A recent medical-economic survey conducted by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation shows that, according to standards which have been successful in other communities, Baird is qualified for further participation.

The survey showed that last year Baird area resident traveled some 287,136 miles to visit out-of-town doctors and spent \$81,365 for office calls, medicine and gasoline while going out of town for medical service.

In addition, the survey showed Baird area residents spent more than \$67,000 on clothing, groceries and other merchandise while in another town to see a physician.

Of people in the Baird area who visited a doctor's office during the past year, more than 47 per cent went to Clyde and 25 per cent went to Abilene.





> Economic Opportunities Loans to farmers may be made to improve their farming operations; to buy more land, livestock, machinery and equipment; construct needed farm buildings; and to pay annual operating expenses for feed, seed and ferti-

> Loans may also be obtained by farm and rural familities to finance rural-based, but non-agricultural enterprises. Funds may be used to purchase land, construct buildings, buy and install equipment and pay normal operating expenses of a variety of non-agricultural enterprises such as a farm machinery repair shop; TV and radio repair shop; ladders, spraying equipment and tools to be used by painters and carpenters; blacksmith shop; septic tank and sewage disposal system servicing; custom grass setting and land preparation; saw and lawn mower sharpening shop; post and wood cutting equipment; portable sheep and goat shearing equipment: and other items

> Economic Opportunity Loans are designed to help low-income rural families raise their income level. These loans may be scheduled for repayment over periods up to 30 years at an interest rate of 4-1/8 per cent. The cooperative must pledge as security for the loan a property lien and pledge of revenue.
