointed out the training facilities and took them to several demonstrations in various base organizations.

At the Physiological Training Unit, the residents were given a demonstration of the ejection seat, gravity and motion training units and the parachute swing landing stand.

Other tour highlights were a close-up inspection of both the Cessna T-37 and the

Northrop T-38 Talon jet trainers, a tour of the base fire station and an examination of the simulator training branch. Most of the children seemed to be most impressed by the chance to drive out to the edge of the runways and closely observe the aircraft taking off and landing.

Even the irritating sound of the jet engines did not keep the children from voting unanimously at the end of the tour to all become Air Force pilots.

Civic and business leaders from Shallowater also visited the base for a special tour and were honored at a lunch in the Officers' Open Mess.

The purpose of the special day's activities was to give Reese an opportunity to honor all Shallowater residents and to show our appreciation for the warm hospitality and continued support they have given Reese in the past.

This indicates a need for you to receive supply training so that you can properly fulfill the needs of your offices supply requirements. Your supervisor is being contacted in order to schedule you for supply training.

A tailgator is ignorance with a weapon at its command... death with a gleam in its eye... and irresponsibility with a driver's license.

A tailgator has the appetite of Dracula, the energy of a 400-horse-power engine, the curiosity of a rear bumper inspector, the enthusiasm of a horseman chasing Lady Godiva, and the shyness of a fullback three yards from the goal line.

No one else is so familiar with the hospital emergency room or so at home in traffic court. When you're stranded on an

empty road, he roars past with a wave. When you don't want him, he's grinning at you in your rear mirror. No one else can cram into 20 years of driving 20 assorted varieties of cars with stove-in front ends.

A tailgator is a fabulous creature. You can keep him out of your back seat, but you can't keep him out of the wreckage of your trunk. You can charge him higher insurance premiums, but you can't charge him with the murder of his victims. You can suspend his license, but you can't suspend his driving. He's your terror, your shadow, the cause of cursing, your constant, too-close companion on the road. But when he finally turns off at a tavern, he's a soothing vacant space behind your car, a toothache that's stopped hurting, a feeling of safety in the world.

And, when he gives you the whiplash snap, crackle, and pop of the upper vertebrae in a rear-end collision and comes to visit you while you're in traction, he can bring tears to your eyes with those brief, apologetic words: "I ain't got no insurance."

Dear Mr. Ireland:

It has been called to the attention of this Committee by the Texas Employment Commission office in Lubbock that your installation has distinguished itself in the hiring of handicapped workers.

We realize that as a Federal employer hiring through the Civil Service, special emphasis is given to hiring handicapped veterans. However, some Federal agencies do much better in this regard than others, and it was on this basis that the TEC cited your facility.

We of the Disabled American Veterans of Texas commend you for this farsighted and progressive employment hiring practice. We sincerely hope that the example you set will be an inspiration to other employers to follow suit in hiring new employees on the basis of their ability to do the job.

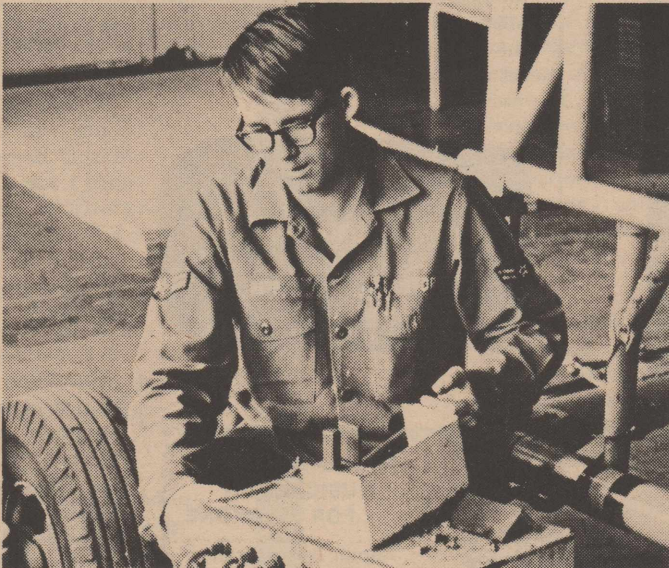
## IP of the Month

Sir:

This is a call concerning the watering of the grass on base. It seems to me that a lot of water is being wasted by watering during the day and it also burns the grass. I don't believe it is effective at all. I think it would be a better idea to water the grass on base from sundown to morning. That way it would be a lot more effective and there wouldn't be so much water wasted. Thank you, sir.

Sergeant Jemiolo:

While it is true that some water is wasted in the daytime due to evaporation, it is impractical to irrigate at night. Daytime watering

allows personnel assigned to this task to perform other grounds maintenance work between set ups of irrigation piping and turning the water on and off. Nighttime irrigation does not permit efficient manpower use. Daytime watering does not burn the grass. Some scalding could occur during extremely hot days, but bermuda grass does not normally scald to the extent that serious damage could occur. Thank you for your concern.

Sir:

I am calling to congratulate a group of persons in the research department of Supply. These people can come up with the right part with very little to go on. This is a very nerve wracking job but they handle it professionally and calmly. I would like to thank them for doing a tremendous job and to say that they should be recognized for their hard work.

Sir:

I am calling in reference to your answer to a question which appeared in the April 5 Roundup. A person wrote to you about the selection of personnel for the base honor guard. In your answer you stated that to

your knowledge all members were volunteers. Sir, I believe you are in error in making this statement. A personnel check of all the guards revealed that the majority of its members were drafted by their respective squadron commander. One month after my arrival at this installation, I was told that I was a permanent member of the honor guard. No questions were asked as to whether I had any other personal problems or anything else that would interfere with that duty. Since that time in October, 1973, I have attempted in vain, to have myself removed from this detail. I have gone to the NCOIC of the honor guard and explained to him that I was drafted for this detail and would like to be removed. That was over a month ago and I am still a member. I have appealed to my squadron commander on two different occasions but to no avail. Rest assured the honor guard isn't wholly comprised of volunteers.

Sergeant Millwee:

I regret that I was in error as to the "all volunteer" status of the Reese Honor Guard as reported in the Roundup. I had been told by the honor guard commander that the honor guard was all volunteers and he likewise was under the impression that all volunteers were on the guard. At various meetings the Honor Guard Commander has discussed the desire to have all volunteers and if anyone did not desire to be on the guard, or was having a problem, to see him. Although an all volunteer guard is desired and where possible volunteers are used to fill mandatory squadron manning, the number of volunteers is sometimes insufficient to fill this requirement. When sufficient volunteers are unavailable, it is necessary to assign non-volunteers to meet the manning requirements. While it is my desire that the guard be all volunteers, I must also assure that the honor guard be fully manned and capable of providing the services required. It is unfortunate that occasionally personnel must be assigned involuntarily to this outstanding unit when it should be a privilege to serve with such a distinguished group. I have discussed your problem with the honor guard commander and he informs me that your squadron commander is attempting to identify another outstanding airman or NCO who will perform honor guard duties as well as you.

# 'MOB' moves in on Reese

The "MOB" has arrived at Reese. Air Force Communications Service (AFCS) made an offer Reese couldn't refuse—better communications.

Many people have been wondering what the ominous looking vans occupying much-needed parking space by Bldg. P-20 are for—especially people who normally park there. They comprise a mobile communications center which will be used during installation of new communications equipment in the 2053 Communications Squadron Telecommunications Center.

The "MOB" is Team 74-008, 3rd Mobile Communications Group

from Tinker AFB, Okla. The team commander is TSgt. Marvin J. Tyler, who has the task of insuring the Mobile Communications Center provides the communications or Automatic Digital Network (AUTODIN) services for Reese personnel.

Sergeant Tyler stated, "The mobile vans, although unsightly, offer a modern and efficient telecommunications system to provide interim AUTODIN capabilities, while identical equipment is being installed in the new Communications Center.

"Additionally, the vans will provide an excellent training opportunity for 2053 Comm Squadron telecommunications personnel who will be operating both the mobile

vans and the permanent Communications Center when re-activated. There will be no degradation of services while operating from the vans. In fact, the mobile center will provide transmission speed twice that of the present system in use."

Reese Communications Center and AUTODIN customers will be advised well in advance before the conversion from the present AUTODIN terminal to the mobile vans. The conversion will take place approximately May 10. The rest of team 74-008 are: SSgt. Barbarol J. James, Sgt. James R. Horst and A/C Heriberto Recio.

AFCS provides communications, Nav aids and Air Traffic Control Services for Department of Defense agencies on a worldwide basis.

# Aging tracksters get contest call

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - David H.R. Pain, director of the U.S. Masters International track team, has issued a call to all military personnel, active and retired, who are over 40 years old to participate in the first Canadian Masters Track and Field Championships, June 29-30, 1974, at Vancouver, British Columbia.

Pain said that the masters championships should not be considered demonstrations of the physical prowess of a small minority but rather a demonstration of the extent

to which physical fitness can be maintained throughout life.

Age divisions in the Canadian championship will be 40-49, 50-59 and 60 years and over. The following events are scheduled for each age group: 100 meter, 200 meter, 400 meter, 800 meter, 1,500 meter, 10,000 meter, 110-meter high hurdles, 400-meter intermediate hurdles, 3,000-meter steeplechase, high jump, long jump, triple jump, pole vault, shotput, discus, javelin, hammer throw, 20-kilometer walk, 4 x 100-meter relay, 4 x 400-meter relay.

During July 5-7, the Amateur Athletic Union Masters Track and Field Championships will be held at Gresham, Ore. All of the aforementioned track and field events will be held in each of the three age divisions. Some 600 athletes are expected to participate.

Masters-level competition, in its present form, began in 1968 at San Diego, Calif. By 1971, the U.S. championships were attracting large numbers of competitors, including some from Canada. In 1972, the Canadians formed their own group.

Similar groups also sprung up in Europe. Now, plans are being drawn for the first World Masters Track and Field Championships to be sponsored by and held at the 1975 Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto.
