Realignment actions to affect military

WASHINGTON (AFNS)-Secretary of Defense James R. Schlesinger has announced approval of 111 base realignment actions. These actions are part of the continuing Defense effort to divert resources from support and overhead activities to combat capability and to realign Defense activities with today's lower force levels.

All actions will aid Air Force efforts to operate within the limits of appropriated funds. At present, plans are being prepared as follows: The Air Force will retire some reciprocating engine aircraft used for administrative and support flying and jet powered support aircraft will be consolidated at centralized locations under the Military Airlift Command.

AFCS Moves to MAC Headquarters Force Air

Communications Service, Gebaur AFB, Mo., will be disestablished and its management functions will be assigned to Headquarters, Military Airlift Command, Scott AFB, Ill.

The Air Force Systems Command laboratories will be consolidated and will include the disestablishment of the Special Weapons Center, Kirtland AFB, N.M. and the relocation of major functions of Rome Air Development Center, Griffiss AFB, Rome, N.Y., the reorientation of Cambridge Research Laboratories, L.G. Hanscom AFB, Mass., to include command, control, and communications effort; establishment of Wright Technology Center at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, and the addition of an environmental research activity at Kirtland AFB, N.M.

Ellington AFB, Tex. will be closed to Air Force activities upon relocation of Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard activities. Some Strategic Air Command satellite alert activities will be inactivated. The 17th Bomb Wing at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, will be inactivated and the B-52 and KC-135 aircraft will be redistributed to five locations.

SAC Squadrons

Strate ic Air Command KC-135 air refueling squadrons at Fairchild AFB, Wash., Pease AFB, N.H., and Rickenbacker AFB, Ohio, will be used to modernize ANG squadrons at Fairchild AFB, Wash., Rickenbacker AFB, Ohio, Little Rock AFB, Ark., and Bangor International Airport, Maine, subject to final arrangements with the states concerned

Three tactical Air Force air division headquarters at Little Rock AFB, Ark., Pope AFB, N.C., and Cannon AFB, N.M., will be inactivated.

Some Air National Guard units will be modernized subject to final consent of the governors of the states concerned and Air Force Reserve units at one location will be modernized.

Some Aerospace Defense Command radar activities will be inactivated.

Eliminate Positions

The realignment will eliminate DOD positions involving approximately 11,500 military and 11,600 civilian positions. Generally, the military personnel concerned will be assigned to combat and combat support activities.

After both Army and Air Force actions are completed by 1977, it is estimated that DOD support costs will be reduced by over \$300 million per year. A review of the U.S. overseas support structure is nearing completion. Decisions of these actions will not be announced pending completion of a Defense/State review and consultations with the host countries involved. Under the Department of Defense program for stability of civilian employment, every effort will be made to assist displaced civilian employees in obtaining other acceptable employment. Close liaison will be maintained by the Department of Defense civilian personnel offices with the Department of Labor, state employment offices and private industry to help employees desiring placement assistance or retraining for positions in the private sector.

Women soon may have male guests

Women in the Air Force stationed at Reese will soon have a place where they can entertain male guests in their dormitory, Price Hall, thanks to a recommendation made by the Human **Relations** Council.

The first floor dayroom of the dorm, located in Bldg. 320, will be modified by several of the women to serve as the coed dayroom. The dayroom will be open to male visitors from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. Sundays through Thursdays. On Fridays, Saturdays and days before holidays, the coed room will be open from 10 a.m. to 1 a.m. the next day. The visitation is expected to begin later this month.

Col. Schuyler Bissell, wing commander, commented "I think this is a good move: at the same time I will not tolerate abuses and will take strong action against those who do abuse the rules."

One of the rules Col. Bissell was referring to was clothing. Male guests must wear shoes and shirts. That also means they may wear sandals and athletic shoes. Other than athletic shoes, no other athletic clothing may be worn, such as swimming suits, gym shorts or sweatsuits.

'I'm dreaming of a light Christmas'

Some people have been singing "I'm dreaming of a lighted Christmas" but it looks like the Christmas spirits won't be in the dark this year, as the go ahead has been placed on indoor decorative lights.

The rumor has been that Christmas lights would be out this year but if everyone will follow a few saving measures they can be on.

Lights will have to be on the inside but not before Dec. 14 or after Jan. 1. They may be turned on between dusk and 10:30 p.m. except for Christmas Eve or New Year's Eve, when they may



remain on until midnight.

Lights should be arranged in a way that would provide the best effect with the least lights. Nonelectric lighting should be used in the place of electric ones, when possible. Office decorative lights should be approved by the base commander. The general idea is to keep a sense of conservation in mind.

The Air Force is now under a program to reduce its lighting use by 15 per cent. This is a six-month program which includes December.

If the Christmas lights are to burn this year an earnest effort must be made to conserve energy whenever possible. Don't be part of the cause for a dark Christmas.

Any casual wear, such as jeans and Tshirts, may also be worn, as long as they are clean and in good repair. Any article of clothing which may possibly be considered profane or obscene may not be worn.

Other standards governing visits by men will be:

• No profane language or gestures.

• Sponsors will be responsible for their guest's conduct.

• Users of the dayroom must clean up their own trash and bottles.

• No men will be allowed in the women's living quarters.

• Sponsors having trouble enforcing the standards should call the Security Police.



Q. Are any of the campaign expenses of those running for our city council or the state legislature tax deductible?

A. No. Campaign expenses of a

Tax Return) your distributive share, based on your partnership agreement, of earnings, gains, and losses. You have to report these items whether or not they have been distributed to you. Detailed information on partnership income available in the IRS free Publication 541, "Tax Information on Partnership Income and Losses. Q. I had a casualty loss recently when a thunderstorm caused a tree to fall on the roof of my garage at home. I know the damage to the garage is deductible but what about loss of the tree? A. If ornamental trees and shrubs on residential property are damaged or destroyed by a casualty, you may have a deductible loss subject to the \$100 limitation on personal casualty loss deductions. To deduct this loss, you must establish that there has been a decrease in the total value of your real estate. When you have the damage appraised, remember that the fee you pay for establishing the amount of the loss is tax deductible also

Colonel Bissell speaks at HOMESAFE Kickoff

During the Wing Commander's HOMESAFE Kickoff Breakfast held Tuesday, Col. Schuyler Bissell spoke to Reese and Lubbock dignitaries about the base's holiday safety program. The following are excerpts from his address.

"It is extremely hard to predict traffic trends during the Christmas holiday period. However, despite the high cost of fuel and the effect of inflation, many people will travel long distances to be home for the holidays. Although we encourage everyone to travel by commercial means, many will choose to drive.

"Our HOMESAFE campaign has as its main goal a safe and enjoyable Christmas season for everyone—whether they travel long distances or stay in the local area. The theme of our campaign, "Our Holiday Prayer—HOMESAFE With Care," may be a little misleading. With all due respect to our Chaplain, the emphasis must be placed on the last two words—"With Care."

"With these things in mind, our HOMESAFE program is, in fact, a massive educational program designed to assure that our people know what to do to prevent mishaps on the highway, in the home, at play and, for the less fortunate, at work. Each driver already knows the common accident causes: fatigue, alcohol, speed too fast for conditions, distraction and inattention. "But, each of us must be continually reminded that only we can control our actions behind the wheel. Our only recourse against someone else's error is being alert and practicing defensive driving—starting with a properly-fastened seat belt and shoulder harness.



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Pay system cuts costs, problems

Beginning with the Nov. 29 pay date, the Air Force Accounting and Finance Center (AFAFC) began the transfer of funds between financial institutions by computer.

AFAFC was the first government agency to use the new system, called the Electronic Fund Transfer System (EFTS). The new Air Force concept credits the accounts of members whose pay goes to their financial organizations through electronic means instead of being mailed.

AFAFC provides computer tapes and a single Treasury check to the Denver branch of the Federal **Reserve Bank. The Federal Reserve** then sends the data through its computer network to the proper areas of the country.

Fifty thousand Air Force member accounts were paid in this first effort. The payments went to savings banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions located in California, Georgia, Colorado, Wyoming and parts of New Mexico.

Two tests of the EFTS were made by AFAFC and the Federal Reserve in the fall of 1973. The results showed the system will greatly reduce the risk of lost or stolen pay. Also, a savings of \$2 million a month would be made if the system was used government-wide, according to AFAFC spokesmen.

The Air Force and the Federal Reserve plan to implement EFTS throughout the United States by the end of 1975. Plans are also being made to bring retired pay and allotment payments into the system. (AFNS)

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Red Cross offers tips for safe Christmas tree

One locale where fire hazards are the greatest is the Christmas tree. This hazard can turn holiday merrymaking into tragedy. Following are some tips that can help to keep your tree from becoming a flaming mess:

• When buying a tree, make sure it is fresh. If the needles fall off at a touch, the tree is too dry. Keep the tree fresh by making a new diagonal cut in the trunk about two inches from the bottom and placing the tree in a water filled stand. Replace the water as soon as it evaporates. This will make the tree more fire resistant.

• Set the tree up well away from fireplace, stove, radiator or wall.

• Use fire proof decorations on the tree and all through the house. Never use lighted candles on the trees.

• Before decorating the tree, check all electric decorations for frayed, cracked or worn insulation. Inspect plugs for possible damage. Electric fixtures should carry the Underwriters' Laboratory (UL) "approved" symbol. Be sure not to overload circuits. With an eye to energy conservation as well as safety, be sure trees are unplugged when you retire or leave the house.

The Red Cross also has words of advice about living Christmas decorations. Roger Colunga, Red Cross field director, added, "Berries from holly, mistletoe and Jerusalem cherry as well as Poinsetta leaves can cause serious illness if chewed or swallowed. In a home with small children, artificial greenery is suggested."

VOLVO LAUNCHES FIRST NEW CARS IN EIGHT YEARS

Backed by two all-time record sales months this fall, Volvo today introduced a new series of cars to the United States for the first time in eight years. Called the 240 Series, the new cars replace the 140 Series which the Swedish auto maker launched here in 1967

According to OVERSEAS MOTORS CORP. of Lubbock, Inc., there are five models in the new 240 Series which join Volvo's improved luxury 164 to complete the company's line-up for 1975. The five 240 Series cars are the 242 and 242 GL two-door sedans, the 244 and 244 GL four-door sedans and the 245 station wagon

While retaining the best styling and engineering achievements of the 140 Series, the 240 Series has more than 30 major engineering changes including totally new front suspension and steering as well as a new front end design derived from Volvo's experimental safety can

The powerplant for the 240 Series, Volvo's 121 cubic-inch fuel-injected four-cylinder engine, contains many improvements for 1975 including a 10% more powerful starter motor, hardened valve seats for lead-free fuel and a solid state electronic ignition system

Electronic egnition also has been added to the 182 cubic-inch six-cylinder engine that powers the 1975 model 164. the luxury four-door sedar that remains at the top of the company's product

line

Noted for making many features standard

Between smaller big cars, bigger small cars and smaller small cars, car makers are introducing a lot of "revolutionary" new cars this year.

But before you rush out to finance a revolution, consider the 1975 Volvo 240.

Years of careful evolution have created a car totally thought-out, from energy-absorbing bumper to energy-absorbing bumper.

Consider the Volvo windshield wiper. On most cars, wiper blades are shiny. And the shine can end up in your eyes. To avoid this glaring fault, Volvo paints them matte black.

All cars have head rests. Volvo's head rests have openings so you can see behind you better.

equipment which are extra cost options on domestic cars. Volvo lists only one factory option for the 164 - a sliding steel sunroof. Standard equipment includes air conditioning, a choice of power disc brakes, leather upholstery, heated driver's seat, electronic fuel injection, steel belted radial tires and - new this year - front power windows

The great majority of new domestic cars demand unleaded fuel because they use catalysts to meet federal exhaust emission standards. Most 1975 Volvo owners, however, will be free to use their choice of fuels because catalysts are fitted to only one model - the manual transmission 164and to all cars sold in California which has more stringent emission standards.

Fuel economy figures recently released by the Environmental Protection Agency for city driving show that Volvos tested showed improved mileage over last year's models. The city average for all 1975 Volvos tested ranged between 15 and 17 miles per gallon. Volvo's all-model average for highway driving in a new government test this year was between 22 and 26 miles per gallon

Mr. J.R. Hickman predicts that Americans will buy about 65.000 Volvos in 1975, a figure which will assure the company of the highest sales for any year since the first Volvo was sold here 20 years ago

Volvo also plans to mark its 20th anniversary in this country by becoming the first imported car maker to build an assembly plant in the United States, Mr. J.R. Hickman noted. Construction of the \$150 million plant will begin in Chesapeake. Virginia during 1975 with the first production cars scheduled to roll off the assembly line late in 1976.




Center sets Christmas activities



Because of several recent cases of vandalism to the base post office, new hours have been set that are






