Randall High School on February 29 . The winner of that game is set to face the Reagan County Tahoka victor in the opening round of the Region I Tournament at Abilene Christian University on March 3. No Floydada boys

in a Regional Tournament. The Whirlwind victory ov Stratford wasn't as close as the final
score indicated. Floydada 20-9 first-quarter lead, mainly on the strength of a 12-0 run to open the

Floydada's Darryl Henderson topped his season scoring average by eight as he led all scorers with 22 of-7 free throw attempts and pulled down 8 rebounds. The only other Whirlwind in double figures was Amado Morales, who tallied 12 points

Brandon Wickware added 8 points and was 2 -for-2 at the charity stripe. The powerful senior post crashed the boards for 9 rebounds. Senior Jeff Lyles added 7 points and 7 rebounds,
and Sean Holster registered and Sean Holster registered 7 points
and 5 boards. As a team, Floydada out shot the Elks $45 \%$ to $32 \%$ and outrebounded them 37-22.
Senior Justin McGuire was limited o 4 points, but had 5 rebounds and a steal. Senior J.J. Morales hit 1-of-3
from 3-point range. Tyler Helms scored two points on free throws, but they came at a critical time down the stretch when Stratford was making a late-game comeback.

If we make a list of lacks common sense,

But there are some policies hat just don't make sense and are flat wrong -- like penalizing a group of people in America for holding down jobs and being productive members of society. Yet, it's happening everyday with our senior citizens.

Today, the law limits how much seniors can earn before their Social Security benefits are reduced. makes more than \(\$ 17,000\) loses \(\$ 1\) of Social Security benefits for every \(\$ 3\) he or she earns. This earnings limit was enacted during the G̣reat Depression to encourage older people to leave the workforce so jobs would become available for younger workers. But a lot has changed since
then. In 1935, the average woman

\section*{lived until the age of 63 . Today, a
woman's life expectancy is 79 .} woman's life expectancy is 79 . People are living longer and more
productive lives. We should not productive lives. We should not
penalize seniors who want to work. penalize seniors who want to work.
They are healthier and happier, and the rest of us benefit from their experience and knowledge. It also helps us all to have them working and paying taxes.
Congress passed legislacion a few years ago that will gracually raise the earnings limit over several years. That was a start, but we need to repeal the limit completely. I've been pushing for its repeal since my very first day in
Congress and, this week, the House Congress and, this week, the House
will vote on a bill to do just that Repealing the Social Security earnings limit recognizes not only the value of work to America's seniors, but also the value of working seniors to America. It will put a little bit more common sense back into government.

A: Mail-order catalogs offer many
people, especially the elderly or homebound, an easy way to shop from the convenience of their homes. Unfortunately, catalogs also allow unscrupulous people a way to sell merchandise that no one would buy they had a chance to see it first. If you ordered the merchandise with a credit card and have not yet paid the credit card company for that charge, you do have the option of a charge back. Under federal law, credit card company is as liable for

When you consider ordering products from catalogs, there are some things that you should keep in mind to protect yourself.
Since many catalogs contain enlarged pictures of items, be sure to check the description of the item to verify its size. You should also be sure that you receive everything that you ordered. Often, several
items will be shown in a picture, but items will be shown in a picture, but only one or two are actually sent. Check the text to make sure you know exactly what you should

Beware of "list" or "suggested retail" prices. Often a seller will show one of these prices to get you to Check prices of similut tita a bargain. Check prices of similar items at local
