Brush Control On Upswing in County

Callahan County acreage placed under brush control programs this year is already running well ahead of recent years -- including more than double the 1964 total.

County agricultural officials credit the recent brush control tour in the county with having

given the program its biggest boost.

Prior to the tour, 6,274 acres had been placed under brush control in the county this year. Since the tour, requests have already been made for cost-share on an additional 13,677 acres with more still coming in.

Total For Year

Total acreage for this year is now 19,951, compared to 8,065 acres for the entire 1964 calendar year. In other recent years, acreage totals included 14,589 under brush control in 1961; 14,865 in 1962; and 15,201 in 1963.

A desired goal of 30,000 acres per year has been set for Callahan County as the figure needed to gain over the rate of natural regrowth. The goal has been adopted by the Callahan

ASCS office manager, J. C. Earp, and County Agent Pat Garner.

The two men have been instrumental in pushing brush control practices in the county, and spearheaded plans for the successful brush control tour.

Earp, in pointing out the big drop in control acreage between 1963 and 1964, cited requirements of the program as the major factor.

Cut Assistance

"If a farmer or rancher did not agree in writing to defer grazing the acreage controlled for a period of not less than three consecutive months, his most share assistance would be reduced by 25 per cent," Earp said.

To date more than 100 Callahan livestock producers have declared their intentions to control acreage this year. "Not only will these people increase their own individual income and improve their land," Earp said, "but the county as a whole will benefit economically."

Additional details of the brush control program as it pertains to Callahan County may be obtained from the county ASCS office or the county agricultural agent.

Callahan Juries Set Long Terms For Two Held in Narcotics Case

Stiff penalties were handed out by two Callahan County juries in 42nd District Court Thursday after jurors found two Birmingham, Ala. men guilty of possessing narcotics.

Weldon Ray Waters, 23, was sentenced to 35 years in prison and Thomas Wesley Murry, 45, received a 40-year sentence from the juries. The two were arrested together on April 24, but demanded and received separate trials.

They were arrested by highway patrolmen on Interstate 20 near the western edge of Callahan County. Their car contained a bottle of pills and liquids which officers described as narcotics worth \$15,000 on the underworld market.

Heavy security measures were taken during the one-day trials. In the courtroom at Baird were six highway patrolmen, a Texas Ranger and four sheriff's deputies.

The two Alabama men had

been held in jail in Taylor County, for security reasons, since their arrest. They were transferred to Baird only for the trials.

AUSTIN — Two of the three redistricting plans passed by the last Legislature soon will come under courtroom attacks.

In a legislative redistricting case in Houston, motions will be filed asking that the new plan for dividing Texas into 150 districts for the House of Representatives be declared unconstitutional.

State Republican Chairman Peter O'Donnell Jr. has announced that the Harris County plaintiffs in the Congressional redistricting case, headed by George Bush, will drop out of active roles in the case because that county was treated fairly in the redistricting plan.

But the Republicans plan to bring in new plaintiffs from Dallas, Bexar, Tarrant, Midland, Ector, Jefferson, Orange and Brazoria Counties to try to convince the three-judge federal court in Houston that the new law violates several apportionment principles.

On legislative redistricting, state Reps. Jake Johnson of San Antonio and Robert C. Eckhardt of Houston, who joined in the suit which led to present reapportionment procedures being declared unconstitutional, will ask the court to say that the new plan violates the U. S. Constitution, too.

Main attack is expected to be purely on the question of whether countywide districts with more than one legislator serve to discriminate against minority racial and political groups.

No attack is expected on the plan passed to divide the Texas Senate into 31 new districts.

AUTO RATES TO GO UP — A State Insurance Board public hearing confirmed the earlier warning that auto insurance rates will go up an average of some 13.4 per cent on August 1. Actually, new rates for property damage, liability and collision lines carried by most motorists will be increased more than 20 per cent in most areas.

A rising toll from traffic accidents is blamed for the hike.

Insured drivers paid \$404,000,000 in premiums last year against \$198,000,000 settled by companies on claims. Another \$16,000,000 in pay-outs is pending. Board decides premiums should go up when more than 63 cents of the premium dollar goes to pay claims and adjustment costs.

BUILDING, SALES DOWN — Texas building and retail sales dropped off in May, according to UT's Bureau of Business Research.

Sales fell off about one per cent from the April level, in contrast to a normal seasonal gain of about three per cent. The January-May total is four per cent above the same period for 1964 but has not kept pace with the nationwide increase. Trade is expected to improve with repeal of federal excise taxes.

Building authorizations decreased 13 per cent last month to the second-lowest level in the last 12 months.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court affirmed Court of Civil Appeals finding that the two-year-old law which placed bonded liquor exporters along the Mexico border under state

regulations is unconstitutional. In two separate opinions -- from Harris and Matagorda counties -- court held that holders of hurricane insurance policies which specifically excluded water damage coverage could not collect for flood water damages to their homes from the Sept. 11, 1961, Hurricane Carla.

AG SPEAKS — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has held that San Marcos Consolidated Independent School District cannot use Martindale District tax assessments for 1965, though the districts have consolidated. All property throughout the district must be assessed at an equal and uniform rate, Carr concluded.

In other opinions, the attorney general ruled:

Banking Commissioner J. M. Falkner may not approve a credit union as a depository for other credit unions;

Dallas County Junior College may contract with the county tax assessor-collector to assess and collect its ad valorem taxes; and

In time of national emergency, the governor has authority to direct implementation of the emergency resources management plan, to order state agencies to assume their responsibilities and to create a "state executive reserve."

APPOINTMENTS — Gov. John Connally has named Dist. Atty. Edwin F. Berliner of El Paso to the new 171st District Court, which goes into operation on September 1. He appointed W. Barton Boling, El Paso lawyer, to succeed Berliner as district attorney.

Connally appointed Garrett Morris, Fort Worth attorney and insurance executive, to Texas Public Safety Commission to succeed Jake Jacobsen, Austin attorney who recently joined President Johnson's staff. Morris is a native of Nocona.

Commission establishes plans and policies for Department of Public Safety, state law enforcement agency.

UT LANDS LEASED — University of Texas leased 47,014 acres of land for \$10,106,000 at the 50th public auction of oil and gas leases.

Active bids were drawn on 159 of 167 tracts offered. All leases were made for five-year terms and one-sixth royalty on mineral production. Highest and second highest bids -- \$260,000 and \$225,000 -- were on 320 acre tracts in Ward County.

Receipts from auction will swell the Permanent University Fund to over \$442,000. Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler said.

Laco Oil Co. of Abilene staked No. 1 E. M. Seale in Callahan County regular field eight miles south of Baird.

Location is on a 161.9 acre lease, spotting 670 feet from the north and 1,900 feet from the west lines of Lewis Johnson Survey 252.

J. D. Sandefer Jr. of Breckenridge completed four regular field wells 2 1/2 miles south of Cross Plains. All are on the William Franke lease.

No. 15-A Franke is 1,437 feet from the north and 563 feet from the east lines of Section 72, Comal CSL Survey 181.

Daily potential was 3.98 barrels of 31 gravity oil, pumping from an open hole. The 5 1/2 inch casing set at 355 feet, top of the pay, and total depth is 383 feet.

Site for No. 20-A Franke is 1,737 feet from the north and 563 feet from the east lines of Section 72.

Daily potential was 5.05 barrels of 31 gravity oil, pumping from an open hole at 393 to 395 feet.

No. 32-A Franke spots 2,337 feet from the north and 863 feet from the east lines of Section 72.

May Bond Sales Reach \$3,838

May Series E and H Bond sales in Callahan County totaled \$3,838, according to Howard E. Farmer, chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee. This figure represents 21 per cent of the 1965 goal.

Savings Bond sales in Texas for the first five months of 1965 totaled \$63,338,088 which represents 41 per cent of the state's goal of \$152.8 million.

"During recent years, sales of \$25, \$50 and \$100 denomination bonds have shown a substantial increase. One reason for this increase is the use of Series E Bonds as a retirement instrument. Income is usually lower in retirement years and with the added benefit of double exemption after age 65, tax liability on E Bond interest could be greatly reduced -- or even eliminated entirely under some circumstances," Chairman Farmer stated.

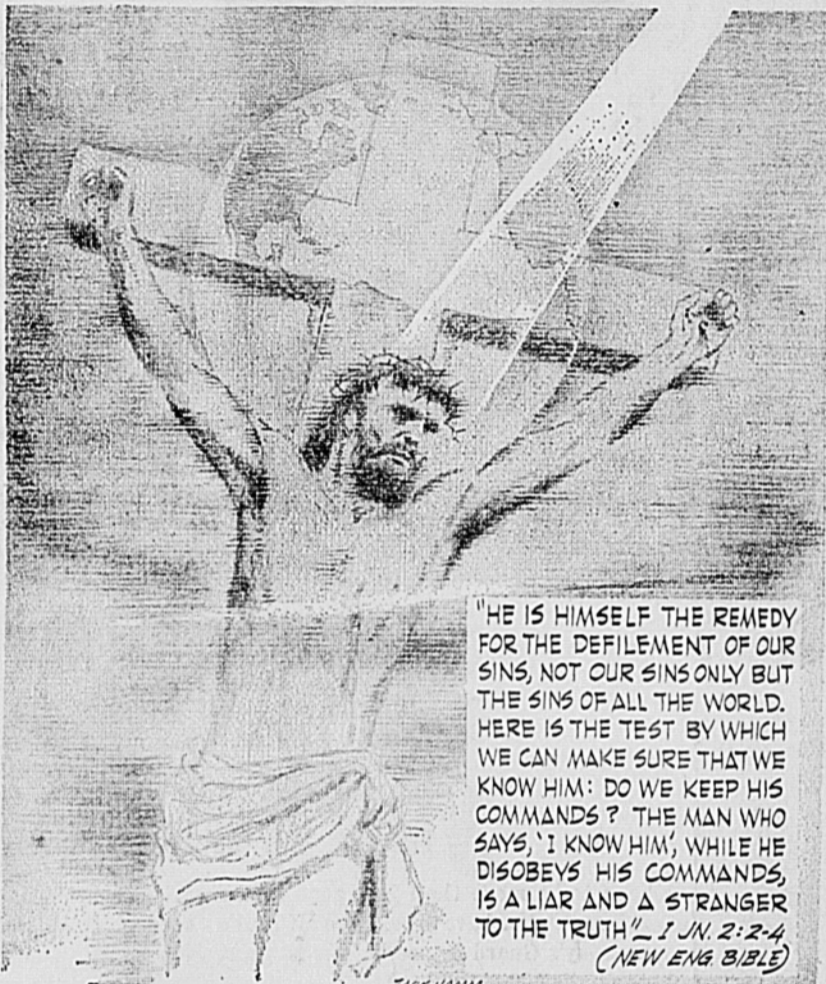

New Auto Insurance Rates Leave Texas 36th From Top in Nation

New higher automobile insurance rates for Texas, which are scheduled to go into effect Aug. 1, will still leave the state ranking 36th from the top among average state rates, according to the Texas Assn. of Insurance Agents.

Before the increase, Texas rates 43th in average rates. The rating means that, of average rates, 35 states will have higher automobile insurance than Texas.

While 35 states will still have higher average insurance premiums, Texas ranks sixth in number of licensed drivers, fifth in population, third in number of private passenger cars registered, and first in miles of highways.

Figures from the Department of Public Safety show that auto accidents, accident fatalities, and vehicle registrations all increased during 1964.

Fatalities in traffic in 1964 totaled 3,009, up 10.2 per cent or 277 persons over 1963; accidents increased 13.7 per cent during 1964 to total 454,762, or 54,845 more than in 1963; and vehicle registrations increased 240,566 in 1964 over 1963, up 4.7 per cent or totaling 5,385,818.

The Texas premium rating laws provide a system whereby an average set of rates are established based on loss experience of all insurance companies writing policies in Texas.
