State Republican Chairman Peter O'Donnell Jr. has announced that the Harris County plaintiffs in the Congressional redistricting case, headed by George Bush, will drop out of active roles in the case because that county was treated fairly in the redistricting plan.

But the Republicans plan to bring in new plaintiffs from Dallas, Bexar, Tarrant, Midland, Ector, Jefferson, Orange and Brazoria Counties to try to convince the three-judge federal court in Houston that the new law violates several apportionment principles.

On legislative redistricting, state Reps. Jake Johnson of San of Houston, who joined in the suit which led to present reapportionment procedures being declared unconstitutional, will ask the court to say that the new plan violates the U.S. Constitution, too.

Main attack is expected to be purely on the question of whether countywide districts with more than one legislator serve to discriminate against minority racial and political groups

No attack is expected on the Senate into 31 new districts.


