## Old Fashioned Saturday set for August 5th

Lockney's popular Old Fashioned Saturday will be held, this year, on August 5th. The event is sponsored every year by Lockney's Chamber of Commerce.

## Joyce Williams given state Volunteer of the Year Award

Joyce Williams, of Floydada, traveled to Austin to receive the Volunteer of the Year award for Region One, of the Texas Department of Human Services. Eric Bost, the Commissioner for the Texas Department of Human Services, presented Williams with the award.

Region One extends south from Brownfield and Post, east to Childress, west to New Mexico, and north to Oklahoma.

"Joyce was selected for the Volunteer of the Year Award because of her dedication and sincere caring for our clients," said Rachael Castillo, a Texas Work Advisor with the Texas Department of Human Services.

Joyce is one of several volunteers who give their time and efforts to the Texas Work Program. The program is designed to provide volunteers who can counsel, guide, and help a welfare recipient to become self sustaining.

"Joyce has helped several families with budgeting, wise grocery shopping, and money management," said Castillo.

"She actually helped them to take an inventory of their pantry and taught them the staple items that were

needed. She was able to help them go beyond the 'feast then famine' (feast at the first of the month and famine at the end of the month).

"She taught them how to make curtains, how to 'bake' without an oven, and was always encouraging. Her smile is also always encouraging."

During a monthly staff meeting, in July, other local volunteer mentors honored with a luncheon, plaques, and certificates, were: Amy Kirk-Hollums, Joyce Williams, Janet Milam, Myrtle Finley, Wendell Horn, Ralph Jackson, Doug Rainbolt, Oscar Garza Jr., and Rickey Gonzalez.

Amy Hollums, Janet Milam, and Williams received plaques for having volunteered over 100 hours to the program.

According to Castillo, Amy Hollums found a homeless family living in the park and helped them find a full time job and a nice apartment.

"She was able to show them they had choices and the decision was theirs," said Castillo. "She took another client and helped her with her self-esteem."

Hollums was also selected to serve on an advisory board to the Texas

## Suspect husband found dead Floydada native murdered

Memorial services for Alison Lee McLain, 46, of Colorado Springs, Colorado, will be held at 2:00 p.m., Thursday, July 13, 2000 at the First United Methodist Church in Floydada.

Reverend Wendell Horn, pastor, will officiate.

The body of Ms. McLain, a 1972 graduate of Floydada High School, was found, by campers, in a wooded area near Woodland Park in El Paso County, Colorado, July 5, 2000.

The Coroner's office ruled that she died from blunt force trauma.

Two days later a warrant was issued for her husband, Ramon Garcia, in connection with the slaying.

Garcia was later found dead Saturday, July 8th, under a bridge next to a set of railroad tracks in North Las Vegas, Nevada.

The 1988 blue Ford Escort that he was believed to be driving has not been recovered.

Family members last spoke to McLain on Mother's Day, May 14, 2000. The family became concerned after repeated phone calls to her residence were not returned. According

to one family member, "Her husband kept giving us evasive answers. Then he left. The last time anyone in the McLain family talked to him was June 26th."

At this time the manner and cause of death of Garcia has not been released by the Clark County Coroner's Office, however officers speculate that Garcia may have killed himself.

The case is still under investigation and the family has said they are not free to answer questions at this time.

"The case is not closed," said Alison's mother, Doris McLain. "We just aren't free to discuss it. We can say that the detective who is handling the case should be highly commended for his efforts."

McLain was born on December 18, 1953 in Lockney to Mrs. Doris Wanda Cornelius McLain and the late Mr. James Hollis McLain. She attended schools in Floydada and graduated from Floydada High School in 1972.

She graduated cum laude, with a BFA in Studio Art from Texas Tech University in Lubbock. Her major emphases were printmaking and painting.

She moved to Colorado Springs, Colorado from Lubbock in 1983. She continued to study and produce art and her work has been included in both regional and national shows.

She was a member of the Business of Arts Center and Bridge Street Gallery both of Colorado Springs, Colorado and the First United Methodist Church of Floydada.

She is survived by her mother, Doris McLain, of Floydada; a brother Cliff McLain, of Lubbock; and a sister, Marilyn Wood, of Lindale.

The family suggests memorials to Friends of the Library, Rt. 2, Box 49, Floydada, Texas, 79235.



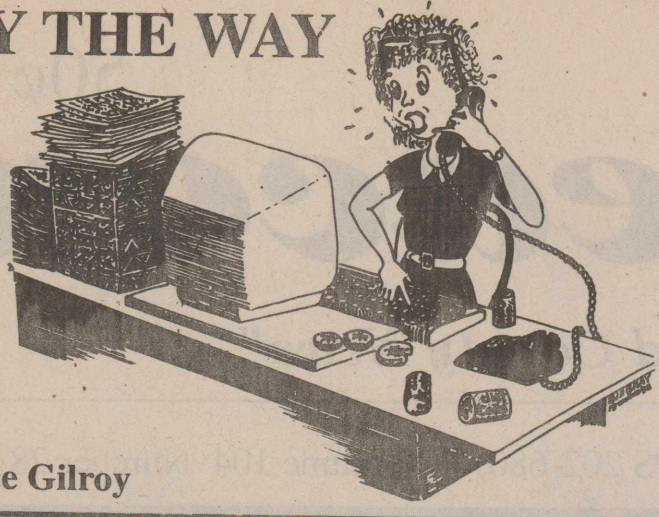

Friends and family members of Alison McLain, formerly of Floydada, were shocked this week to find out that she had been murdered in Colorado Springs.

Her mother, Doris McLain, and other family members, have been trying to find out what happened to Alison since mid May. They knew something wasn't right when Alison wouldn't return phone calls and her husband kept giving them the run-around.

After the family and police started snooping around the husband took off. Now the husband has been found dead in Nevada.

I hate to say it, but my first reaction to his death was--"Serves Him Right!" But obviously after a little thought I realized his death only left more unanswered questions.

Like one family member said, "Each question asked leads to another question."

I can't imagine the kind of torment that the McLain family is going

through. I know the support and love of the community is helping them cope. But that same community, in an effort to help, also asks a lot of questions. They are questions the McLains are having a hard time answering. Some of the answers they don't know. Some of the answers they have been told to keep quiet about until the investigation is closed. Although the husband has been found, the police have not closed the case. Loose ends have to be tied up.

The McLains have said they aren't answering questions because they don't want to. They aren't answering because they can't at this time.

What they need now, I suppose, is prayer. When you've come to a point when you can't comprehend what is happening to your world--when you've reached the end of the very last straw--there is still a hand holding on to you. Jesus will never ever let go. The same hands that carried Alison up to Heaven are holding up Alison's family and friends.

**Holly Carthel to work with orphans in Kostroma, Russia**

Lockney High School student, Holly Carthel, 17, will leave July 21st for Kostroma, Russia as part of a church group who will be working with orphans.

"I will be working with orphans between the ages of 6 and 15," said Holly.

"Along with a translator we will teach them to read, using the Bible as our textbook."

Carthel will be traveling in a group of 30 youth from the Farmers Branch Church of Christ, of Dallas.

"There is already a group of 30 over there," said Holly.

"We will be divided up into teams of two--a man and woman--to work

with 30 orphans. We will be considered the mother and father and we will stay with these kids in an American made building close to Kostroma. They will bring the orphans to us and we will stay together.

"There will be 300 kids coming to our group--and 300 kids with another group. I've been told that isn't even a dent in their orphan population."

The students will also tell the story of Jesus through dramas, and arts and crafts. "Everything we do will be with a Christian theme," said Holly. "We are just going to go and show them love."

Holly is the daughter of Ron and Charla Carthel, of Lockney. She will return to Dallas, August 6th.

Mexico has just undergone another revolution, the second in my lifetime.

Back when I was a little kid, about 40 miles north of the border, the Mexicans were wrapping up one of their bloodiest revolutions and instituting the PRI, a semi-socialist, semi-facist political party that became synonymous with the government for some 70 years.

The Party, and the government, also became synonymous with corruption, graft, bribery, nepotism, and a poverty-stricken nation. All of that combined to produce a culture that has plagued what could have been a remarkably rich people. The land was there. The minerals were there. The climate was there. The people were there. Honest political leadership was not. The political leadership in Mexico was concerned primarily with one thing...the perpetuation of its own power, its own perks, its own money.

Let us all hope that the election of Vicente Fox will change all that. The people of Mexico are to be congratulated, in our view, for finally throwing off the yoke of one-party rule, for "throwing the bums out" and giving what appears to be an honest outsider a chance at the helm.

The current Mexican President

seems to be exceptionally honest compared to the succession of corrupt Presidents who have ruled Mexico for years, passing the baton on to their chosen successor after they had milked the office for six years. We believe Vicente Fox will be a God-send to Mexico. If to no other end, simply by proving to the citizens of Mexico that they can have an influence over the direction of their country.

Why this attention, and this concern, with what goes on in Mexico?

Simply because it has long been apparent that so terribly many of Mexico's problems, problems that directly affect the lives of those of us in Texas and across the nation, would have to be dealt with by Mexico itself. American politicians, or at least most of them, have run from any fundamental policy that might help force any sort of change for the better in Mexico.

The immigration problem is one, but only one, of the problems. And it is a problem that too many of our politicians, including our own Governor, have treated as untouchable. Now it appears that a new President in Mexico recognizes that something must be done, that Mexican govern-

ments have long regarded illegal immigration to the United States as a matter of no concern. or, in fact, as a matter beneficial to Mexico, in that the flow of millions of its poorest citizens to the United States actually acts as a safety valve for those in power. The more Mexican citizens that leave the country merely means, to the Mexican power structure, just that many less that they have to worry about. There are now about 3 million illegals in the United States, by most estimates, many of them earning good wages and sending billions of dollars back to families in Mexico. The economy of Mexico may benefit, but

what does it do to the self esteem of the nation?

We do not look for perfection in the new Mexico. After all, we have more than our share of corrupt politicians in America too. But most people here (in Texas) take a dim view of corruption in government. The PRI system has been in effect in Mexico so long that corruption has become endemic throughout the body politic. That happens when any one party maintains hold of a government for long, uninterrupted, periods. Perhaps Fox can improve things in Mexico. We hope so, because if he can make Mexico a better place, we may all benefit.

## Commissioners deny tax abatement

The Floyd County Commissioners met Monday, July 10, and unanimously denied a ten year tax abatement request by Delta and Pine Land Company of Aiken. Commissioner Craig Gilly made the motion and it was seconded by Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden.

D&PL is in the process of expanding their Aiken storage facilities at a cost of \$3.75 million according to President Steve M. Hawkins.

In other business, Gilly made the motion to accept the Floyd County Appraisal District's 2000-2001 Certified Effective Tax Roll base of \$35899 per \$100 of property value. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Jon Jones and unanimously passed. This rate is down from last year's rate of \$36118.

Floyd County's adjusted property taxable value this year amounts to \$286,332,313 and the personal property taxable value is \$85,534,152.

Commissioner Lennie Gilroy made the motion to increase the county Employer Retirement Matching Contribution Plan from \$1.25 to \$1.50. It was seconded by Bearden and unanimously passed.

The commissioners also unanimously approved the continuation of the collection of the \$10 Road and Bridge Fund tax. This tax is collected on the registration of each vehicle licensed in the county.

The appointment of the Election Judges were unanimously approved by the commissioners. They are: Pct. No. 1, Judge Gary Carthel, Alternate Lorene Newberry; Pct. No. 5, Judge

Jesse Garza; Pct. No. 7, Judge Mary Turner, Alternate Judy Macha; Pct. No. 9, Judge Carolyn Marble, Alternate Mamie Wood; Pct. No. 11, Judge Norma Welch, Alternate Carl Lemons; Pct. No. 16, Judge Susan Dunavant, Alternate Martha Williams;

Pct. No. 17, Judge Johnnie Pigg, Alternate Barbara Payne; Pct. No. 18, Judge Lynda Gant, Alternate Debbie Montandan; Pct. No. 20, Judge Sammy Bradley, Alternate Billy D. Colston; Pct. No. 23, Judge Al Gallo-way, Alternate Delores Cannon; Pct. No. 24, Judge Jaynette Harrison, Alternate Linda Holbert; and early voting ballot board, Judge Randall Griffin, Alternate Chuck Holmes.

In a related matter, Gilroy made the motion to leave the county election precincts as is. It was seconded by Gilly and unanimously passed.

The commissioners approved two farm contracts. One was for soil conservation at the Floydada Co-op Gin and the other was for grading a ranch road some 30 miles Northeast of Floydada.

Floyd County Sheriff Royce Gilmore presented to the commissioners the need of a new vehicle for their department.

"The 1995 Ford Victoria, our oldest, has 164,484 miles on it. We have had to have some front end work done on it.

"The 1997 Alumina has 100,525 miles on it and we had to replace the transmission," Gilmore said.

After some discussion, no action was taken.

County Treasurer Mary Shurbet gave the monthly, the quarterly, and

the investment financial reports to the commissioners. The financial report from June 1 thru June 30, 2000 gave a beginning balance of \$231,011.13 with receipts of \$208,359.82.

Transfers in and out for the month were \$189,761.08. Disbursements were \$160,469.92. The ending balance was \$278,901.03.

All financial reports were unanimously approved by the commissioners.

## Local media honored

Alice Gilroy of the Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon was named to the Media Honor Roll, a program sponsored by the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB), by Lockney ISD. The Media Honor Roll recognizes media representatives statewide who deserve recognition for fair and balanced reporting of news about public schools. Media representatives from almost 400 Texas newspapers and radio and television stations were honored by their local school districts.

Criteria for the district selection included media representative's efforts to get to know the superintendent, board president, and the district's mission and goals; report school news in a fair, accurate, and balanced manner; give a high profile to positive news about schools; visit the schools; and maintain a policy of no surprises by sharing information with school officials.

## McCoy and surrounding communities hold annual reunion at Lighthouse

The 48th Reunion of McCoy and surrounding communities was a special event with over 50 in attendance at the Lighthouse Electric on July 9, 2000. Many were on hand to register at 10:30 a.m. and the bountiful food was enjoyed at noon after much greeting and embracing with a number whom had not attended in several years and even some that this was their first time to be present.

After a short business meeting that revealed the finances and action to definitely meet at the same time in 2001 with the same officers in charge. Flora Day McNeill is chairman with Carolyn Jackson of Lockney as her most able co-chairman.

The meeting continued with Flora McNeill presenting the Memorial as follows: In thinking about a Memorial for today, many things came to me. You know that Jesus tells us that he would go to prepare a place for us in Heaven - now in our earthly thoughts our pioneer parents were preparing a place for us! Just think of the different farms and homes that were established for us in our area. I think especially of those that had to establish roads, fence their land, break out the sod and overcome many hardships in doing this. We think of the good times that we shared with families and neighbors! Families loved their families, neighbors loved neighbors, and neighbors helped each other in many ways and many times.

I have stated before that our gatherings were for fun and reminiscing. So "there is time to be born, a time to live, a time to die, a time to remember, a time to laugh, a time to cry, a time to work and a time to play," and that is what we are doing today! I requested you send your remembered times and now I give parts of the three sent to me.

Ann Lou Payne Sinclair of Plainview remembers the box suppers that were at the School house when the women and girls would decorate boxes then fill them with food. She said her mama nearly always had fried chicken and chocolate pie in hers. They would auction the boxes which were bought by the men also, sometimes the candidates would be present and make speeches. They were always fun and the ones around Valentines Day were always really pretty. The girls hoped their boyfriends or daddy

would get their box. Sometimes we also had pie suppers that were lots of

fun. Also, something we did then that kids now don't do, is to go home with each other for lunch on Sundays. She said, "I mean we all went. There were usually 5 to 10 of us and we would usually stay until church on Sunday night. We did this maybe once a month. Ann Lou closed by saying that she has a lot of wonderful memories of McCoy and she is very proud to say, I was raised in the McCoy Community. She is the daughter of Claude and Zora Payne.

The next "I remember when" was from Billy G. Warren. He says that he remembers when the paved road between Floydada and Ralls was built and that the center stripe was black not white. Billy also remembers when Starkey School taught 12 grades. The school house was a two story building with the bottom floor of stucco and top floor brick. The bottom floor had 4 rooms which were used for classes and later two rooms were for classes and two rooms were used for teacher's quarters. The top floor was the auditorium with a stage which was used for community activities and church services. The church was for Baptist but all church affiliates would attend and worship God.

Billy said he remembers when Starkey and McCoy schools would get together on Friday afternoons to play softball and even tho' he doesn't like to talk about who won, he doesn't remember Starkey ever winning a game with McCoy.

Another event Billy remembers is when the Starkey boys would get together on Sunday afternoons and ride horses. Those boys were, Tommy Assiter, Leroy Parrish, Bonnie Perminter, Albert Jones and himself. My horse had a crooked foot!

Another thing Billy remembered is when his dad farmed with teams. They lost most of the cattle from bloating on tumble weeds which was about the only vegetation growing during the drought. Also, that same year four of his father's work horses died from sleeping sickness with one horse and one mule surviving.

A definite memory was the dust clouds that rolled in. They would blackout the sun so they would have to light the coal oil lamps in order to see. Another experience of the dust bowl days was when he and his brother, Elvis, cleared the dirt from

the ceiling of their house to keep the ceiling from falling in. They didn't have a car and they would walk to church meeting the Tardy family, Harvey, Marie, Harvey Dale and LaNell at the corner then all would walk the other mile to church.

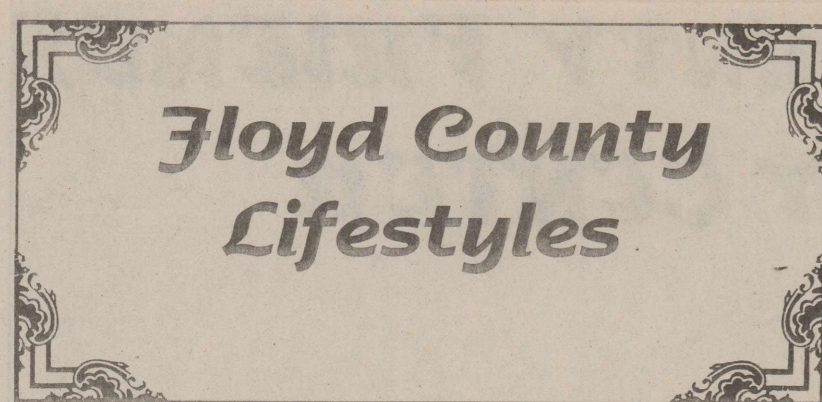
He also recalls a softball story when the team at McCoy was called the McCoy Midgets. They would play other schools in the surrounding communities beating everyone except Dougherty. But one year they went to Dougherty to play them and this was the one and only time to beat them.

Then there was the time when they were practicing ball and Ray Peel was playing in right field. Doc Staples hit him a fly ball. Doc told Sidney Ray to get on his mule and catch that ball. Ray stopped and said in his slow voice, Mr. Staples, I don't have a mule.

On the serious side, Dub recalls a most important time, when his dad made an everlasting impression on his young life. They had horses and wagons and he was helping grease the wheels and his dad told him, that the wagon wheel is like life. The wheel that squeaks the loudest gets the most grease.

The last memory related by Dub was, Marva's dad, Mr. James Smith, would quit whatever he was doing on the farm to come to their ballgames. He called me Slats and he also chewed tobacco. Between spits he would holler come on Slats!

Now we would certainly be amiss if we didn't dedicate these words to those who have passed away since we met July 11, 1999. The five names this year are: Jim Rhodes, Mildred

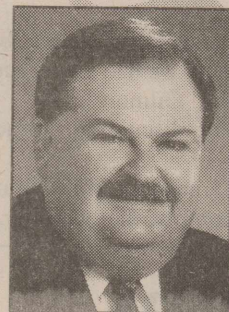
Nick Long, Tony St. James, and Bryant will bring you play by play at both games, on 900 AM.

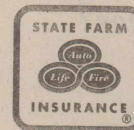

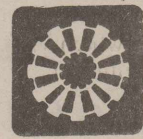

## Floyd County Extension News

### TIPS ON TURF

This is the fifth of a six series of articles on "Tips on Turf." The articles will offer helpful tips to homeowners addressing lawn, garden and tree care management practices.

"Identification" is the key word for weed control. We must first identify weeds before a proper selection of control measures can be employed.

Lawn weeds fall into two general categories: broadleaf or grassy. Either can be annual or perennial. Herbicides used for weed control fall into two main types: pre-emergence or post-emergence.

Summer weed control requires that we use mainly post-emergence chemicals. Broadleaf weeds can be controlled by using a hormone type chemical (ie. 2, 4-D); these types are effective on broadleaf weeds and will not harm the grass.

Sometimes, perennial broadleaf weeds are difficult to control and may require spot treatment with glyphosate (Roundup). Glyphosate is non-selective and will kill your turfgrass, so be very careful with its use.

Grassy weeds that have already emerged, such as Crabgrass, may be controlled by compounds such as MSMA. Some browning or yellowing of turf may occur with MSMA, but it will not kill the grass.

Finally, we can control late summer weeds that have not emerged with a pre-emergence type compound such as Surlflan. If a pre-emergence is chosen, be sure it is recommended for the South Plains. This will prevent damage to established trees and shrubs.

NOTE: If these chemical method of weed control do not fit into your program, the alternative is the "Santa Claus" method of "hoe, hoe, hoe."

Remember the key to any weed control program is a good, healthy, well-maintained lawn. This will take care of many weeds. Read the label and follow the directions given on any chemical used in the lawn care program.

## Texas Agricultural Extension Service IPM Update

### General Conditions

Most of the area received more rain last week. Cotton has recovered some from wind damage and is looking better, but is still in need of some hot, dry weather. The cloudy, wet weather is not only slowing heat unit accumulation, but is also hampering some overwintered boll weevil applications. Some cotton will begin blooming this week. Scattered bollworms have been found, but no treatable populations have been found in program fields.

### Boll Weevil Management

Given our recent weather conditions, it is important to note rain, windy conditions and cool temperatures will reduce weevil response to pheromone traps. Therefore, if adverse weather conditions are present during the week of first square (as was the case on many fields in the area), the average trap catch for the previous week should be considered in determining the need to treat.

Pheromone trap data may not be reliable after 25 percent of more of cotton in an area has begun to square or after 1/3-grown squares are present in a field around which the traps are located. Trap dates are most reliable in areas using uniform planting dates.

Once 1/3rd grown (pencil eraser size) squares are present, field inspections should be used to determine the need for treatment. When square numbers are greater than the combined number of blooms and bolls, inspect fields at least weekly, by examining 100 squares that are at least 1/4 inch in size. Sample the entire field since weevil infestations are often clumped. If 20 percent of the squares examined are weevil damaged, treatment should be considered.

### Plant Bug Alert

Weather has a tremendous impact on most insect populations. Plant bugs and their status as pests of cotton are affected most by Spring and early Summer rainfall. These rains promote the growth and lengthen the cycle of many wild hosts. This allows plant bugs to complete an extra generation on these hosts, resulting in considerable increase in numbers.

When the rains stop and wild hosts begin to dry down, plant bugs will

move to other succulent hosts such as cotton. I fully expect this movement to result in damaging levels of plant bugs this year. The following are descriptions of our most common plant bug species.

### Cotton Fleahoppers

Adult fleahoppers are about 1/8 inch long and pale green. Nymphs resemble adults but lack wings and are light green. They move very rapidly when disturbed. Adults move into cotton from weed hosts when cotton begins to square. Both adults and nymphs suck sap from the tender portion of the plant, including small squares. Pinhead size and smaller squares are most susceptible to damage.

The decision to apply insecticide should be based on the number of fleahoppers present, the squaring rate and the percent square set. If conditions are conducive for the rapid build up of cotton fleahoppers in alternate hosts, ten scouting intervals should be shortened (i.e. monitor fields every three to four days). During the first week of squaring, the economic threshold is 25 to 30 cotton fleahoppers per 100 terminals combined with less than 85 percent square set. Starting with the third week of squaring up to first bloom, the economic threshold is 25 to 30 cotton fleahoppers per 100 terminals combined with less than 75 percent square set.

### Lygus Bugs

The western tarnished plant bug (*Lygus hesperus* Knight) is one of several *Lygus* species that feeds on cotton terminals, squares and small bolls. Adults are 1/4 inch long, have a conspicuous triangle in the center of the back, are winged and vary in color from pale green to yellowish brown with reddish brown to black markings. Immature lygus bugs are called nymphs. They are uniformly pale green with red-tipped antennae; late instars have four conspicuous black spots on the thorax and one large black spot near the base of the abdomen. The nymph's wings are not developed, but nymphs can move rapidly and are difficult to detect in cotton foliage. Small nymphs may be confused with aphids, cotton fleahoppers and leaf hopper

nymphs.

Plant bugs prefer legumes to cotton and usually are found in large numbers in areas of alfalfa or potato production or areas providing wild hosts, such as clovers, vetches, mustard and dock. Lygus bugs are attracted to succulent growth; their feeding results in shedding of squares and small bolls, stunted growth and boll deformation. Damage to blooms appears as black anthers and puckered areas in petals.

The need for lygus bug control is determined by their abundance in relation to the fruiting condition of the cotton plants. Fields should be inspected for lygus bugs at 4 to 5 day intervals using a drop cloth. See Extension publication E-6, page 7, available at <http://entowww.tamu.edu> or my office for a discussion of drop cloth sampling.

In the second week of squaring, the economic threshold is 1 lygus bug adult or nymph per three feet of row combined with less than 85 percent square set. In the third week of squaring, the economic threshold is 1 lygus bug adult or nymph per three feet of row combined with less than 75 percent square set. After the third week of squaring, the economic threshold is 2 lygus bug adults or nymphs per three feet of row with less than acceptable fruit retention.

After peak bloom, begin treatment when drop cloth accounts exceed 2 lygus bug adults or nymphs per three feet of row and plants have failed to retain squares and set bolls normally during the first 4 to 5 weeks of fruiting.

### Favorable Aphid Conditions

Our current weather pattern is very favorable for cotton aphid population development, and I have found aphids in several fields during the past few days. Therefore, cotton aphid presence and the potential for an outbreak should be considered when selecting materials for applications targeting other pests.
