Personnel computer setup saves time,

An Advanced Personnel Data System (APDS) has been activated Air Force wide that allows officials more precise control of personnel resources and affords the individual more personalized service by saving the personnel specialist manhours which can now be spent with people.

Lt. Gen. John W. Roberts, Air Force deputy chief of staff for Personnel, has checked out the new worldwide data system at, one of the remote terminals located in the Pentagon.

Planning for Years

"We've been planning this day for many years," General Roberts said, "and I want to congratulate the hundreds of airmen, officers and civilians who contributed toward making this system.'

Within the next 12 months, APDS will be playing a vital role in the careers of more than 600,000 active-duty officers and airmen, more than 500,000 Air Guardsmen and Reservists and more than 250,000 civilian personnel—the Air Force Total

Here at Reese, the APDS system went in to effect as scheduled on April 15, with the delivery of the implementation tape to the Data Automation Center at Randolph, AFB, Tex. The tape contained the computerized records of 2,974 permanent party military and student pilots stationed here.

Highly Sophisticated

The APDS is a highly sophisticated computerized network linking bases, major commands and Air Force headquarters personnel staffs. For the first time, personnel managers at 140 active-duty consolidated base personnel offices (CBPOs) and an almost equal number of Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve personnel offices will be able to flow data electronically to the Air Force Military Personnel Center at Randolph AFB, Tex.

Selected portions of the data will be fed back to the major commands.

The APDS will be able to pick up assessions, build a basic record, then track people throughout their Air Force careers to eventual retirement or separation from the service. It will provide all of the information that the Air Force needs to

manage the force as a whole by grade, year group and Air Force speciality code, and the information used by career monitors and selection boards to make decisions on such individual actions as assignments, training and promotion.

It will also provide a modeling and simulation capability to evaluate the relative impact of policy alternatives.

Student Pipeline

Another key action will be the scheduling of people through pilot and navigator training pipelines and setting up of course sequences and class entry dates, to minimize the time and dollar cost of training the rated force.

Reese officials have noted that the implementation of the new APDS has been more successful than they had hoped. This is due to the close cooperation between the Data Automation personnel and the Personnel Systems Management branch of the Reese CBPO. This cooperation has eliminated some of the initial implementation errors normally encountered

The implementation of the APDS will mean increased emphasis on keeping the "personal" in personnel and better service to each member of the Air Force Total

special order uniform items through either the clothing sales store of the base exchange and receive delivery of the items within 10 to 12 days.

Dressing facilities for women in the base gymnasium was also discussed. It was felt that there were not adequate shower or dressing room facilities for the women enlisted members to use. The situation has been remedied with the conversion of the gymnasium staff dressing rooms into a women's locker room. The conversion has been completed and those rooms are now available for use.

Finally, the question of use of the tennis courts by women members was raised. Special Services Division assured the council that the use of the tennis courts was based strictly on a first-come, firstserved basis and that there would be no discrimination based on sex.

The Council also discussed the fuel allocation policy at the Base Exchange Service Station. The council was told by Lt. Col. James E. Page that the service station would have an adequate supply of gasoline to service the needs of the base population and that the station would be receiving 90 per cent of the allocation received the same month in 1972, in compliance with the directive issued by the Federal Energy Office.

Colonel Page also said that the 10 gallon per purchase limited which was imposed

during fuel saving measure had been lifted and that now gas station patrons would be allowed to fill their tanks.

The final item of business covered at the meeting was a problem with the car pooling reserved spaces on base. It was pointed out that some people had been making and erecting their own car pool reservation signs next to their organizations. All personnel were reminded that this was an

illegal practice and should be discontinued immediately. The only people who have the authority to make and place the car pool reservation signs is the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron.

People on base who are in a car pool and who have been given a reserved parking space, but whose reserved sign has not been put up, are encouraged to call the Reese Customer Service Center, Ext. 2276, to have the proper action taken.

April punishments given

Nineteen airmen at Reese received Article 15 actions (non-judicial punishment under the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ) during the month of April.

Eleven of the nineteen airmen charged were from 64th Air Base Group. Four were charged with being Absent Without Leave (AWOL) in violation of Article 86, two were charged with possesion of marijuana under Article 92 and three others were charged with failure to go, in violation of Article 86.

The remaining airmen were charged with destruction of government property under Article 108 and with being disorderly in station, Article 134.

Four airmen from the Supply Squadron

were charged under four separate offenses of the UCMJ: failure to obey an order, Article 92: damage to government property. Article 108; larceny, Article 121 and possession of marijuana, Article 92.

A sergeant in the Detachment II, 24th Weather Squadron was charged with dereliction of duty under Article 92 and an airman in the USAF Hospital was charged with failure to go, under Article 86.

An airman in the 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron was charged with two violations, failure to go, Article 86 and being AWOL in violation of Article 96.

A sergeant in the 64th Field Maintenance Squadron was charged with reckless driving under the provisions of







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News Briefs

The Reese Golf Course Clubhouse will have regular hours on Monday but will be closed Tuesday due to the Air Training Command Commander's Conference.

The growing popularity of bicycles, especially the multispeed varieties, has brought a strong word of caution from the Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES). AAFES considers the lack of caliper handbrake assemblies secured to the frames of some of the multispeed bikes so serious that exchanges worldwide have been instructed to check bicycle stock assortments and add a lockwasher or self-locking device to handbrake assemblies which do not have that feature. "At least one fatality has been attributed to a slipping caliper handbrake mechanism and the exchange is doing everything possible to see that the military community is aware of the potential danger," an AAFES official said. Patrons who discover their bikes do not have locking devices securing the handbrakes to the frames can obtain them free at the Reese BX.

Over three hundred Boy Scouts from the Longhorn District of the South Plains Area Boy Scout Council are expected at Reese Friday, Saturday and Sunday for their annual Spring Camporee. The weekend of scouting activities will include field competitions, cooking, first aid and camping skills. Reese will be one of only three Air Force bases in the United States hosting a Boy Scout camporee this year and the only one in the Southwestern United States.

Due to the Boy Scouts using the Wing Dining Hall during their weekend Camporee, the facility will be on weekday serving hours on Saturday only. The dining hall will be open from 6 to 8 a.m. until 1 p.m. and from 3 until 6 p.m. Saturday.

Hair sprays containing the substance vinyl chloride are now being recalled from Army and Air Force Exchange Service outlets worldwide, following a Food and Drug Administration (FDA) announcement that the substance has been associated with liver cancer. According to the Quality Assurance Section of the Exchange Service, two pupular commercial hairspray products of Clairol Inc., Summer Blonde and Miss Clairol, have been identified and are being

recalled. Patrons who have bought either of these products may

return them to the Reese BX for a full refund.

Suggestions protect consumer

There are countless methods whereby the door-to-door salesman, the local department store or the local finance company can take unfair advantage of the unsuspecting consumer.

Legal protections against these pitfalls are few and far between, and the primary responsibility for your protection depends on you. Prior to signing any document that may obligate you financially, you should:

• Use your common sense. No one offers a free gift, a special deal, or a once-in-a-million chance for free. The price you pay for the merchandise you buy includes the cost of such gimmicks and is usually higher than the price you would pay for the same merchandise purchased from a reputable dealer.

- Thoroughly read the contract or document you are asked to sign. If you are unclear about any portion of the contract, take it to your legal assistance office. Oral representations by the salesman are generally meaningless after you have signed the contract, and his personal interest in the sale can hardly be said to foster an objective
- If you have some doubt as the reputation of the firm, contact the Better Business Bureau. Doing so may prevent a fraud which would cost you money. This step is especially important in the case of door-to-door salesmen.
- · Local, state, and federal statutes provide some protection. For instance, door-to-door salesmen

preying on your sympathy (i.e., "If I sell two more subscriptions, I'll get a scholarship") is prohibited within the Lubbock city limits. If you receive unsolicited merchandise addressed to you, that merchandise is presumed a gift by Texas statute. If you have contracted for a loan or credit, that contract must include the annual percentage rate, any finance charges, and a statement of how much the loan will cost you. Failure of the creditor to comply with federal regulations in this area may subject him to civil liability in the amount of twice the finance

- Keep these suggestions in mind when shopping or when you think you have been deceived:
- · Shop around before you buy that "amazing" bargain.

- Bring your complaint to the attention of the seller.
- · Report the false advertising to the media carrying it.
- Report the deception to the organization concerned with better business standards.
- Report the deception to your city, county, or state government

Legal remedies should not be attempted, however, without consulting a legal assistance officer. His guidance and assistance can prevent costly mistakes and can protect you against high-pressure, low quality salesmanship. Remember, once you sign the contract or document, it is very hard to change the provisions of the contract or document.

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
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CHAMPUS sets guidelines

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The Department of Defense has announced new guidelines concerning inpatient and outpatient psychiatric care, including educational services, provided under the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS).

The new guidelines specify that facilities offering the psychiatric care and educational services must have accreditation from the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH) under standards appropriate to that facility.

In addition, the new memorandum on residential (including psychiatric) care involving educational services in the United States said that the care may be approved if a facility has applied to JCAH for accreditation and has met CHAMPUS interim standards approved by the Department of Defense assistant secretary for Health and Environment.

The memo also stated that individuals who, on July 1, 1974, are in facilities which have not met JCAH

requirements may be continued under CHAMPUS for a period not to exceed 90 days. This time is allotted in order for the patient to make alternative arrangements. The approvals authorized may be con-

tinued as appropriate until June 30.

Facilities which qualify shall be reimbursed on the basis of a combined daily charge, and such charge shall be cost-shared as outpatient

A pair of slide briefings and a Palace Flicks film report have been produced by the Air Force Military Personnel Center here to explain the new career airman reenlistment reservation system (CAREERS).

Making its debut July 1, CAREERS is designed to control the flow of first-term airmen into the career force through selective reenlistment in specialties where there are valid requirements.

The personnel center left briefer selection to the discretion of each

major command or separate operating agency, but requested that they brief first-term airmen with 32-48 months service during May and unite commanders and supervisors during the April-June time frame.



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
Mother's Day

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OER system improves accuracy

officer evaluation system, originally scheduled to have been implemented in April, will now become operational in November.

An officer effectiveness report (OER) workshop will be held at the Air Force Military Personnel Center at Randolph AFB, Tex., during May to smooth out the few remaining rough edges for the new system that is designed to eliminate the creeping inflation which has impaired the effectiveness of current OERs.

Trial Run

"The basic system is workable," a chief of staff message read. It explained that a trail run of the new system was conducted during March at an operational wing and a special category agency. "The results are very encouraging," the message continued.

The three objectives of the workshop will be to go over the trial run results, address unique command problems and review the implementation plan.

The new system results from a five-year research and development

A number of systems were evaluated by Air Force planners, and the concept for the new system was approved by the Air Force chief of staff for testing in 1972; 10 commands and more than 5.000 officers participated.

A new form, the "Job Performance Evaluation" (JPE), and a controlled review process are basic features of the new system.

The job description section has been simplified and structured to highlight unique features of an officer's job. In some cases, the rater will simply enter the officer's duty title. But, there are also provisions for identifying special duties and responsibilities atypical for others having similar assignments. This will reduce the verbiage commonly found in present job descriptions and make the description more meaningful to users of the report.

Job performance on the new form is evaluated in terms of 10 carefully selected factors designed to evaluate the officer's job knowledge, professional qualities, leadership and adaptability to stress. The rater uses a written set of standards as reference points in making his evaluation on a scale that ranges from "far below" to "well above" standard. Under each of the 10 performance factors, the rater is required to give specific examples for all ratings above or below the middle rating of "meets standard."

Out In Open

The new report puts assignment recommendations out in the open in an easily understood format. The rater cites what he believes to be the officer's strongest qualification,

recommends a job assignment and level of assignment, and provides suggestions for appropriate timing.

Probably the biggest change in the new system involves the overall evaluation. The overall evaluation is divided into three major categories: "Top 15 Per Cent," "Middle of the Pack," and "Bottom 20 Per Cent." The rating official first decides where the officer falls and then rates him again within that specific group.

Air Force has also standardized the review process. Rules will limit participants on each report to the reporting and indorsing officers and one reviewing officer. Reports on field grade officers must be reviewed by a colonel or above, while those on company graders require review by a major or higher.

Handwritten Form

Another new form, "Lieutenant Colonel Promotion Potential Evaluation," will be added to the system. The new form is handwritten. The rater decides whether or not the officer should be promoted, and if so, whether in the primary of secondary zone. Once that's done the rater determines where in the zone promotion should take place. Since it's a closed evaluation, comments on the new form cannot be derogatory. Only the reviewer and central selection boards see the completed form. The additional rater adds his rating

without seeing the original rating. The two ratings then go to the reviewer who reads both and resolves any differences. The form is then sent directly to the promotion secretariat at the personnel center. It's maintained there and used only by the selection boards. No one else may see the form, including the officer being rated.

The message closed by asking commands for continued support in implementing the new system.

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

FY 75 commissioning goal set

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AFB, Ohio (AFNS) - The maximum number of airmen who may receive a commission through the airman education and commissioning program (AECP) during fiscal year 1975 will be 700.

The fiscal year 1975 program has dropped the 300 pilot/navigator slots which were included in the fisquota for that year to an alltime high of 1,000.

In the past, a specific number of quotas was allotted for each Air Force specialty code. The 1975 program has established percentage quotas by academic areas. Academic areas and their percentage follow:

Engineering, 32.5; Administration/management and military science, 30; mathematics, 10; physical science, 7.5; social science. 7.5; arts, humanities and education, 5; interarea specialization (computer science) 5; and biological science, 2.5.

Good news for many airmen whose degrees were previously not required by the Air Force is that the list of academic specialties now

cal year 1974 program, running the needed has been expanded. Members in this category may now apply directly for the Officer Training School phase of the AECP or for a lateral degree as desired.


In addition to the elimination of the pilot/navigator slots, there will be no positions for undergraduate physical/occupational nursing, therapy, medical technology programs, social work or hospital administration.

Students selected for AECP who require more than one year to complete their degree requirements will continue to be assigned to an educational institution in a permanent change of station status. Those who can complete the degree in one year or less will be considered for permissive temporary duty (TDY) status. Regardless of status, however, selected personnel will have tuition, mandatory fees, and an allowance for books paid by the Air Force.

Airmen submitting formal applications who would agree to complete their degree or lateral degree as appropriate, via the TDY route, should include a letter from their college with their application. The letter must include a statement of acceptance to the school and certification that applicant can complete the degree within a year after entry into the education program. Airmen who are able and willing to pursue the TDY option will increase their chances for selection.

Individuals interested in applying for AECP should visit their base education office for more in-
